

ENTRANCE

There are two Entrance Examinations each year, viz., in June and in December. These Examinations are under the control of the Education Department of the Province. The following are the subjects of examination :

- 1. **Reading and Literature.**—Gage's New Fourth Reader. Longfellow's *Evangeline*, and Lamb's *Tales from Shakespere*.
- Writing and Book-keeping.—Gage's series of copy-books, Nos. 7, 8, 9 and 10. Legibility and precision required in all manuscript work.
- 3. Drawing.-Blair's Canadian Drawing Series, Books IV and V.
- Language.—Pronunciation, spelling, and meaning of ordinary words of text-books, including marking of accents and vowel sounds. Composition as in Sykes' Elementary Composition, pages 1-130. Grammar as in Goggin's Elementary Grammar.
- 5. Arithmetic.—As in Kirkland and Scott's Elementary Arithmetic.
- 6. Algebra (Oral).-The four fundamental rules.
- 7. Geography.—As in Gage's New Canadian Geography, with British Columbia Supplement.
- 8. **History.**—English and Canadian as in Robertson's Public School History of England and Canada, with British Columbia supplement.
- Nature Lessons.—(a.) Physiology, as in Pathfinder No. 2. (b.) Instruction to be given on the subject-matter covered by the topical outline on page VI of Brittain's Nature Lessons, omitting sections E, F, G and H. The method of instruction to follow closely the suggestions of the same book, pp. 6-70.

To gain admission, candidates must obtain at least $33\frac{1}{3}$ per cent. on each subject, and not less than an average of 50 per cent. on all subjects.

Candidates who have been unable to attend the regular entrance examination, may, on application to the Principal, obtain a special examination.

Teachers of the Public Schools who have already obtained certificates by examination in the Province may be admitted as pupils without being required to pass an entrance examination.

CLASSIFICATION

The institution has a High School and a University Department. In the former there are three divisions : preliminary, junior, and matriculation (intermediate); in the latter two, first year in arts and second year in arts. The High School divisions contain as many sections as the enrolment makes necessary. Admission is to the lowest section, unless the candidate can show his fitness to enter a higher. The work of each division is estimated to occupy an academic year.

COURSES

The **general** aim of the institution is to provide the elements of a sound education. It also prepares students for either a **Business** or a **Professional** life.

Commercial Training.—There are two special Commercial Courses open, respectively, to students who have completed one and two years' work of the ordinary curriculum. Both courses include Stenography and Typewriting, in addition to Commercial Arithmetic, Book-keeping, Commercial Forms, Banking, Customs Broking, and all the ordinary transactions of mercantile life. The Senior Course, besides demanding from students a higher standard of expertness and proficiency than is set for students of the Junior Course, covers also the study of such legislation as deals with Commerce, e. g., Contracts, Exemptions, Joint Stock Companies, Landlord and Tenant, Insolvency, Outlawry, Mortgages, Personal Property and Real Estate, Succession Duties, Liens, Collection of Accounts, etc. A Junior and a Senior Diploma, respectively, will be granted to students who complete these courses.

Teachers' Certificates.—Students preparing for Teachers' Certificates follow the ordinary curriculum, the Junior, Matriculation, First Year, and Second Year examinations being recognized as meeting the non-professional requirements of Third Class, Second Class, First Class, and Academic Certificates, respectively.

Matriculation and Leaving Certificates.—Prospective students in Arts, Law, Medicine, Theology, and Applied Science are prepared for matriculation in these several Faculties, the curriculum for the "Matriculation" Division being adapted exclusively to the requirements of such students. Vancouver College being affiliated to McGill University, the examinations taken are those of that University, but such examinations are accepted generally as qualifying for admission to **other Universities**. Matriculation in Arts indicating the completion of the High School Course, Leaving Certificates are granted to such matriculants.

First and Second Years in Arts.—Under affiliation, a duplicate of the First and Second Years' Courses in Arts is given here, and the examination papers are set and marked by the McGill Examining Board. The University Authorities strongly recommend intending students of other Faculties to take one or two years in Arts, in the interests of their general education.

Partial Students.—As in McGill University, the Courses are open to Partial Students, *i.e.*, those who, while not having passed the Entrance Examination, are qualified to benefit by the instruction. In the case of Vancouver College, this provision is applicable only to the Matriculation, First Year, and Second Year Courses.

- 2. Geometry.-Euclid, Books IV and VI, with definitions of Book V, and easy deductions (Hall and Stevens).
- 3. *Trigonometry.*—Measurement of Angles, Trigonometrical Ratios of one Angle, of two Angles, and of a Multiple Angle (Hall and Knight).
- **C.** Science.—1. *Physiography*.—The Elements (Tarr).
 - 2. Botany .-- The Elements (Groom). Plant collections.
 - 3. *Chemistry.*—Elementary Inorganic Chemistry, comprising the preparation and properties of the chief non-metallic elements and their more important compounds, the laws of chemical action, combining weight, etc. (Remsen).
 - 4. *Physics.*—As in Gage's Introduction to Physical Science, Chapters I to V.
- D. Classics.—1. Latin.—Grammar; Translation at Sight; Prose Composition (based upon the prescribed texts). Nepos, Lives of Themistocles and Aristides; Cæsar, De Bello Gallico, IV (omitting c. 17) and V, 1-23; Virgil, Æneid II, 1-505.
 - Greek.—Grammar; Translation at Sight; Prose Composition (based upon the prescribed text). Xenophon, Anabasis I (as in White's Beginners' Greek Book, pp. 304-428), or Anabasis II.
- E. Modern Languages.—1. French.—Grammar, Accidence and Syntax (Bertenshaw); Translation at Sight from French into English; Translation into French of easy English passages; Reproduction in French of stories read in English.
 - 2. German.—Grammar, thorough knowledge of Accidence; English into German, as in Vandersmissen's High School German Grammar, First Part. Leander, Traumerejen.

UNIVERSITY DEPARTMENT

FIRST YEAR IN ARTS (SENIOR) DIVISION

- A. English.—I. English.—Composition, English Language, and Literature.
 - (a) Lectures, chiefly synthetical, with special reference to the use or words and the construction of sentences and paragraphs. Regular Essays (Nichol's Manual).
 - (b) Origin of English and its relation to other languages. Leading features of English at the main stages of its development. Study of illustrative extracts from English authors. Toller's Outlines o the History of the English Language.
 - (c) Critical studies of the leading prose Essayists of England from Bacon to Goldsmith.
 - II. *History.*—The main epochs of European History. The chief features of racial, political, and social progress illustrated from Ancient, Mediæval, and Modern History. Essays on historical subjects at regular intervals (European History—Adams).
- B. Mathematical and Physical Sciences.-I. Mathematics.-(a) Arithmetic
 - (b) Algebra.-Hall and Knight, omitting chapters 36, 40, 41, 42.
 - (c) Geometry.—Euclid, Books I, II, III, IV, VI (omitting propositions 27, 28, 29), with definitions of Book V (Hall and Stevens).
 - (d) Trigonometry.—Elementary Trigonometry (Hall and Knight); nature and use of Logarithms.
 - II. Physics.—The most important principles treated with reference to their historical development and mutual relations, with concrete illustration by means of apparatus in the laboratory (Balfour Stewart's Elementary Physics).
- C. Classics.-I. Latin.-(a) A general review of grammatical principles.
 - (b) The following texts: Cicero, Selections from Correspondence (Kirtland); Ovid, Elegiac Selections (Smith); Sallust, Catiline (Summers).
 - (c) Composition.—Written and oral (North and Hillard).
 - (d) Translation at sight (Turner).
 - (e) History.-Carthaginian Wars, B.C. 263-146 ("Rome and Carthage," Longmans).
 - II. Greek .- The course will not be given this year.
- D. Modern Languages.-I. French.-(a) Macmillan's Third French Course.
 - (b) The following texts: Mérimée, Colomba; Augier, Le Gendre de M. Poirier: Fortier, Sept Grands Auteurs du XIX Siecle; Historiettes Modernes, Vol. I; Lamartine, Scenes de la Révolution Française; Lafontaine, Fables; Daudet, Trois Contes Choisis.

- II. German.-(a) Colloquial Exercises.
- (b) Grammar (Joynes-Meissner).
- (c) Composition (Horning).
- (d) The following texts: Deutsche Novelletten, Vol. II; Schiller, Maria Stuart; Freytag, Die Journalisten; Gutzkow, Zopf und Schwert.

SECOND YEAR IN ARTS (ACADEMIC) DIVISION

- A. English.—Literature.— An outline from the Anglo-Saxon Period to the present day. The general subject, divided into Pre-Chaucerian, Italian, French, and Popular Periods, will be approached for the most part through literary types. Morley's Charts of English Literature will be used. Fortnightly Essays will be required on subjects set in connection with the course.
- B. Mathematics, including Dynamics.—I. Mathematics.—(a) Algebra.—Exponential and Logarithmic Series, Undetermined Coefficients, Partial Fractions, Elementary Theory of Probabilities, Elements of Determinants (Hall and Knight's Higher Algebra).
 - (b) Geometry.—Conic Sections; Solid Geometry, Euclid, Book XI and first two propositions of Book XII.
 - (c) Spherical Trigonometry.—Solution of Spherical Triangles, with proofs of the necessary preliminary propositions and formulæ (Wilson's Solid Geometry and Conic Sections).
 - II. Dynamics.—The course is chiefly experimental, and deals with: Range and Time of Flight of Projectiles, Morin's Machine, Laws of Direct Impact of Elastic Bodies, Simple Harmonic Motion, Simple and Compound Pendulum, Determination of Gravity, Moments of Inertia and their Experimental Determination, Moment of Momentum and Energy of a Rotating Body.
- C. Classics.—I. Latin.—(a) The following texts: Quintilian, X, c. 1 (Peterson, Clar. Press, Smaller Edition); Livy, Book II (Conway); Horace, Selected Odes (Wickham); Virgil, Æneid VII, VIII (Sidgwick).
 - (b) Composition and Translation at sight (North and Hillard, and Ritchie).
 - (c) History.—The Last Century of the Republic, B.C. 133-31 ("The Gracchi, Marius, and Sulla," and "The Roman Triumvirates," Longmans).
 - (d) Literature.-The subject-matter of Quintilian X, c. 1, §§ 37-131.
 - II. Greek .- The course will not be given this year.

- D. Modern Languages.—I. French.—(a) The following texts: Racine, Andromaque; Corneille, Le Cid; Hugo, Les Misérables; Loti, Pêcheurs d'Islande; Pages Choisies des Mémoires du Duc de Saint Simon; Moliere, Le Bourgeois Gentilhomme; Mansion, Petite Esquisse de la Litérature Française.
 - (b) Composition .- Bertenshaw and Janau's Manual.
 - (c) Historical French Grammar, about six lectures.
 - (d) Equivalents for oral work will be stated on application.
 - II. German.-(a) Grammar (Joynes-Meissner).
 - (b) Composition (Horning).
 - (c) The following texts: Hauff, Lichtenstein; Lessing, Nathan der Weise; Schiller, Jungfrau von Orleans; Freytag, Aus dem Jahrhundert des Groszen Krieges; Schiller, Ballads; Goethe, Goetz von Berlichingen; Keller, Bilder aus der Deutschen Literatur.
- E. Mental Philosophy.—I. Psychology.—A discussion of the phenomena of sensation and the elementary process of mental evolution. An introduction to the principles and methods involved in the study of more advanced philosophical problems and to the leading works in psychological literature (Murray's Handbook of Psychology, Book I.
 - II. Logic.—The application of logical processes to actual discussion, with special attention to common fallacies exemplified in literature and daily life (Hyslop's Elements of Logic).

Provision for courses in Chemistry and in Biology is under consideration.

EXAMINATIONS AND PROMOTIONS

Promotions.—In addition to the Christmas and June Terminal Examinations, frequent minor examinations are held, all of which, together with class recitations and home exercises, are duly considered in making promotions from the Preliminary to the Junior Division. Promotions from the Junior Division are determined by the examination of the Provincial Education Department, and from the Matriculation and First Year Divisions by the examinations of McGill University.

Conditioned Students.—Students of the Preliminary Division whose aggregate marks are sufficiently high for promotion, but who fall below the minimum mark in not more than two subjects, are "conditioned" in such subjects, *i.e.*, must at the opening of the next Session satisfy the Instructor of their fitness to take up the work of the Junior Division.

EQUIPMENT

The Vancouver College is provided with a good general Library of Reference, and with Chemical and Physical Laboratories sufficient for the demands of the Courses. It also has a Gymnasium. The students have a Debating and Literary Society and an Athletic Association, and arrangements are being made for the organization of a Cadet Corps.

PRIZES

The medal offered by His Excellency the Governor-General to "the head of the school" is awarded to the student standing highest in the University June Matriculation Examination in Arts.

The McGill Graduates' Society of British Columbia offers a prize of Fifty Dollars to "the best Matriculant from the Province."

Book Prizes are offered by friends of the University for competition at the University Sessional Examinations in April.

RESIDENCE

No residential accommodation is provided in the College, but a list of suitable boarding and lodging houses may be obtained on application to the Principal.
