Title: The William Hale White family papers
Dates of Creation: c. 1840 – 1987, 1880-1913 predominant
Physical Description: 80 cm of textual records, 29 photographs.

These papers form a sub-collection within the Norman Colbeck Collection held at the Special Collections Division of the Library at the University of British Columbia. For information on Norman Colbeck and the Colbeck Collection, please refer to the Colbeck Collection Inventory.

Biographical sketch:

William Hale White (1831-1913) was the eldest son of William White, bookseller and printer, of Bedford. As a youth, William Hale White's pursued theological training at New College, St. John's Wood (London). In 1848 he was expelled from New College for holding unorthodox views. In the 1850's he was involved in the Westminster Review, where he came into contact with a number of literary figures of the time, including John Chapman and George Eliot. White worked as a civil servant, rising to Assistant Director of Contracts, frequently acting as Director. He retired from Somerset House in the early 1890's, and after a short service as Registrar of births, marriages and deaths at Marylebone, his later years were spent at Groombridge, Kent. He was buried there in 1913.

White was married twice. His first marriage was to Harriet Arthur in 1856. She died in 1891. They had six children: William Hale-White (1857-1949; later Sir William Hale-White, addressed as "Willie" in family correspondence), Samuel Arthur White (1860-1861), John Harry White (1861-1398; addressed as "Jack"), Edward Victor White (1866-1867), Mary Theodora White (1869-195?; addressed as "Molly"), and Ernest Theodore White (1869-1936). White's second marriage was to Dorothy Vernon Horace Smith (see below) in 1911.

William Hale White's fame as an author rests chiefly upon his pseudonymous autobiographical works, The Autobiography of Mark Rutherford (1881), its sequel Mark Rutherford's Deliverance (1910), Pages From a Journal (1900), More Pages From a Journal (1910), and Last Pages (1915). The latter two works were edited by his second wife.

Dorothy Vernon White (née Dorothy Vernon Horace Smith; 1877-1967) was the daughter of Horace Smith, the Metropolitan Police Magistrate for the City of Westminster. She is the aunt of Simon Noell-Smith, who inherited much of the papers in this collection. Dorothy Horace Smith met White at Groomsbridge shortly after the publication of her first novel Miss Mona (1907). After her marriage to White in 1911, she completed and published two other novels Frank Burnet (1909) and Isabel (1911). After William Hale White's death, Dorothy Vernon White edited his Letters to Three Friends (1924) and published her own account of her years with White, The Groomsbridge Diary (1924).

Scope and Content:

This sub-collection is largely composed of the papers of William Hale White. It contains correspondence with family and friends, manuscript notebooks of his books, published and unpublished manuscripts, subject files, clippings, and bound pamphlets on a variety of

philosophical and religious topics. It also contains Dorothy Vernon White's correspondence with her friends and family members, as well as the notebook manuscripts of her books.

This sub-collection also contains correspondence between other members of the White family and some personal papers, in particular those of Cecily Hale-White (daughter of John Hale-White).

Source of supplied title proper:

Title based on contents of the collection.

Immediate source of acquisition:

All of the William Hale White and Dorothy Vernon White papers in this collection were obtained from Simon Nowell-Smith, the nephew of Dorothy Vernon White. They came to the Library at the University of British Columbia as part of the larger Colbeck Collection. After the donation of the Colbeck Collection to UBC, Nowell-Smith made a small donation to UBC of his own personal papers related to William Hale White and Dorothy Vernon White.

Arrangement:

The material obtained from Simon Nowell-Smith was received in a partially-arranged state. In the case of these correspondence files and some of the subject files, Nowell-Smith's arrangement and file descriptions were retained. The White family papers were not received from Nowell-Smith, and were in considerable disarray, and arrangement was imposed by Special Collections.

Restrictions:

None.

Accruals:

No further acquisitions are expected.

Series descriptions

1. W.H. White and D.V. White correspondence series. 1852-1917, 1890-1913 predominant. 18 cm of textual records

This series is composed of incoming correspondence and drafts and originals of outgoing correspondence to and from William Hale White and/or Dorothy Vernon White. The large majority of files are W.H. White's incoming and outgoing correspondence. Correspondents include W.H. White's literary and other friends, communications with publishers, and with family members. Some files include correspondence with both W.H. White and D.V. White.

Note: "to/from" in file titles indicates incoming and outgoing correspondence in the same file. This was done because W.H. White often wrote drafts of outgoing correspondence on the backs of the correspondence that he received.

2. Personal materials series. 1911-58, 1911-13 predominant 22 items

This series is composed of the Last Will and Testament of W.H. White and correspondence related to the disposition of his estate.

3. W.H. White manuscripts series. [after 1860]-1929, 1900-1912 predominant 12 cm of textual records

This series is composed of the manuscripts of published and unpublished material written by W.H. White. The notebooks sub-series includes the "Dorothy", "Black", and "White" notebooks, in which W.H. White documents his relationship with D.V. White. For the published materials sub-series, file titles and dates were supplied by D.V. White. With the exception of "Notes on Shelley" and "A Visit to Carlyle" these items were all included in Last Pages from a Journal. "A Visit to Carlyle" was published in Pages from a Journal.

4. D.V. White manuscripts series. 1908-1929, 1908-1913 predominant 9 cm of textual records

This series is composed of D.V. White's personal notebooks used to create The Groomsbridge Diary, as well as subsequent notebooks in which she comments on the earlier notebooks.

5. Subject file series. 1879-1956, 1879-1913 predominant 7 cm of textual records

This series is largely composed of correspondence files regarding publication of W.H. White's books, especially publication of subsequent editions with various publishers. Some files in the series relate to controversies with which W.H. White was involved.

6. Printed materials series. 1785?-1957, 1860-1913 predominant 15 cm of textual records

This series is composed of a variety of clippings of newspaper and magazine articles by W.H. White and reviews of his works. As well, the series contains three volumes that are made up of a number of published pamphlets that White had bound.

**7. White family papers series. 1852-1958, 1900-1949 predominant
14 cm of textual records**

The series contains correspondence and other material created by or related to W.H. White's parents, children, and grandchildren, including biographical information about various members of the Hale-White family and correspondence between members of the family and their friends.

**8. Horace Smith family papers series. 1930-67
10 items**

This series is composed of correspondence of Marian Milford, the sister of D.V. White, and of notes and correspondence of Simon Nowell-Smith, the nephew of D.V. White.

**9. Miscellaneous materials series. [1905]-1987
11 items**

This series is composed of items created by persons not listed above, items whose authorship could not be identified, and items associated with the administration of the Collection.

**10. Photographs series. c. 1840-after 1910
29 items**

This series is composed of photographs of William Hale White, William and Mary White, Molly Hale White, and William Hale White's cottage at Groomsbridge.

1. W.H. White and D.V. White correspondence series

- 1-19 W.H. White to Keegan Paul, Trench, Trübner & Co. Ltd.
1892. 11 items.
Correspondence regarding the transfer of copyright of W.H. White's translation into English of Spinoza's Ethics, The Autobiography of Mark Rutherford, The Deliverance, The Revolution in Tanner's Lane, and Catherine Furze back to W.H. White. (These rights were subsequently transferred to Thomas Fisher Unwin, Publishers, see below). The file is largely comprised of incoming and drafts of outgoing correspondence, but includes White's account statements.
- 1-22 W.H. White to Sophie Partridge
to 2-2 1892-1912. 80 items.
These files are composed of correspondence collected by D.V. White for publication in the book Letters to Three Friends. Most letters have envelopes attached that have been annotated by D.V. White; some have enclosed notes regarding their use in the book. Letters originally written in pencil by W.H. White were transcribed in pen by D.V. White in 1935. The letters were obtained by D.V. White from Jeannie and Jo Partridge in 1924. A number of letters have had portions removed, or D.V. White has noted entire letters destroyed because she considered them "fair to keep."
- 2-4 W.H. White to/from Thomas Fisher Unwin, Publishers
1892-94. 85 items.
Incoming and drafts of outgoing correspondence between W.H. White and T. Fisher Unwin of Thomas Fisher Unwin, Publishers. The file also includes a letter from Miss Schreiner to W.H. White, dated Feb. 19, 1893, referenced in the White-Unwin correspondence. Also includes a letter from Mts. Mary Eliz. Stevenson to Messrs. Paul, Trench, Trübner & Co, dated 26 July 1893. The file is largely composed of correspondence regarding the transfer of publication rights and re-publication of W.H. White's translation of Spinoza's Ethics, The Autobiography of Mark Rutherford, The Deliverance, The Revolution in Tanner's Lane, and Catherine Furze. The file also includes the draft Memorandum of Agreement between W.H. White and Thomas Fisher Unwin, Publishers, as well as the White's account sheets with them.

3. W.H. White manuscripts series

- 2-10 The 1910 Manuscript
1910, 1922, 1929.
W.H. White's account of his relationship with Dorothy White, written before their marriage. The last five pages of the original were destroyed by Dorothy White, who also added two pages quoting selected passages from the destroyed section, and further observations written by her in 1922 and 1929.

- 2-11 Three small notebooks
1909-1912. 3 items.
These notebooks contain chiefly personal notes by W.H. White concerning D.V. White, the happiness of their marriage, and other reflections, some of which are partly quoted in The Groomsbridge Diary. They also contain notes on Molly White, Lady Robert Cecil and others, as well as draft letter to The Nation, reading notes and other observations.
- 2-12 [The “Black” Notebook]
[pre 1888-c. 1902]
Entries of reflections and commentaries upon Wordsworth, Coleridge, Shakespeare and others, interspersed with entries of a personal nature, philosophical reflections upon daily occurrences, religion, and other material.
- 2-13 [The “Dorothy” Notebook]
1908-1913, 1922, 1929.
Contains entries in both W.H. White and Dorothy White’s hands. Inserted are four letters from Dorothy White to W.H. White, some of her notes for the Bible class she taught. Notes made by Dorothy White in 1922 and 1929 relate this notebook to the others. The numbers 1-54 added in red ink against the entries refer to Dorothy’s commentary [Notes on the Dorothy book] (see below).
- 3-1 [The “White” Notebook]
[c. 1907-1912]
The entries in this notebook are in the same vein as those of the “Black Notebook,” but include matter pertaining to D.V. White. Four pages comprise extracts from “Mission notes by Dorothy.” These pages have been crossed through and marked “Transferred to Notes from Dorothy’s papers &c.” See the “Dorothy Notebook” above. Both the “Black” and “White” notebooks bear a note in W.H. White’s hand that some of the entries were included in “Last Pages from a Journal,” published as More Pages from a Journal and other papers (1910). Dorothy White drew upon these notebooks in preparing Last Pages (Part III). She did not see the “Black” Notebook until after W.H. White’s death.
- 3-17 Translations of four Goethe poems
1851, 1857, [post 1900?]
This file contains W.H. White’s translations into English.
“To the moon” - 1857
[“The Erl-king”] - 1851
“I wandered idly on the waste sea shore” [post 1900?]
“By a spring a boy was sitting” [c. 1857]

4. D.V. White manuscripts series

3-22 The Groomsbridge Diary – Notebooks
to 4-1 1908-13. 4 items.

These notebooks comprise the original manuscript, with inserted passages by W.H. White in his hand. The manuscript contains a number of passages not included in the final published volume.

4-3 Notes on the “Dorothy” Book
1929. 1 item.

Notes made by Dorothy White on the “Dorothy” book made when she copied it (the “Dorothy” book) out for Hans Klinke in 1929. Hans Klinke was the author of William Hale White – Mark Rutherford. Versuch einer Biographie ... Frankfurt (Oder) (1930).

5. Subject file series

4-5 Carshalton Pond
1891, 1905. 7 items.

In 1981, John Ruskin made financial provisions for the restoration and maintenance of a pond in the village of Carshalton. He arranged with W.H. White to oversee this activity. In 1905, White returned to Ruskin the remains of the funds that had been given for this purpose. The file consists of correspondence between White and Ruskin’s secretary Joan Severn. The 1905 correspondence is from Juliet Morse, who was investigating Ruskin’s involvement in this matter.

4-6 Arthur Coward and Coward family
1911-56. 12 items.

This file is comprised of correspondence between W.H. White, D.V. White, Nowell Smith (brother of D.V. White), Arthur Coward (father of Noel Coward) and Leslie Coward. Arthur Coward was a student of D.V. White’s at her Sunday school. He became very attached to her and looked to her for personal guidance. She turned to her husband and brother for suggestions as to give him moral guidance. The correspondence with Leslie Coward (Arthur’s son) related to the assistance she gave to the family after Arthur Coward’s death.

4-7 Crabb Robinson diaries
1895-1899. 32 items.

Correspondence between W.H. White, the Dr. Williams Library (Francis Jones), M.S. Campbell, and George Allen.

4-9 Pages from a Journal, 2nd edition
1910-12. 27 items.

File consists of incoming and drafts of outgoing correspondence regarding the re-publication of this book, between W.H. White and Oxford University Press, The Nation, The British Weekly, and Thomas Fisher Unwin, Publishers.

- 4-11 Sale of Bunyan book - correspondence
1911. 13 items.
The Bedford Literary Society wished to auction a book in its passions, Bunyan's personal copy of Foxe's Book of Martyrs, annotated by Bunyan. The Attorney General's Office made efforts to prevent the auction. The file consists of correspondence related to this matter. (See also related clippings file: 5-1.)
- 4-12 Spinoza's "Ethics" – 2nd edition and Spinoza's "Tractatus"
1898-1912. 72 items.
In 1899, Duckword & Co. Publishers published these two books. The Spinoza's "Ethics" first edition had been published by Thomas Fisher Unwin Publishers. In 1909, White wanted to publish a new edition of the "Ethics", which Duckworth declined. However, they continued to carry the "Tractatus" until 1912. This file consists of correspondence between W.H. White and Thomas Fisher Unwin Publishers and Duckworth Publishers. It also contains a draft of the memorandum of agreement between White and Duckworth, and White's Duckworth account statements.
- 4-13 Spinoza's "Ethics" – 4th edition and Spinoza's "Tractatus" – 2nd edition
1909-10. 9 items.
File contains incoming and drafts of outgoing correspondence with the Oxford University Press regarding the publication of these two volumes.
- 4-15 Thomas Fisher Unwin – Memoranda of Agreement
1985-1907. 4 items.
File consists of first draft of memoranda of agreement for transfer of copyright and publication of Clara Hopgood and Pages from a Journal.

6. Printed materials series

- 5-4 Pamphlet Books – I-III
to 5-6 Files are each composed of a single volume. Each volume is made up of printed pamphlets or other printed material that has been taken to a bindery and bound together. These three volumes are from W.H. White's library. The pamphlets contained in these volumes tend to be of a literary, philosophical, political or religious nature.

7. White family papers series

- 6-5 Hale-White, Cecily to/from Catherine Maclean
1945-55. 14 items.
This file contains incoming and drafts of outgoing correspondence retained by Cecily Hale-White. Catherine Maclean wrote a biography of W.H. White.

- 6-12 White, William to/from J. Rockliffe
1879. 4 items.
These items were obtained by Molly White in 1913.
- 6-16 Description of the MSS of Wordsworth and Coleridge in the possession of T. Norton – enclosures. 1897, 1931. 3 items.
File contains a review of the volume, which was edited by W.H. White, and correspondence regarding its purchase by Sir William Hale-White.
- 6-17 Description of the MSS of Wordsworth ... – enclosed prints
18-?. 4 prints
File contains four prints enclosed in the named volume. Prints are: 1) William Wordworth (1845); 2) Wordsworth? (18-?); 3) Wordsworth? 1825; 4) William Goswin? (18-?).
- 6-18 Family trees of White, Hale, Arthur, Fripps, and Hughes families after 1914. 11p.
File consists of family tree, compiled by an unidentified grandchild of Sir William Hale-White. File also contains photocopies of notes and correspondence on family history gathered by Sir William Hale-White.
- 6-25 New College Yearbook – 1852
This file contains a typescript transcription from the New College Yearbook entry referring to the expulsion of William Hale White and two other students from the college for non-conformist views.

8. Horace Smith family papers series

- 7-6 Notes re: Arthur Coward – Simon Nowell-Smith
1966-88. 4 items.
Correspondence compiled by Simon Nowell-Smith during research for an article on Arthur Coward. This material directly relates to file 4-6.
- 7-9 The Autobiography of Mark Rutherford, Bohemian (Czech) translation – preface [1905]. 11p.
This material can be found published in: Shapcott, Rubin, Vlastni Zivotopis Marka Rutherford, 1905.
