The new Museum of Anthropology, set facing the sea and the mountains on the UBC campus, will be officially opened by the Right Honourable Jules Leger, governor-general of Canada, on Sunday, May 30.

The opening marks the first time all the collections gathered over the years or donated to the museum will be able to be shared with the public. The museum will be open to the public beginning Tuesday, June 1.

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Parade of graduating students approaches site of Congregation ceremony in War Memorial Gymnasium.

3,400 to receive degrees

Congregation will be a memorable experience for many this year, including a pair playing the two leading roles.

This will be the first Congregation ceremony at which Dr. Douglas Kenny has officiated as president of the University and will also be the first Congregation presided over by UBC's chancellor, Donovan Miller.

Congregation ceremonies for 1976 graduates from UBC begin today (Wednesday) and continue until Friday.

Dr. Kenny was installed as UBC's 7th president last September. Mr. Miller was installed as UBC's 10th chancellor at the final day of last year's Congregation ceremonies.

As chancellor of the University, Mr. Miller confers all academic honorary degrees which have been previously

approved by the Senate, UBC's supreme academic body.

Also playing important roles will be 3,400 graduates who will be receiving academic degrees and six persons receiving honorary degrees.

The Congregation ceremony begins at 2:15 p.m. each day in the War Memorial Gymnasium and is followed by a reception in the cafeteria of the Student Union Building.

What follows is a day-by-day account of the degrees to be awarded:

Wednesday, May 26

Students graduating from UBC's largest faculty, the Faculty of Arts, will be granted doctor's degrees in musical arts; master's degrees in arts, fine arts, music, library science and social work; and bachelor's degrees in arts, fine arts, home economics, music and social work.

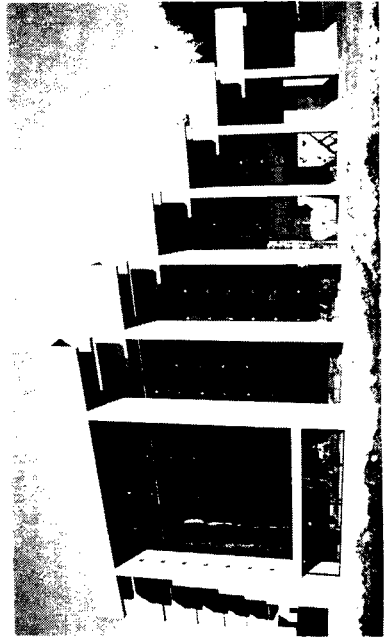
The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D.) will be conferred on Dr. Harry Hawthorn, who retires this year from UBC's Department of Anthropology and Sociology. Dr. Hawthorn, with his wife, Audrey, a curator of the new Museum of Anthropology which will be officially opened Sunday, May 30, assembled more than 10,000 northwest coast Indian artifacts which will be housed in the new museum.

Also receiving a Doctor of Laws degree will be Bill Reid who is renowned as a woodcarver and designer of jewellery in the Haida tradition.

Faculty salaries to be arbitrated

The University and the Faculty Association have reached accord on all aspects of a 1976-77 agreement except salaries, which will be resolved through binding arbitration.

Highlight of the new agreement is a revised section on leave of absence.

It provides for study leave of 12 months at 75 per cent of salary, instead of 60 per cent, provided such leave is taken after six years of service. If 12-month study leave is taken after four or five years, salary remains at 60 per cent.

The new agreement also provides for study leave of either six months or eight months, after four years of service, at 75 per cent of salary.

Any 12-month leave must start either July 1, Sept. 1 or Jan. 1. Six-month leave must start Jan. 1 or July 1, and eight-month leave must start Jan. 1 or May 1. Another change in the leave agreement calls for the faculty member, on returning from leave, to report in writing to the department head, director or dean on activities and progress during study leave. The agreement also stipulates that the faculty member on leave shall follow the plan approved in granting the leave, "so far as is reasonable."

The changes in study leave salary provisions become effective May 1, 1977.

On salaries, the Faculty Association has asked for an increase totalling approximately 14 per cent, retroactive to April 1. The University has offered a total increase of 8 per cent, effective July 1.

The association request includes, first, a general salary increase of 10 per cent, with a minimum raise of \$1,200 a year and a maximum of \$2,200.

In addition to the general increase, the association is requesting adoption of a minimum guideline scale for faculty salaries calculated primarily on the age of the faculty member with reduction for "non-relevant" experience.

For example, the proposed minimum for a senior instructor, aged 30, would be \$18,200 and at age 35 would level off at \$21,700. Minimum for a tenured assistant professor would be \$21,000 at age 28, levelling off at \$25,900 at age 35.

The association proposes a staged implementation of this scale, requesting that "each member whose salary is below the Minimum Guideline Scale shall receive [lower and above the general increase] an additional increase of 15 per cent times the number of years of service at UBC times the amount by which his or her salary is below the Guideline."

In addition the association wants merit increases

totalling 1 per cent of the salary budget and a sum of \$250,000 for "inequity increases."

The University has agreed to the provision of 1 per cent for merit increases and the fund for eliminating anomalies or inequities, provided the total increase to the faculty payroll does not exceed 8 per cent. Actual distribution of the 8 per cent would be settled by negotiation or arbitration.

Total cost to the University of the association's request would be approximately \$6.6 million and would lift the average faculty salary from \$25,591 to slightly over \$29,000. The 8 per cent increase offered by the University would take effect July 1 and cost approximately \$2.9 million during the present fiscal year.

In making the 8 per cent offer, the University has maintained that funds for a larger salary increase are not available without further and serious cutbacks in the operations of the University. University negotiators have also stated that another constraint on the University's ability to pay is the minister of education's instruction to universities not to undertake any financial obligations which would require an increase in the operating grant next year. An arbitrator has yet to be named.

Commerce and Business Administration, and Agricultural Sciences — will receive their degrees on this second day of Congregation. The degrees of Doctor of Philosophy, Doctor of Education, Master of Physical Education, Master of Science (Business Administration), Master of Business Administration, Bachelor of Science (Agriculture), Bachelor of Education (both Secondary and Elementary), Bachelor of Physical Education, Bachelor of Recreation Education, and Bachelor of Commerce and a Licentiate in Accounting will be awarded.

Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees will be conferred on internationally known economist Barbara Ward Jackson and Father Gerard Dion, of Laval University in Quebec City, one of Canada's best known sociologists in the field of industrial relations.

Friday, May 28

The last of the three-day ceremony will feature students from UBC's professional faculties and schools. Degrees in applied science, engineering, architecture, nursing, forestry, law, science, pharmaceutical sciences, medicine, rehabilitation medicine, and dentistry will be conferred.

Honorary degrees will be awarded

to Prof. Kathleen Coburn, of the University of Toronto, internationally known for her study of the English poet Samuel Taylor Coleridge, and Stanley T. Arkley, of Seattle, Wash., a 1925 graduate of UBC and a benefactor of UBC's Library and School of Librarianship.

Prof. Coburn will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.) and Mr. Arkley the degree of Doctor of Laws.

UBC also pays tribute during its annual Congregation ceremony to those students who have headed their respective graduating classes.

The student who heads each graduating class is presented to Chancellor Miller when he or she arrives at the platform at the east end of the War Memorial Gymnasium to receive his or her academic degree.

Only one student — the winner of the Governor-General's Gold Medal as head of the graduating class in either Arts or Science — is especially singled out. The winner of this medal is asked to come to the Congregation platform and a special citation is read before the medal is awarded by the chancellor.
