Examination Schedules (P.6246)

The following statement concerning examination schedules had been circulated for information:-

"There was discussion at the meeting of Senate held November 13, 1974 (Minutes, P.6246) of the desirability of adjusting the examination timetable to avoid multiple exams on the same day for as many students as possible. The use of a computer to equalize spacings was suggested.

Steps have been taken by the Systems Services Office and the Computing Centre to experiment with improved methods before the examinations of April, 1975. One or more algorithms will be tried on the December, 1974 data, and the results presented to the Registrar's Office for a decision on their merits.

These attemps are unlikely to be greeted with universal acclaim. For one thing, the greater the success in equal spacing of examinations, the more students will find their last exam in the final day or two of the exam period preventing an early departure for vacation employment or travel. Also, there is a conflict with the need to schedule large classes fairly early to give faculty

members reasonable opportunities for marking before the Registrar's deadlines. Further, there are special problems with exams that require special facilities, or for which a faculty member has requested avoidance of certain dates.

In short, the criteria for optimizing the timetable have not been fully specified by the University."

The following outline of proposed curriculum changes for implementation in the 1975-76 Academic Year was submitted by the Faculty of Medicine:

First Year

- To allow for earlier introduction of clinical material a start of Pathology and Microbiology in second phase of second term of First Year, Pathology to conclude at the end of the first term of Second Year.
- To allow for the earlier introduction of Pathology and Microbiology, Anatomy and Biochemistry to conclude at the end of the first phase of second term of First Year. The final examinations in Anatomy and Biochemistry will be at that time.

Curriculum Committee

Faculty of Medicine

First Year (continued)

- 3. To accomplish this it is necessary to lengthen the second term of First Year by three weeks, and divide it into two phases of nine weeks each.
- 4. Physiology will continue to be taught throughout First Year.
- 5. Though the Committee recommends that Biochemistry 410 be a prerequisite and be replaced by an appropriate Biochemistry course for medical and dental students, it feels it would be inappropriate to implement this proposal at a time when a head of Biochemistry has not been appointed. They propose that Biochemistry 410 continue for a further year, and 411 and 412 continue to be offered as electives.
- 6. Behavioural Sciences. The proposals allow the introduction of such a course within the first term of First Year, but are not dependent upon this. Firm proposals are not yet able to be brought to Faculty.

Second Year

- 1. The present formal pre-medical Second Year teaching will be concluded by the end of first term.
- 2. The second term will now consist largely of clinical work (bedside clinics, wardwork and clinical (systems) lectures) and will continue into the two terms of Third Year.
- 3. The clinical aspects of Pharmacology (e.g. Therapeutics) and Microbiology will be allotted time within the clinical (systems) lectures as appropriate.

Third Year

1. Present format will continue in first term.

Third Year (continued)

 In the second term, three afternoons a week will be set aside for electives in basic science areas. On the other two afternoons wardwork will include attendance at specialty clinics, e.g. V.D., Radiotherapy, Arthritis, T.B., Rehabilitation.

Fourth Year

Clinical Clerkship should be 52 weeks.

Independent Study

To encourage habits of self education, up to one third of the time is made available for independent study and electives. The arrangement for this time varies, in each year, being formally identified in First and Second Year, but in Third Year one afternoon per week is unscheduled and in addition, wardwork usually does not occupy all the scheduled time.

It is recommended that formal teaching on Saturdays be abandoned.

Feasibility of Proposals

The proposals have been examined by the subcommittees for First and Second Years, and sample timetables have been prepared and approved. In Third Year the proposals have been approved in principle, but the detailed scheduling of lectures and clinics will be considered by the Third Year Committee. The arrangements for the basic science electives will require consideration by representatives of the basic science departments.

The Clinical Clerk Subcommittee will examine proposals for the allocation of time within the Clerkship.

Co-ordination with Faculty of Dentistry

The proposals have been examined by the Faculty of Dentistry and are acceptable.

Co-ordination with other U.B.C. Timetables

Wherever possible, the existing timetabling has been retained to avoid difficult re-scheduling.

Dr. Hardwick) That the revised curriculum of the

In reply to a request for information on the proposed Behavioural Science course Dean Bates stated that the course, which would be called "Social Issues in Medicine", had been approved by the Faculty of Medicine curriculum committee and would be submitted to Senate in due course. The course would deal mostly with obvious social issues as they inter-relate to the work of the medical graduate including problems of the aging population and their care.

Dr. Hardwick read to Senate a letter received from Dr. Friedman which stated that when the proposed changes for First Year Medicine were passed by Faculty it was agreed that these were contingent on the preparation of an acceptable syllabus for the course in Behavioural

Science that could be passed by both the Faculty of Medicine and Senate in the normal manner; since no such syllabus had been presented the Department of Anatomy was not prepared to modify Anatomy 400 and 401 and abbreviate its own highly integrated courses in favour of an unknown course.

Dr. Johnstone, chairman of the Faculty of Medicine curriculum committee, commented that the letter was in error in that this was not what the Faculty of Medicine had agreed to.

In reply to a query as to when the course would be submitted for Senate approval Dean Bates stated that the Faculty committee was awaiting assurance of a time slot for this course.

The final report of the committee was presented by Dr. Daniells. The report outlined the various methods employed by Faculties and Schools to evaluate teaching. The committee concluded that there was no need to alert Faculties and Schools to their responsibilities in the matter of teaching evaluation, nor was there any possibility of imposing upon them a common method of tackling the problem. What was required was some means of interchanging the experience and opinion of the various Faculties and Schools and the provision of a forum where instruction and discussion may be available to staff members who would find them useful.

Examination Schedules (P.6246)

The following statement concerning examination schedules had been circulated for information: –

"There was discussion at the meeting of Senate held November 13, 1974 (Minutes, P.6246) of the desirability of adjusting the examination timetable to avoid multiple exams on the same day for as many students as possible. The use of a computer to equalize spacings was suggested.

Steps have been taken by the Systems Services Office and the Computing Centre to experiment with improved methods before the examinations of April, 1975. One or more algorithms will be tried on the December, 1974 data, and the results presented to the Registrar's Office for a decision on their merits.

These attemps are unlikely to be greeted with universal acclaim. For one thing, the greater the success in equal spacing of examinations, the more students will find their last exam in the final day or two of the exam period preventing an early departure for vacation employment or travel. Also, there is a conflict with the need to schedule large classes fairly early to give faculty

members reasonable opportunities for marking before the Registrar's deadlines. Further, there are special problems with exams that require special facilities, or for which a faculty member has requested avoidance of certain dates.

In short, the criteria for optimizing the timetable have not been fully specified by the University."

- To allow for the earlier introduction of Pathology and Microbiology, Anatomy and Biochemistry to conclude at the end of the first phase of second term of First Year. The final examinations in Anatomy and Biochemistry will be at that time.

First Year (continued)

- 3. To accomplish this it is necessary to lengthen the second term of First Year by three weeks, and divide it into two phases of nine weeks each.
- 4. Physiology will continue to be taught throughout First Year.
- 5. Though the Committee recommends that Biochemistry 410 be a prerequisite and be replaced by an appropriate Biochemistry course for medical and dental students, it feels it would be inappropriate to implement this proposal at a time when a head of Biochemistry has not been appointed. They propose that Biochemistry 410 continue for a further year, and 411 and 412 continue to be offered as electives.
- 6. Behavioural Sciences. The proposals allow the introduction of such a course within the first term of First Year, but are not dependent upon this. Firm proposals are not yet able to be brought to Faculty.

Second Year

- 1. The present formal pre-medical Second Year teaching will be concluded by the end of first term.
- 2. The second term will now consist largely of clinical work (bedside clinics, wardwork and clinical (systems) lectures) and will continue into the two terms of Third Year.
- 3. The clinical aspects of Pharmacology (e.g. Therapeutics) and Microbiology will be allotted time within the clinical (systems) lectures as appropriate.

Third Year

1. Present format will continue in first term.

 In the second term, three afternoons a week will be set aside for electives in basic science areas. On the other two afternoons wardwork will include attendance at specialty clinics, e.g. V.D., Radiotherapy, Arthritis, T.B., Rehabilitation.

Fourth Year

Clinical Clerkship should be 52 weeks.

Independent Study

To encourage habits of self education, up to one third of the time is made available for independent study and electives. The arrangement for this time varies, in each year, being formally identified in First and Second Year, but in Third Year one afternoon per week is unscheduled and in addition, wardwork usually does not occupy all the scheduled time.

It is recommended that formal teaching on Saturdays be abandoned.

Feasibility of Proposals

The proposals have been examined by the subcommittees for First and Second Years, and sample timetables have been prepared and approved. In Third Year the proposals have been approved in principle, but the detailed scheduling of lectures and clinics will be considered by the Third Year Committee. The arrangements for the basic science electives will require consideration by representatives of the basic science departments.

The Clinical Clerk Subcommittee will examine proposals for the allocation of time within the Clerkship.

Co-ordination with Faculty of Dentistry

The proposals have been examined by the Faculty of Dentistry and are acceptable.
