

Fee Packaging Service Corporation fonds

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Fee Packaging Service Corporation fonds. – 1935. – 13 cm of textual records.

Administrative history:

The Fee Packaging Service Corporation sold and maintained packing equipment for lard and other shortenings. T.A. Fee was president of the company (which was located in both Seattle and Vancouver). The Fee Packaging Service Corporation was formerly the Lamb Corporation, advertised as “manufacturers of the lamb fixed density filling and weighing machines for plastic or viscous materials and liquids.”

Scope and content:

Fonds includes correspondence between the Fee Packaging Service Corporation and its employees (primarily R.F. Marshall) as well as clients. R.F. Marshall worked as a merchandise broker for the company and once owned a company called Spices Limited. Correspondence between the company and its clients include letters, telegrams and questionnaires pertaining to the installation of machinery for packaging lard or other compounds. The corporation’s principle customers included Swift and Company (Portland, Oregon), Proctor and Gamble Company (Cincinnati), as well as Wilson and Company (Chicago, Illinois). The Fee Packaging Service Corporation also corresponded with other companies such as Oscar Mayer (Maddison, Wisconsin), Hormel Company (Austin, Minnesota), and Bell Packing Company (Cheyenne, Wyoming), and others. Fonds consists of two files of general correspondence, files for each of several main clients (Proctor and Gamble, Swift and Company, M.M. Wilson and Wilson and Company) and files organized by the first letter of the client name (“P” file, “R” file, “S” file, “W” file).
