Congregation 1977

A time for pride. A time for reflection, looking back on the events which led to today's achievement. For picture-taking. For families. For beginnings.

Congregation ceremonies for 3,360 graduates from UBC begin today (Wednesday) and continue until Friday, June 3.

The ceremonies will be presided over by UBC's chancellor, Donovan Miller. As chancellor, Mr. Miller confers all academic and honorary degrees which have been previously approved by the Senate, UBC's supreme academic body. Six persons will be receiving honorary degrees over the next three days.

Congregation begins at 2:15 p.m. each day in the War Memorial Gymnasium and is followed by a reception in the cafeteria of the Student Union Building.

What follows is a day by day account of the degrees to be awarded:

Wednesday, June 1

Students graduating from UBC's largest faculty, the Faculty of Arts, will be granted doctor's degrees in musical arts; master's degrees in arts, fine arts, music, library science and social work; and bachelor's degrees in art, fine arts, home economics, music and social work.


The honorary degree of Doctor of Laws (LL.D) will be conferred on Gertrude Mary Laing. She is chairperson of the Canada Council and vice-president of Canada World Youth, served on the Royal Commission on Bilingualism and Biculturalism and in 1972 was made an officer of the Order of Canada for her many years of public service.

Also receiving an honorary degree on Wednesday is George Woodcock, one of Canada's most distinguished writers and twice winner of the annual UBC Medal for Popular Biography. Dr. Woodcock, who will be honored with the degree of Doctor of Literature (D.Litt.), retires this year as editor of the UBC quarterly journal *Canadian Literature*.

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Graduating class aids three campus projects

The Crane Library for the Blind, the Law Students Legal Advice Program and the UBC Day Care Centre are richer this year, thanks to the generosity of the graduating class of 1977.

Every year the grad class earmarks part of the graduating fee for worthy campus projects. More than \$10,000 was available this year. Members of the 1977 graduating class voted to give funds to 3 of the 14 projects submitted for consideration.

The Crane Library will receive a gift of \$4,000 which will be used, along with other money raised by the library, to buy four prefabricated soundproof recording booths. Many of the books in the library are "talking books," recorded by library staff and volunteers for blind and reading disabled students.

The recording booths are badly needed, says Paul Thiele, head of the Crane library. The old studios used to record the books were not soundproof.

"Every time a plane flew over the campus, we'd have to stop what we were recording, stop the tape, back up and do it over again, because the noise would be so loud. And there's nothing worse than the sound of a flushing toilet in the background of a romantic novel."

The Law Students Legal Advice Program will receive \$2,000 which will help UBC law students continue their service full-time during the summer months.

The program was established in 1968 to give students the opportunity to put into practice what they were learning in class. It has now expanded to involve 17 paid students during the summer at 11 legal clinics on the Lower Mainland. During the winter, students volunteer to staff evening clinics. The students are assisted by a full-time supervising lawyer and receive advice from other practising lawyers. They now see about 6,000 people a year who cannot qualify for B.C. legal aid and advise them on almost all aspects of the law.

The UBC Day Care Centre was the third recipient of the grad class money. It will receive \$4,750 which will go toward building loft houses, play houses, paddling pools and buying yard equipment for several day care centres on the campus. The UBC Day Care Centre serves the children of students, staff and faculty.

UBC traditions continue

Many of the trees seen around the campus were planted by the Graduating Classes to serve as a reminder of the class in years to come.

This tradition, begun by the Class of 1919, was continued this year by the Class of '77. A red cedar tree was planted in the Fairview Grove on Main Mall on March 31. It joins two other red cedars planted in the same grove by the classes of '76 and '75.

The man who has the final word on the ceremonious aspects of Congregation, Prof. Malcolm McGregor of the Department of Classical Studies retires in June. Always one to enjoy "the University on parade," as he calls such ceremonies as Congregation, opening of new buildings, special luncheons for visiting dignitaries and the like, Dr. McGregor has been Director of Ceremonies since 1968. He will be succeeded by Prof. Ben Moyls of the mathematics department.

Education, Bachelor of Physical Education, Bachelor of Recreation Education and Bachelor of Laws.

Honorary Doctor of Laws degrees will be conferred on Grace MacInnis, B.C.'s first woman member of Parliament, and Vancouver lawyer Arthur Fouks, a former chairman of the UBC Board of Governors.

Grace MacInnis is the daughter of J. S. Woodsworth, who was the founder of the Co-operative Commonwealth Federation, predecessor to the New Democratic Party. She was elected to the B.C. legislature in 1941 and to the House of Commons in 1965.

Arthur Fouks received his Bachelor of Arts degree from UBC in 1941, served with the Canadian Army during World War II and then returned to UBC to study law. He was named a Queen's Counsel in 1964.

Friday, June 3

The last of the three-day ceremony will feature students from UBC's professional faculties and schools. Degrees in applied science, architecture, nursing, forestry, science, business administration, pharmaceutical sciences, medicine, rehabilitation medicine and dentistry will be conferred.

Honorary degrees will be conferred on zoologist Ian McT. Cowan and geneticist Har Gobind Khorana.

Dr. Cowan, an internationally-known zoologist and one of UBC's most illustrious graduates, retired in 1975 as dean of the Faculty of Graduate Studies at UBC.

Dr. Khorana was a scientist with B.C. Research on the campus from 1952 to 1959, where he began the genetic research that led to a Nobel Prize. He is now at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

UBC also pays tribute during its annual Congregation ceremony to those students who have headed their respective graduating classes.

The student who heads each graduating class is presented to Chancellor Miller when he or she arrives at the platform to receive his or her academic degree.
