## STATEMENT MADE BY

AMBASSADOR J. ALAN BEESLEY

TO THE 34TH EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

OF THE UNITED NATIONS HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR REFUGEES

GENEVA

MONDAY, 10 OCTOBER, 1983

## MR. CHAIRMAN:

OUR WARMEST CONGRATULATIONS ON YOUR ELECTION TO THE CHAIRMANSHIP OF THIS, THE 34TH SESSION OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. GIVEN YOUR OWN DEEP INTEREST IN HUMANITARIAN AFFAIRS AND THE OUTSTANDING RECORD OF YOUR COUNTRY IN CONTRIBUTING TO THE SOLUTION OF REFUGEE PROBLEMS, YOUR ELECTION IS A COUNTRY OF CONGRATULATIONS ARE ALSO EXTENDED TO THE VICE CHAIRMAN AND TO THE RAPPORTEUR, BOTH OF WHOM WE HOLD IN HIGH EXTEEM.

THROUGH YOU I WOULD ALSO LIKE TO EXPRESS THE CANADIAN DELEGATION'S THANKS TO LAST YEAR'S BUREAU FOR THEIR DISTINGUISHED SERVICE. THE CONTRIBUTION OF OUR RETIRING CHAIRMAN, AMBASSADOR KHARMA, MUST BE DESCRIBED AS OUTSTANDING AND HE HAS LEFT US AN ENDURING LEGACY.

WE HAVE LISTENED, MR. CHAIRMAN, TO THE
STATEMENT OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER WITH ATTENTION AND
WITH APPRECIATION. HE HAS PROVIDED A LUCID
DESCRIPTION OF THE PROBLEMS NOW CONFRONTING US AND
HIS DETERMINATION TO ADDRESS THEM IN A VERY
COMPREHENSIVE WAY IS HEARTENING. WHILE IT IS TRUE
THAT MANY IF NOT MOST OF THE SOLUTIONS LIE WITH
GOVERNMENTS, THE LEADERSHIP, COMMITMENT, AND MORAL
AUTHORITY OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER HIMSELF IS
INDISPENSABLE.

WHILE THERE HAVE BEEN NO NEW MAJOR REFUGEE

CRISES IN THE LAST YEAR WE ARE DISTURBED THAT A

STALEMATE SEEMS TO HAVE OCCURRED WITH RESPECT TO THE

CURRENT STATUS OF EACH OF THE MAJOR REFUGEE CRISES

WHICH HAVE DEVELOPED OVER THE LAST FOUR TO FIVE

YEARS. WHILE THE INTERNATIONAL COMMUNITY CONTINUES

TO PROVIDE HELP IN VARIOUS FORMS TO THOSE AFFECTED BY

THESE CRISES, LASTING SOLUTIONS SEEM NO CLOSER THAN

THEY WERE TWO OR THREE YEARS AGO. DESPITE

UNPRECEDENTED EFFORTS, THE PROBLEMS PERSIST AND THE

REFUGEES REMAIN IN A STATE OF DEPRIVATION, UNCERTAINTY, AND IN SOME CASES, PHYSICAL DANGER.

APPARENT THAT HE AND HIS ORGANIZATION ARE GEARING UP
FOR A CONCENTRATED EFFORT TO FIND, DURABLE SOLUTIONS
FOR THESE UNHAPPY PEOPLE. OUR OWN ASSESSMENT OF
THESE PERSISTENT REFUGEE SITUATIONS HAS LED US TO
CONCLUSIONS SIMILAR TO THOSE DRAWN BY THE HIGH
COMMISSIONER, AND WE ARE AWARE THAT OTHER GOVERNMENTS
SHARE THESE VIEWS. CANADA STANDS READY TO CONTINUE
ITS SUPPORT FOR THE HIGH COMMISSIONER AND, IN
CO-OPERATION WITH OTHER COUNTRIES, TO ASSIST IN NEW
INITIATIVES WHICH WILL SUPPORT THE HIGH
COMMISSIONER'S OBJECTIVES.

ON THE DIPLOMATIC LEVEL, THIS MEANS CONTINUED EFFORTS TO ADDRESS THE ROOT CAUSES OF REFUGEE SITUATIONS AS IDENTIFIED IN PRINCE SADRUDDIN AGA KHAN'S REPORT ON MASS EXODUS PREPARED FOR THE HUMAN RIGHTS COMMISSION. IT MEANS JOINT ACTION WITH OTHER

GOVERNMENTS IN THE FACE OF PARTICULAR SITUATIONS, WHEN COLLECTIVE JUDGEMENT INDICATES THAT SUCH ACTION MAY AVERT, DIMINISH OR REDRESS REFUGEE FLOWS. SUPPORT OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S OBJECTIVES REQUIRES CREATIVE AND FLEXIBLE USE OF OUR CAPACITY FOR REFUGEE RESETTLEMENT TO DEFUSE TENSIONS CAUSED BY REFUGEE INFLUXES. IT IMPLIES CONTINUED FINANCIAL SUPPORT OF UNHOR AND OTHER ORGANIZATIONS INVOLVED IN MITIGATING THE SUFFERING OF REFUGEES AND THEIR IMPACT ON COUNTRIES OF ASYLUM.

MR. CHAIRMAN, IF WE LOOK BACK OVER THE PAST FEW EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MEETINGS, AN INTERESTING PATTERN EMERGES. FROM 1978 TO 1980 THE FOCUS WAS ON THE MAJOR CRISES TO WHICH I HAVE ALLUDED - THE BOAT PEOPLE AND THE OTHER REFUGEES OF SOUTH EAST ASIA, THE MASSIVE MOVEMENT FROM AFGHANISTAN, THE VICTIMS OF STRIFE IN CENTRAL AMERICA AND THE TRAGIC PLIGHT OF REFUGEES IN MANY PARTS OF AFRICA. IN 1981 AND 1982 ATTENTION SHIFTED TO THE SHAPE AND EFFECTIVENESS OF THE OFFICE OF THE UNHCR ITSELF, WHICH WAS, GOING THROUGH A RAPID AND OFTEN PAINFUL PERIOD OF GROWTH AND TRANSITION. THAT PROCESS NOW SEEMS WELL

ACCORDINGLY, IT IS GENERALLY RECOGNIZED ADVANCED. THAT THE UNHCR HAS IMPLEMENTED FUNDAMENTAL CHANGES IN AREAS AS DIVERSE AS ORGANIZATIONAL STRUCTURE, MANAGEMENT, FLOW OF INFORMATION AND FIELD OPERATIONS. THESE AND MANY OTHER CHANGES ARE VIEWED WITH A GREAT DEAL OF SATISFACTION BY THE MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. FURTHERMORE, WE WELCOME THE MORE ACTIVE RELATIONSHIP BETWEEN THE UNHCR AND ITS EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE. WHILE THESE CHANGES ARE STILL VERY RECENT, THERE ARE INDICATIONS THAT THEY HAVE ALREADY LED TO POSITIVE RESULTS. THIS IS ENCOURAGING AS FAR AS FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS ARE CONCERNED. IT IS + CANADA S VIEW THAT WE MUST NOW FOCUS OUR ATTENTION TO THE ENORMOUS AND COMPLEX TASK WHICH REMAINS - THROUGH - ENCOURAGEMENT OF REPATRIATION, FACILITATION OF LOCAL INTEGRATION IN COUNTRIES OF ASYLUM, -RESETTLEMENT IN THIRD COUNTRIES AND-FINDING WAYS IN WHICH

TRADITIONAL DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE CAN LESSEN THE LIKELIHOOD AND THE IMPACT OF REFUGEE SITUATIONS.

MR. CHAIRMAN, WE IN CANADA HAVE BEEN DEEPLY TROUBLED BY THE PROBLEM OF PROVIDING INTERNATIONAL PROTECTION TO REFUGEES, A PROBLEM WHICH IS THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S MOST ELEMENTARY CONCERN. A FEW YEARS AGO, WHEN A NUMBER OF REFUGEE CRISES WERE DEVELOPING, WE MIGHT HAVE BEEN INCLINED TO SPECULATE THAT ASSISTANCE ACTIVITIES SHOULD BECOME THE OFFICE'S MAIN CONCERN. HOWEVER, AS ADVERSE ECONOMIC AND SOCIO-POLITICAL PRESSURES HAVE INCREASED IN MANY COUNTRIES IT HAS BECOME CLEAR THAT REFUGEE PROTECTION IS THE SINE QUA NON OF ALL OTHER ENDEAVOURS TO ASSIST REFUGEES. WITHOUT ADEQUATE PROTECTION NOTHING ELSE WILL HOLD.

WE HAVE JUST (COME THROUGH) A SESSION OF THE SUB-COMMITTEE ON PROTECTION WHICH DEALT WITH A NUMBER OF DIFFICULT ISSUES: THE IMPACT OF MANIFESTLY UNFOUNDED CLAIMS TO REFUGEE STATUS, RESCUE OF ASYLUM SEEKERS AT SEA AND THE PREVENTION OF MILITARY

ATTACKS ON REFUGEE CAMPS. CONSENSUS ON THE PROBLEM
OF MILITARY ATTACKS HAS ELUDED US. THE VERY
DIFFICULT NATURE OF ALL THESE ITEMS AND THE CHALLENGE
INVOLVED IN REACHING AGREEMENT IS AN AFFIRMATION OF
THE IMPORTANCE AND RELEVANCE OF PROTECTION ISSUES TO
ALL COUNTRIES.

ON THE SUBJECT OF MILITARY ATTACKS, ONE MAY ARGUE THAT THE MATTER SHOULD BE TAKEN UP IN OTHER ORGANS OF THE UN SYSTEM. THE FACT IS THAT IT HAS NOT BEEN TAKEN UP ELSEWHERE. FURTHER, WHATEVER THE UNHCR'S ROLE, IT IS UNTHINKABLE THAT THE MEMBERS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE LET THIS TRAGIC PROBLEM GO UNADDRESSED. IN THE SHORT TIME IT HAS BEEN UNDER CONSIDERATION, MANY USEFUL ELEMENTS HAVE BEEN in our over demill IDENTIFIED. IT IS IMPORTANT) THAT THE WORK CONTINUE. WE MUST NOT ALLOW ARBITRARY TIME CONSTRAINTS TO whenl INTERFERE WITH THE PROGRESS ACHIEVED. EVEN IF IT - 0 -m TAKES ANOTHER YEAR TO DEVELOP A SET OF GENERALLY ACCEPTABLE CONCLUSIONS IT WILL BE WELL WORTH THE EFFORT.

MR. CHAIRMAN, FROM THE "NOTE ON INTERNATIONAL PROTECTION" WHICH WE WILL BE EXAMINING INDEPTH LATER THIS WEEK, IT IS CLEAR THAT THE UNHOR CONTINUES TO EMPHASIZE THE PROMOTION OF VARIOUS LEGAL INSTRUMENTS FOR THE PROTECTION OF REFUGEES ON TWO FRONTS - BY ENCOURAGING BROADER ADHERENCE TO THE EXISTING INSTRUMENT AND BY PROMOTING THE DEVELOPMENT OF NEW MEASURES TO FILL GAPS IN THE INTERNATIONAL LEGAL REGIME. IN THIS REGARD WE MUST PAY TRIBUTE TO THE VERY CREATIVE ROLE THAT HAS BEEN PLAYED BY THE INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE OF HUMANITARIAN LAW AT SAN REMO.

THE EMPHASIS ON LEGAL REMEDIES TO PROTECTION PROBLEMS IS CORRECT AND NEEDS TO BE PURSUED BUT EVEN IN REGIONS WHERE REFUGEE LAW IS WELL-DEVELOPED IT IS NO LONGER ENOUGH. THE CHALLENGE TO THOSE CONCERNED WITH REFUGEE PROTECTION IN THE NEXT YEAR OR TWO WILL BE TO ENSURE THAT THEY CAN IDENTIFY AND PROTECT THE GENUINE REFUGEE IN THE TIDE OF HUMANITY WHICH IS ON THE MOVE. THERE ARE LITERALLY MILLIONS OF PEOPLE TODAY WHO HAVE BEEN MOTIVATED BY ECONOMIC CONDITIONS TO SEEK THEIR FORTUNE IN OTHER COUNTRIES OR REGIONS.

AT ONE TIME THIS WAS THOUGHT TO BE A SIMPLE SOUTH TO

NORTH PHENOMENON. THE SEMINAR ON "UNDOCUMENTED

MIGRANTS" SPONSORED THIS YEAR BY THE

INTERGOVERNMENTAL COMMITTEE FOR MIGRATION AND THE

ROUND TABLE ON "MOVEMENTS OF PEOPLE" SPONSORED BY THE

INTERNATIONAL INSTITUTE HAVE DEMONSTRATED THAT THIS

IS A GLOBAL PHENOMENON.

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LEGAL CHALLENGE OF IMMENSE COMPLEXITY FOR REFUGEE

PROTECTION. (ACCORDINGLY,) THE UNHCR MUST COME TO

GRIPS WITH THE FACT THAT WHILE THE EMPHASIS ON

INTERNATIONAL LEGAL INSTRUMENTS IS IMPORTANT, THESE

CAN TAKE SOME TIME TO PUT IN PLACE. MEANWHILE

CHANGES IN IMMIGRATION LAW MAY OCCUR OVERNIGHT THAT

CAN HARM THE INTERESTS OF REFUGEES. IN THE YEARS

AHEAD WE SEE NO ALTERNATIVE BUT FOR THE UNHCR TO BE

MORE ACTIVE IN PROVIDING PROTECTION TO REFUGEES AT

THE FIELD LEVEL. NEW, FLEXIBLE AND IMAGINATIVE

PROTECTION TECHNIQUES MUST BE DEVELOPED AS A MATTER

OF PRIORITY.

WE HAVE ADVISED THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE IN PREVIOUS SESSIONS THAT CANADA IS USING ITS RESETTLEMENT PROGRAM INCREASINGLY AND MORE PURPOSEFULLY AS A PROTECTION TOOL. WE WILL HAVE MORE TO SAY ABOUT THIS WHEN RESETTLEMENT IS DISCUSSED UNDER THE AGENDA ITEM ON "ASSISTANCE ACTIVITIES". I WISH TO TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO THANK THE HIGH COMMISSIONER FOR HIS INVALUABLE SUPPORT WITH REGARD TO OUR ANNUAL REFUGEE INTAKE PLANNING EXERCISE. HIS ADVICE HAS ASSISTED CANADA IN GIVING PRIORITY IN ITS REFUGEE QUOTA TO THOSE REFUGEES IN GREATEST NEED OF RESETTLEMENT. WE ARE ENCOURAGED TO NOTE THAT THE UNHCR IS PROVIDING SIMILAR ADVICE TO OTHER GOVERNMENTS. IT IS OUR HOPE THAT THIS WILL LEAD TO A MORE ACTIVE COORDINATION ROLE BY THE UNHCR WHICH WILL ENSURE THAT SCARCE RESETTLEMENT OPPORTUNITIES ARE PUT TO OPTIMUM USE.

MR. CHAIRMAN, I AM SURE YOU WILL UNDERSTAND

IF I TAKE THIS OPPORTUNITY TO PLACE ON RECORD THE

VALUABLE CONTRIBUTION OF CANADA'S CHURCHES AND NON

GOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS IN SPONSORING THE

ADMISSION OF REFUGEES TO CANADA; THUS INCREASING
CANADA'S OVERALL RESETTLEMENT EFFORT. UNDER OUR
SYSTEM, THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA SETS AN ANNUAL
TARGET FOR REFUGEE ADMISSIONS WHICH INDICATES WHAT
OUR MINIMUM COMMITMENT WILL BE. HOWEVER, REFUGEES
SPONSORED BY PRIVATE GROUPS ARE ADMITTED TO CANADA
OVER AND ABOVE THE GOVERNMENT QUOTA. LAST YEAR 4,000
EXTRA REFUGEES WERE RESETTLED IN CANADA THANKS TO
PRIVATE EFFORTS.

MR. CHAIRMAN, OUR EXAMINATION OF THE FUTURE OF UNHCR AND THE REFUGEE CRISIS WILL BE AIDED BY THE REPORT ON "REFUGEE AID AND DEVELOPMENT" SUBMITTED BY THE EXPERT GROUP WHO MET IN AUGUST. WE WILL ADDRESS THE REPORT IN SOME DETAIL UNDER THE ITEM ON DURABLE SOLUTIONS.

WE SUBSCRIBE TO THE IDEA THAT REFUGEES WHO
HAVE BEEN INTEGRATED OR RETURNEES WHO HAVE BEEN
REPATRIATED SHOULD HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO BUILD UPON
THE ASSISTANCE GIVEN TO THEM ONCE THE ROLE OF THE
UNHOR HAS CEASED. THIS IS WHY WE WISH TO

ENCOURAGE CENTRAL PLANNING AUTHORITIES AND MINISTRIES
OF INVOLVED COUNTRIES AS WELL AS VOLUNTARY AGENCIES,
INTERGOVERNMENTAL ORGANIZATIONS AND BILATERAL DONORS
TO EXTEND DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE TO COMMUNITIES WHERE
REFUGEES HAVE INTEGRATED. WE FEEL THAT THE LINKAGES
BETWEEN RELIEF AND DEVELOPMENT ARE IMPORTANT TO
MAINTAIN AND TO PREVENT THE RECURRENCE OF REFUGEE
MOVEMENTS AND TO ALLEVIATE THE BURDEN IMPOSED ON
LOCAL POPULATIONS BY ADDITIONAL REFUGEES.

NEVERTHELESS, IN OUR EXAMINATION OF THE

ASSISTANCE - DEVELOPMENT LINKAGE WE MUST NOT ALLOW

OURSELVES TO FALL VICTIM TO THE ILLUSION THAT WE CAN

SIMPLY BUY OUR WAY OUT OF REFUGEE PROBLEMS. WHEN ALL

IS SAID AND DONE IT IS THE CONCERTED POLITICAL WILL

OF CONCERNED GOVERNMENTS THAT WILL LEAD TO LASTING

COMPREHENSIVE SOLUTIONS TO REFUGEE PROBLEMS.

I WOULD NOW LIKE TO PROVIDE YOU WITH OUR VIEWS ON SOME OF THE SPECIFIC REFUGEE SITUATIONS THAT

ARE OF CONCERN TO US TODAY. IN ADDRESSING REFUGEE PROBLEMS, ESPECIALLY IN DEVELOPING COUNTRIES, WE RECOGNIZE THAT IT IS IMPORTANT FOR THE UNHOR TO SELECT THE RIGHT LEVEL OF ASSISTANCE AND THE RIGHT TECHNOLOGICAL INPUTS AND TO FIND AN APPROPRIATE BALANCE BETWEEN REFUGEES AND THE LOCAL COMMUNITY. SUCCESSFUL PROGRAMMES IN LOCAL INTEGRATION AND REPATRIATION SERVE AS AN ENCOURAGEMENT TO CONTINUE TO PRESS FOR SUCH SOLUTIONS. WE FULLY SUPPORT THE UNHOR'S EFFORTS AT IMPROVING PROGRAMME DELIVERY AND LIMITING IMPLEMENTATION SETBACKS.

LOOKING AT THE SITUATION IN AFRICA,

VOLUNTARY REPATRIATION TO ETHIOPIA AND UGANDA AS WELL

AS SUCCESSFUL LOCAL INTEGRATION PROJECTS IN SUDAN,

TANZANIA, AND ZAIRE (TO NAME ONLY A FEW) HAVE BEEN

TANGIBLE EXAMPLES OF CONSTRUCTIVE DEVELOPMENTS.

NEXT YEAR, THE INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCE ON ASSISTANCE TO REFUGEES IN AFRICA (ICARA II) WILL PROVIDE THE OPPORTUNITY TO GO BEYOND A NARROW FOCUS ON REFUGEE RELIEF AND TO INCLUDE REFUGEES IN THE

CONTEXT OF THE BROADER DEVELOPMENT EFFORTS OF AFRICAN STATES. WE HOPE ICARA II WILL RESULT IN A COMMITMENT ON THE PART OF THE PARTICIPATING COUNTRIES TO SOLVE EXISTING REFUGEE PROBLEMS BY PURSUING A NORMALIZATION OF THEIR STATUS AND LIVING CONDITIONS. THE DEVELOPMENT OF POLITICAL UNDERSTANDINGS COULD LEAD TO THE PREVENTION OF FURTHER MASS EXODUSES. IT WILL BE SOME TIME BEFORE WE ARE ABLE TO MEASURE THE ACTUAL SUCCESS OF THE APPROACH TO BE ADOPTED THROUGH ICARA II. HOWEVER, WE ARE HOPEFUL THAT THIS CONFERENCE WILL PRODUCE EXAMPLES OF THE INTEGRATION OF RELIEF ASSISTANCE AND DEVELOPMENT AID WHICH CAN BE REPLICATED IN ALL PARTS OF THE WORLD.

IN LATIN AMERICA, WE HAVE WITNESSED SOME
IMPROVEMENT IN THE CONDITION OF REFUGEES, EVEN WHERE
DURABLE SOLUTIONS HAVE BEEN DIFFICULT TO IDENTIFY.
THE PROVISION OF PROTECTION TO REFUGEES IN CENTRAL
AMERICA STILL REMAINS WORRISOME. HOWEVER, DESPITE
THE FRAGILITY OF THE POLITICAL SITUATION IN

THIS AREA, EFFORTS AT ALLOWING THE REFUGEES TO RETURN TO A NORMAL LIFE THROUGH INTEGRATION INTO AGRICULTURAL SETTLEMENTS AND URBAN AREAS IN COUNTRIES SUCH AS COSTA RICA AND NICARAGUA ARE ENCOURAGING. I WISH TO STRESS HOWEVER, THAT WHEREVER REFUGEES CANNOT BECOME TOTALLY SELF-SUFFICIENT, ASSISTANCE ACTIVITIES SHOULD BE AIMED AT PROVIDING THEM WITH THE MEANS TO REDUCE THEIR DEPENDENCE ON RELIEF.

IN PAKISTAN WE NOTE THE STABILIZATION OF THE AFGHAN REFUGEE SITUATION. REGRETTABLY IT APPEARS THAT PAKISTAN WILL HAVE TO SUSTAIN THE BURDEN OF LARGE NUMBERS OF REFUGEES AT LEAST FOR THE FORESEEABLE FUTURE. FOR THIS REASON, WE SUPPORT THE INITIATIVES UNDERTAKEN BY PAKISTAN, THE UNHER, THE WORLD BANK AND THE ILO TO GENERATE ECONOMIC ACTIVITY WITHIN THE REFUGEE POPULATION. WE HOPE THAT THESE EFFORTS, PARTICULARLY THOSE AIMED AT RESTORING THE ENVIRONMENT, WILL BE BENEFICIAL TO BOTH THE REFUGEES AND THE LOCAL POPULATION.

REMAINS, OF COURSE, A KEY COMPONENT IN SOLVING THIS SOLVING THIS SOLVING THIS PROBLEM. WE ARE GRATEFUL TO THE HIGH COMMISSIONER

FOR HIS LETTER OF JULY 22 AND PERCEIVE IT AS A MAJOR INITIATIVE REFLECTING THE APPROACH OUTLINED IN HIS STATEMENT TODAY. HIS LETTER PUT BEFORE GOVERNMENTS THE FULL RANGE OF OPTIONS WHICH MUST BE EXAMINED AND ASSESSED. IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT WE ATTEMPT TO FIND THE APPROPRIATE COMBINATION OF MEASURES THAT WILL RESULT IN THE SUCCESSFUL RESOLUTION OF THIS ISSUE.

IN ALL OF THESE MAJOR CRISES, AND IN THE WIDE RANGE OF SMALLER REFUGEE SITUATIONS WITH WHICH THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S STAFF MUST GRAPPLE DAILY, THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MUST CONCENTRATE ITS ATTENTION ON THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE TECHNIQUES AND METHODS EMPLOYED IN THE SEARCH FOR SOLUTIONS. NEVERTHELESS WE ARE VERY COGNIZANT OF THE FACT THAT EFFECTIVE PROGRAM DELIVERY DOES NOT REST ON THE EXPRESSION OF GOOD INTENTIONS AND APPROPRIATE ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURES ALONE. THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S OFFICE MUST COUNT ON

EXPERIENCED, QUALIFIED AND COMMITTED PERSONNEL AT ALL LEVELS. FOR THIS REASON WE SUPPORT UNHOR MEASURES AIMED AT RATIONALIZING AND IMPROVING PERSONNEL POLICIES RELATING TO RECRUITMENT, TRAINING, ROTATIONALITY, CLASSIFICATION, PROMOTIONS AND CONDITIONS OF SERVICE IN THE FIELD. SUCH POLICIES MUST RESPECT THE RELEVANT GENERAL ASSEMBLY RESOLUTIONS. WE BELIEVE THAT ABOVE ALL ELSE PERSONNEL POLICIES MUST RECOGNIZE INDIVIDUAL MERIT AND QUALIFICATIONS. IN AN ORGANIZATION SUCH AS THE HIGH COMMISSIONER'S THE NEED FOR PROGRESSIVE AND ENLIGHTNNED PERSONNEL PRACTICES CANNOT BE OVERSTRESSED.

AS I HAVE INDICATED WE BELIEVE IT IS TIME TO SHIFT THE MAIN FOCUS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEES' ATTENTION AWAY FROM THE INTERNAL ORGANIZATION AND OPERATIONS OF THE OFFICE OF THE HIGH COMMISSIONER. WE MUST DIRECT OUR ATTENTION TO THE MAJOR REFUGEE SITUATIONS THAT HAVE PERSISTED FOR SO LONG. THE HIGH COMMISSIONER HAS SIGNALED HIS DETERMINATION TO FIND SOLUTIONS TO THESE PROBLEMS. THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE MUST LEND ENERGETIC SUPPORT TO HIS EFFORTS.
