ABOUT THE PLAY

"Distant Point" was written in 1935, the work of the young Soviet playwright, Afinogenev, who was tragically killed in a Moscow air raid in 1941.

The first production was at the Vahktangov Theatre in Moscow in 1935.

It had a successful run at the Westminster Theatre in London in 1941.

The first Canadian performance was at the Queen's University Summer Theatre in August, 1942. It was repeated by them in Kingston in November, 1942.

The Montreal Repertory Theatre produced it in April, '43.
