Rehab pioneer among five to be honored

Edmund J. "Ed" Desjardins, a quadriplegic who pioneered the development of rehabilitation services for the physically handicapped in Western Canada, will be one of five persons receiving honorary degrees at UBC's spring Congregation ceremonies May 27, 28 and 29.

Desjardins, who retired recently as executive director of the G.F. Strong Rehabilitation Centre in Vancouver, will be honored on May 29 with Bora Laskin, chief justice of Canada's Supreme Court, who was prevented by illness from receiving an honorary degree in 1980.

Others who will be honored at the three-day ceremony are:

Elly Ameling of the Netherlands, a renowned soprano who has been internationally acclaimed as a concert and opera singer and as a recording artist;

T.C. "Tommy" Douglas, a Canadian political figure for more than four decades and leader of the New Democratic Party from 1961 to 1971; and

Harold M. Wright of Vancouver, a UBC graduate and chairman of Wright Engineers Ltd., a leading Canadian mining and engineering firm.

Ed Desjardins has been honored and cited by numerous health and rehabilitation organizations for dedicated and distinguished leadership in the development of rehabilitation services for the handicapped.

He has been confined to a wheelchair since 1944 as the result of a

military training accident in England while a member of the First Canadian Parachute Battalion. He became manager of the G.F. Strong Rehabilitation Centre in 1948 after serving as office manager for the rehabilitation division of the Department of Veterans' Affairs.

Bora Laskin was a noted legal educator before being appointed to the bench as a judge of the Court of Appeal of the Supreme Court of Ontario in 1965.

Mr. Laskin was appointed to the Supreme Court of Canada in 1970 and three years later was named Canada's chief justice.

Elly Ameling has been internationally acclaimed for the purity, warmth and passion of her voice as a singer of songs and oratorio by classical and modern composers and for her natural grace and dignity as an opera singer.

Born in Rotterdam, she had won two major European awards in voice competition by the age of 20. During her career as a concert artist, she has sung with orchestras on all five continents and recorded lieder, oratorio and cantatas by composers ranging from Bach to Bruckner and Mahler.

Tommy Douglas was educated at Brandon College, McMaster University, where he received the degrees of Bachelor and Master of Arts, and the University of Chicago before entering the Baptist ministry.

He was first elected to the federal House of Commons in 1935 and resigned as an MP in 1944 to lead the CCF party in Saskatchewan. He was premier of that province until 1961, when he was elected national leader of the NDP, a post he held until 1971.

From 1962 until his retirement from politics in May, 1979, he represented the B.C. constituencies of Burnaby-Coquitlam and Nanaimo-Cowichan-The Islands in the federal house.

Harold Wright, who heads one of Canada's best-known mining engineering firms, has been honored on numerous occasions for his professional activities and for his involvement in amateur sport in Canada.

Hockey women reach target

UBC's women's field hockey team was all smiles last week when they learned that President Douglas Kenny had agreed to provide \$5,000 from University funds to enable them to reach a fund-raising goal of \$25,000 for an overseas trip this spring.

The team, which won the Canadian university championship in Toronto in November, has been invited to take part in an international university tournament in Glasgow on Easter weekend April 17-19.

The team will tour Scotland, England and Wales following the tournament. A total of 16 players and coach Gail Wilson will make the trip.

The team raised \$20,000 through car washes, bottle drives, raffles and donations from business firms. Chairman of the tour-organizing committee is team captain Anne Crofts, a third-year Physical Education student.

Clyne back as chancellor

John Valentine Clyne, a former member of the Supreme Court of B.C. and retired chairman and chief executive officer of MacMillan Bloedel, will serve a second three-year term as chancellor of the University.

He was an easy winner over college teacher Stan Persky in a mail ballot of UBC's Convocation (graduates, faculty and Senate).

Clyne received 9,022 or 69 per cent of the 13,084 votes. Persky tallied 4,062 votes, 31 per cent. Only 18 per cent of the eligible voters cast ballots.

The same men contested the chancellorship three years ago, Clyne

winning then 10,359 votes to 4,275.

Clyne, who graduated from UBC in 1923, served three terms on the UBC Senate from 1951 to 1960. Persky was a student at UBC from 1966 to 1973 and holds two UBC degrees.

As chancellor, Clyne also will serve on the Senate and Board of Governors of the University, and will preside at ceremonial occasions.

The chancellor is eligible to hold office for a maximum of six years and receives no salary or any other fee or honorarium for services to the University.

Also elected by Convocation on the chancellorship ballot were 11 members of Senate, who will serve three-year terms.

YEP says yes to student jobs

The provincial government's Youth Employment Program will be operating again in the summer of 1981 and project applications should be available in faculty offices this week.

The program, which pays students to carry out projects that further their career goals, pays first and second-year students \$650 a month, third, fourth and fifth-year students \$700 a month and graduate students \$775 a month during the period of May 1 to Aug. 31.

YEP administrator Dick Shirran, director of UBC's Student Counselling and Resource Centre, said that all projects must carry the signature of a University faculty member or senior administrator who is prepared to act as a project supervisor during the term of the project.

8 students submit Constitution brief

Eight members of a UBC history class have submitted a 14-page brief on the Canadian Constitution to the Joint Committee of Parliament on the Constitution, in which they claim that unilateral action by the federal government will be at the expense of long-range interests of Canadians.

"The federal government is attempting to take a symbolic step to nationhood and yet it is breaching a constitutional convention developed in Canada regarding provincial consent . . .," the brief states.

The students, all members of Prof. Murray Greenwood's History 420 class, propose the following formula for the patriation and creation of a new constitution:

1. Simple patriation of the British North America Act, with renunciation by the British Parliament of all legislative power over Canadian affairs;

2. A national referendum to choose either a federally-proposed amending formula, a provincially-proposed amending formula, or a national referendum with regional majorities;

3. An elected constituent assembly.

"The only federal action would be patriation which has already received provincial consent," the brief says.

"The actual amendment of the constitution would be carried out under a new and popularly-decided amending procedure.

Some proposals the students would like to see embodied in the constitution:

- The right of the deaf to a translator in any court proceeding;
- Guarantee of protection against unreasonable search and seizure;
- Limiting of Emergency Power;
- The right of presumption of innocence;
- Protection against retroactive tribunals and guilt by association;
- Protection of native language rights;
- Protection against discrimination based on marital status, sexual preference, and physical and mental handicaps. This should extend to private and public sectors of the economy, particularly accommodation,

TAs, University reach agreement

A memorandum of agreement has been signed by University negotiators and representatives of Local 2278 of the Canadian Union of Public Employees (the new union of teaching assistants).

The contract runs from Sept. 1, 1980, to Aug. 31, 1981, and covers wages and working conditions for more than 1,000 teaching assistants and markers at UBC.

Wages run from \$6.15 an hour for markers to \$13.30 an hour for graduate teaching assistants who hold a master's degree.

Meanwhile, Local 2278 has applied to the Labor Relations Board for certification to represent the 12 pre-school teachers and assistants at the Berwick Centre.

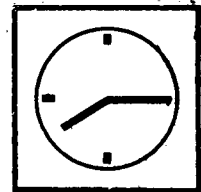
