FONDS DESCRIPTION

**Wayman, Thomas Ethan, 1945-
Tom Wayman fonds. – 1962-1981
80 cm textual records**

Biographical Sketch:

Born in Hawksbury, Ontario, in 1945, but raised mainly in British Columbia, Tom Wayman graduated with a BA from the University of British Columbia and an MFA in English and Creative Writing from the University of California at Irvine in 1968. Since that time he has worked as a writer-in-residence and faculty member at a variety of institutions. He worked as a writer-in-residence at the University of Windsor (1975-76), University of Alberta (1978-1979), Simon Fraser University (Spring, 1983), and University of Toronto (Spring 1996). He has taught at Colorado State University (1968-69), Wayne State University (1976-77), David Thompson University (1980-82), Banff School of Fine Arts (Summers, 1980, 1982), Kootenay School of Writing (1984-87), Okanagan College and Okanagan University College (1990-91, 1992-95), Kootenay School of the Arts (1991-92, 1995-98), and Kwantlen College and Kwantlen University College, Surrey (Fall 1983, 1988-present). His work career has included a number of blue-collar and white-collar jobs in Canada and the United States. Wayman is also a founder of both the Kootenay School of Writing and the Vancouver Industrial Writers Union. Tom Wayman is widely known as a work poet well versed in work writing in North America. He has written, compiled and contributed to many books and periodicals. His printed collections of poetry include *Waiting for Wayman* (1973), *Money and Rain* (1975), *Living on the Ground* (1980), *Introducing Tom Wayman: Selected Poems* (1973-80), *The Face of Jack Munro* (1986), *In a Small House on the Outskirts of Heaven* (1989), *I'll be Right Back: New & Selected Poems 1980-1996* (1997), and *The Colours of the Forest* (1999). He has edited a variety of anthologies including *Beaton Abbot's got the Contract* (1974), *A Government Job at Last* (1976), *Going for Coffee* (1987), *East of Main: An Anthology of Poems from East Vancouver* (1989), *Paperwork* (1991) and *The Dominion of Love, contemporary Canadian love poems* (2001). He also has poems in many Canadian and U.S. anthologies.

Scope and Content:

The fonds consists of correspondence, manuscripts, and documents relating to the early career of Tom Wayman from 1962 to 1981. The files related to his career as a university student, printed collections of his own poetry, and printed collections of anthologies he edited. In addition, there are correspondence files that are created owing to his writing life as well as files relating to work writing material.

Notes:

Arrangement of the fonds has followed the series and file order created by Tom Wayman. Further accruals are expected.

SERIES DESCRIPTIONS

Juvenilia series. – 1962-1966

Series consists of poetry and prose written during his university years.

Poetry series. – 1971-1990

Series consists of correspondence, manuscripts, legal agreements, royalty statements, financial statements, and book reviews relating to his poetry.

Anthology series. – 1974-1981

Series consists of correspondence, manuscripts, book reviews, and book sales relating to anthologies edited by Tom Wayman.

Writing series – 1968-1981

Series consists of correspondence, documents, and research material arising out of his writing career including material relating to his public readings of poetry and Canada Council funding. Correspondence with George Woodcock relates to one of Wayman's essays.

Work writing series – 1976-1980

Series consists of correspondence relating to work-based literature and drafts pertaining to proposed work writing projects.

Fonds Description

Title: Tom Wayman Fonds, Industrial Workers of the World Sous-Fonds.

Dates: 1917-1989, 1982-1989 predominates.

Extent: Approximately 1.2 meters of textual records.
Approximately 200 photographs.

Administrative History: In the late 1960s, Tom Wayman, along with a group of other young activists, resuscitated the Industrial Workers of the World (IWW) in the Vancouver area. The organization-which was founded on the principle of organizing *all* workers into “one big union”- enjoyed a vibrant period of activity from 1905 to 1930, attracting tens of thousands of members throughout North America’s mid west and west coast. By the 1950s, however, the IWW had declined in size and vigour. Inspired by the social movements of the 1960s, Wayman and his Vancouver colleagues sought to bring the principles of the IWW to a new generation of young workers.

The local organization for the Vancouver area in the 1970s was termed a General Membership Branch (GMB). Among other activities, the GMB recruited construction crews to the IWW, organized an IWW musician’s local, produced pamphlets on various labor and political issues and published a monthly newsletter entitled *Solidarity Bulletin* from 1972-1973. At times the 1970s Vancouver GMB had a confrontational relationship with the IWW’s main co-ordinating body in Chicago, the “General Executive Board” (GEB). As with other sections of the Canadian labor movement in the 1970s, Canadian members of the IWW (mostly from the Vancouver GMB) sought greater autonomy from their US central office. These members formed a “Canadian Administration” of the IWW and held a founding convention at Simon Fraser University in 1973. Later however, the international IWW refused to allow a separate Canadian Administration.

After a 9 year hiatus, Wayman and others again resuscitated the Vancouver GMB. The 1980s version sought to organize workers into IWW “job shops” and published the *Solidarity Bulletin* along with many other leaflets and pamphlets. They were successful in organizing two “job shops”: an East Vancouver computer and graphics co-operative store and a Kaslo area bread-making co-op. The GMB also became heavily active in various social and political campaigns, mainly involving unemployed and low-wage workers. The Vancouver branch also put on cultural events including an annual May Day dance. During this time, the GMB’s relationship with the international IWW became somewhat less confrontational than it had been in the 1970s. Although, there was further discussion of Canadian autonomy, members from Vancouver served on the GEB and in 1987, the IWW’s annual convention was organized and hosted by the Vancouver GMB. This was the first time the organization’s conference had been held outside of Chicago.

Custodial History note: Records from all three periods of the IWW’s existence in Vancouver remained in Tom Wyman’s custody until 2006, when they were transferred to Rare Books and Special Collections.

Scope and Content: This sous-fonds consists of records that document the Vancouver GMB's internal business, its relationship with other IWW bodies such as the GEB, its publications and its external activities. These records include minutes, correspondence, photographs, posters pamphlets and drafts of the *Solidarity Bulletin* newsletter. Also included in the sous-fonds are important historical IWW publications from the 1920s and 1930s. Although there are records from the 1970s, these are arranged in a separate series from the 1980s records because they are less complete. Additionally, the Vancouver GMB lay dormant between 1973 and 1982 and the functions of the organization changed significantly during the hiatus.

Title: 1970s Series

Dates: 1969-1973.

Physical Description: Approx 10 cm of textual material.

Scope and Content: Series consists of financial statements, convention documents leaflets and correspondence from the Vancouver during the 1970s. This series also contains records of the 1973 “Canadian Administration” convention held at Simon Fraser University and the Vancouver IWW musician’s local.

Source of supplied title: Title based on contents of the series.

Title: Internal branch business series.

Dates: 1982-1985, 1988-1989.

Physical Description: Approx 30 cm of textual material.

Scope and Content: Series consists of records related to the Vancouver GMB’s regular meetings and administrative affairs from 1982-1985 and 1988-1989. The records include minutes, financial statements and correspondence with members and the IWW’s central co-ordinating body.

Title: External IWW organizations series.

Dates: 1982-1989.

Physical Description: 15 cm of textual material.

Scope and Content: This series contains the records of a number of Vancouver members who were active in IWW bodies other than the Vancouver GMB. These bodies include the General Executive Board (the chief co-ordinating body of the IWW) and organizing committees for various regional and national conventions. There is also a file of records debates over Canadian autonomy within the international IWW. Included in this series are minutes, agendas, draft resolutions and other convention-related documents.

Title: External labour, political and cultural activities series.

Dates: 1982-1989.

Physical Description: 30 cm of textual material.

Scope and Content: This series consists of minutes, correspondence, leaflets, posters and other material that documents the Vancouver GMB’s involvement in various social justice, labour and cultural campaigns during the 1980s. Social justice and labour campaign files include the Unemployed Action Center, the “Job Hotline,” and a Greenpeace workers organizing drive in 1989. Culturally, the series contains files of documents related to the annual May Day dinner and dance organized by the Vancouver GMB

Physical Description: 22.5 cm of textual material.

Scope and Content: Contains correspondence, drafts, original copies and other materials related to the production of the Vancouver GMB's monthly newsletter, *Solidarity Bulletin*. The 1980s version of the *Solidarity Bulletin* was published from December of 1983 until May of 1989. This series contains almost the complete run of *Solidarity Bulletin* with only a couple of issues missing from 1988.
