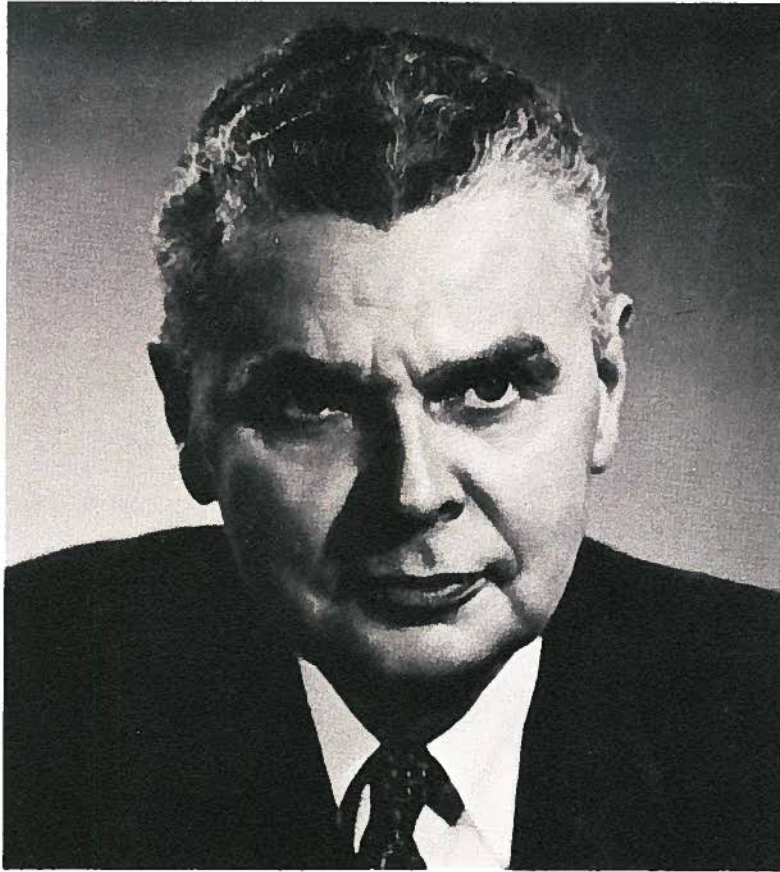

MESSAGE FROM THE PRIME MINISTER

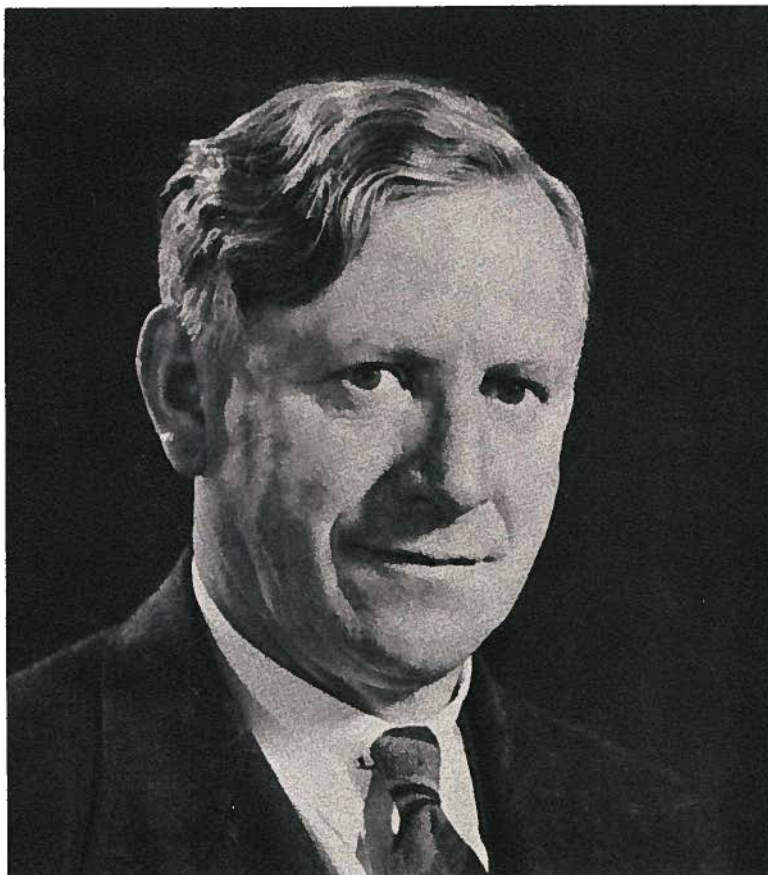

To all our "Centennial" year graduates I send my greetings and best wishes as they leave us to take up the careers for which I hope we have at least helped to prepare them.

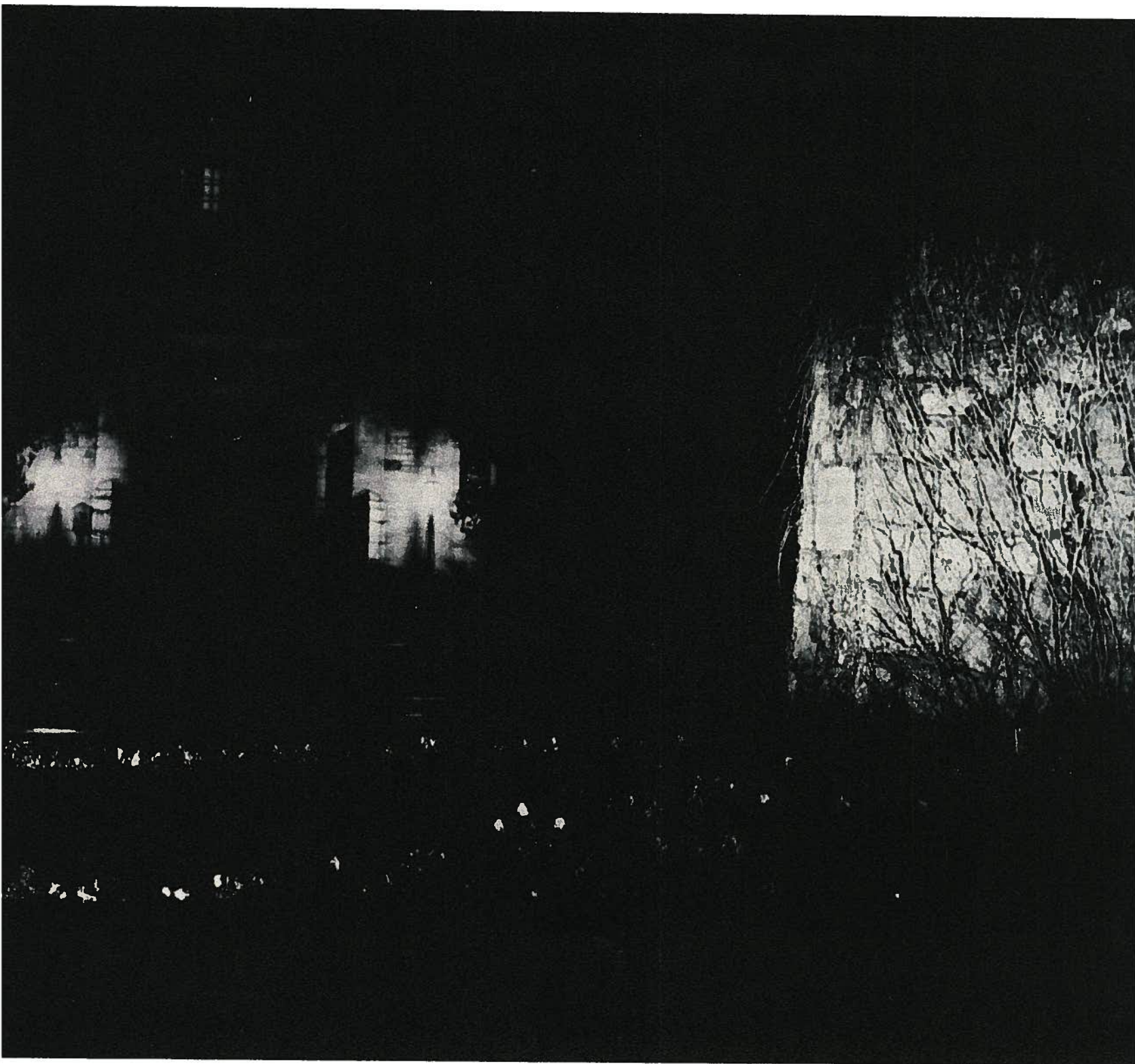

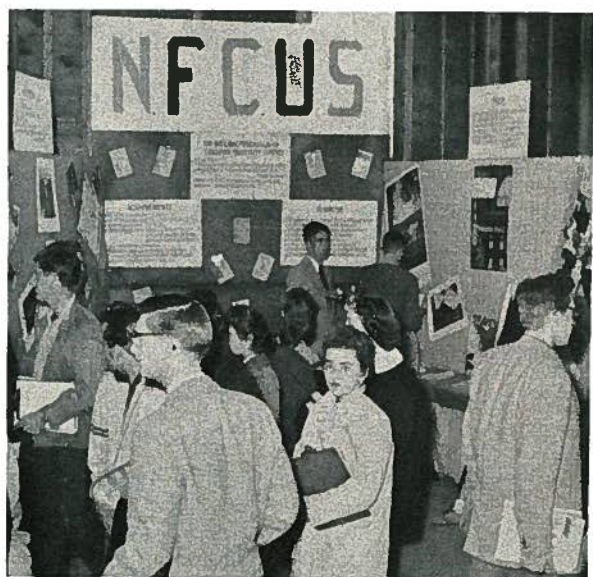

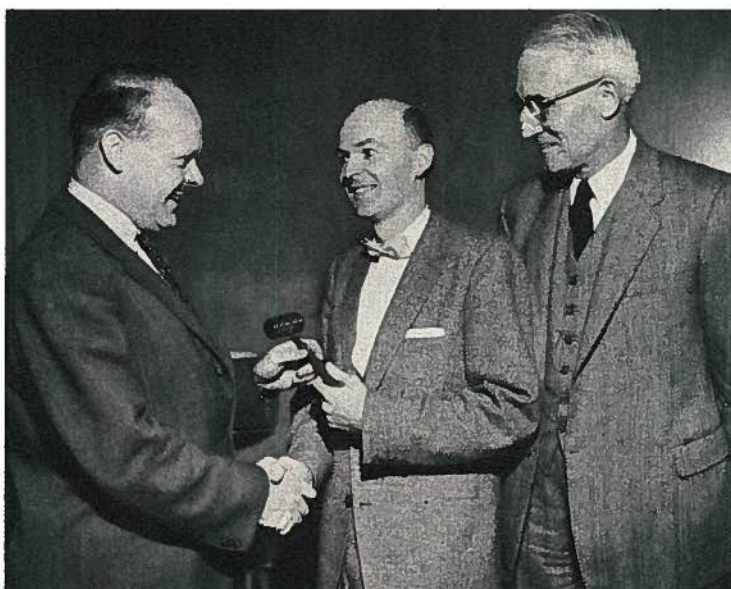

Its consistency, its campus, covers the globe, for members of the association reside in over 52 countries.



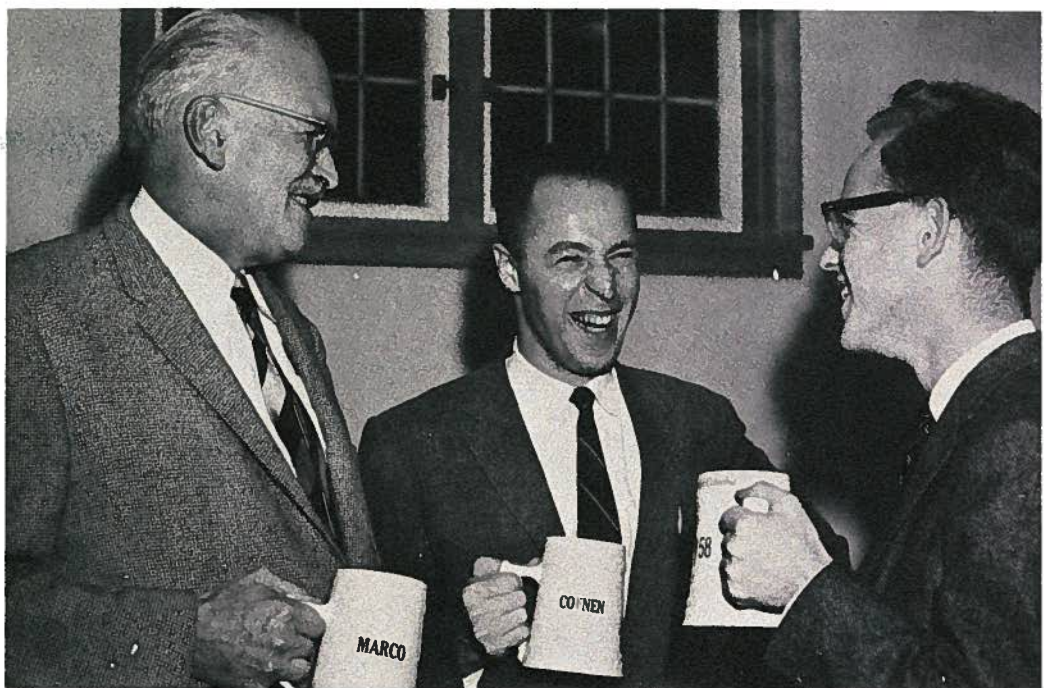

FROSH COUNCIL

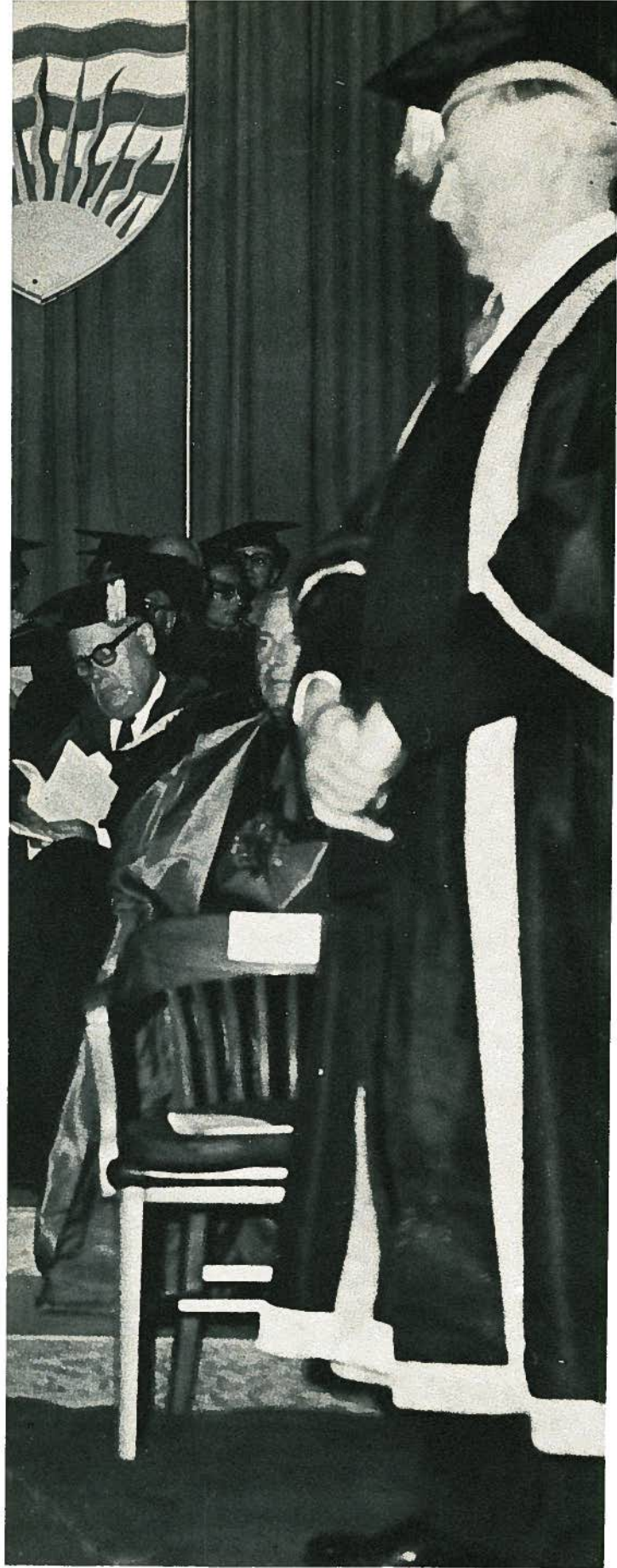
The Frosh Council consists of elected officers and one representative from each first year English class. These members plan all frosh activities on campus such as dances and teams for Intramural Sports.



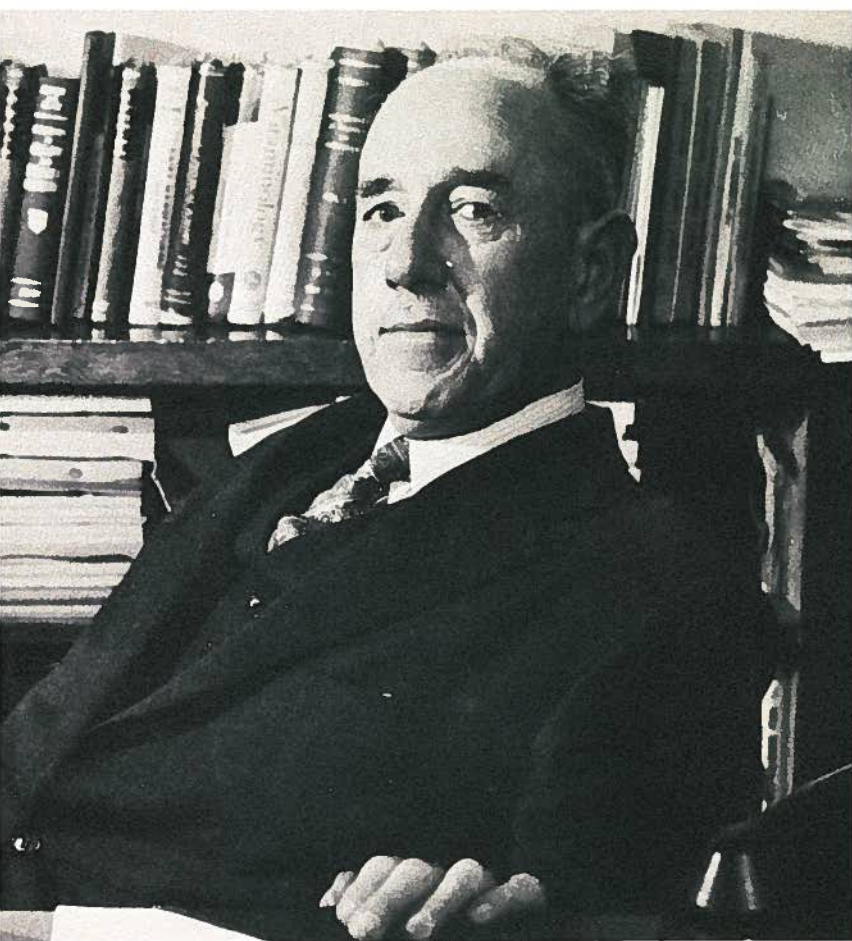

CROSS COUNTRY AND TRACK

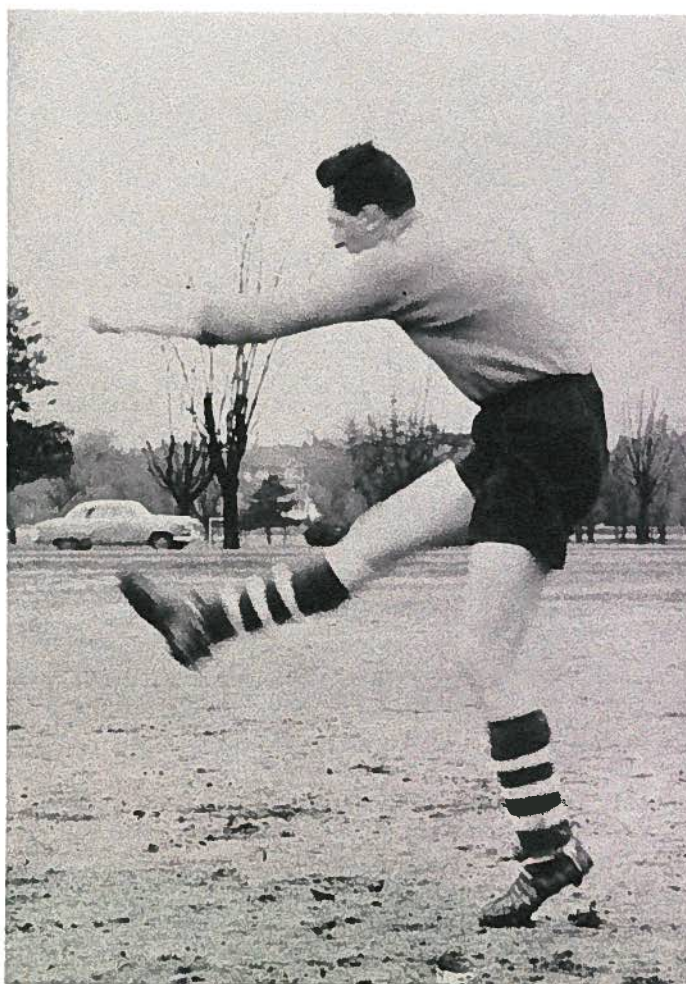

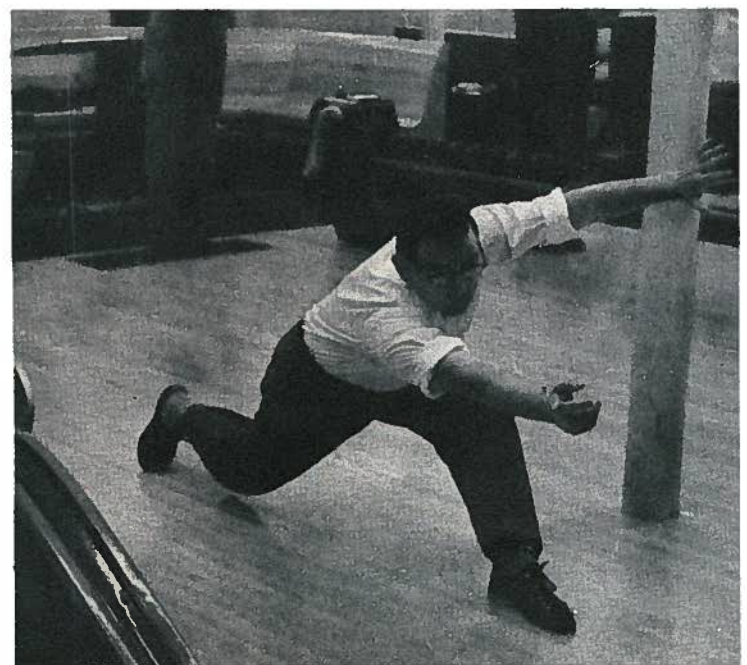
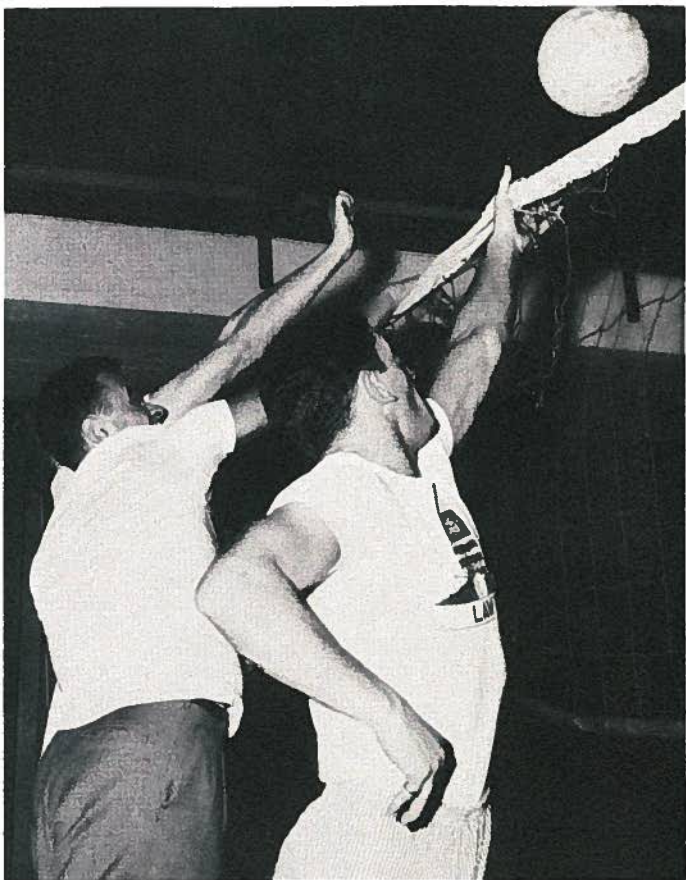
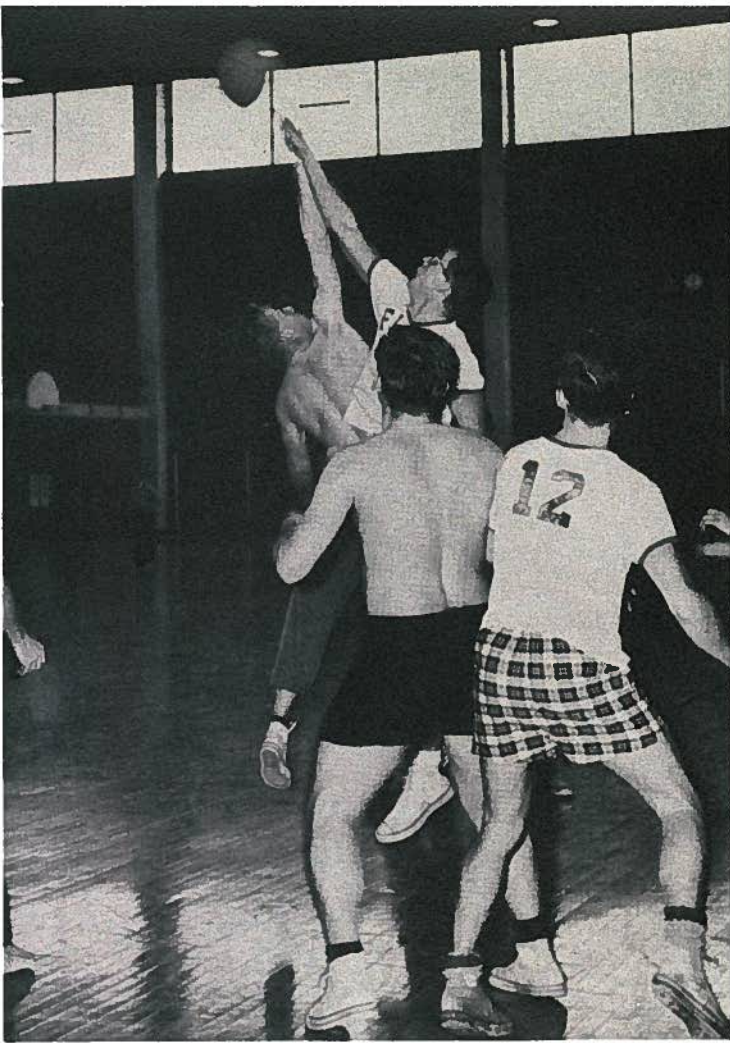


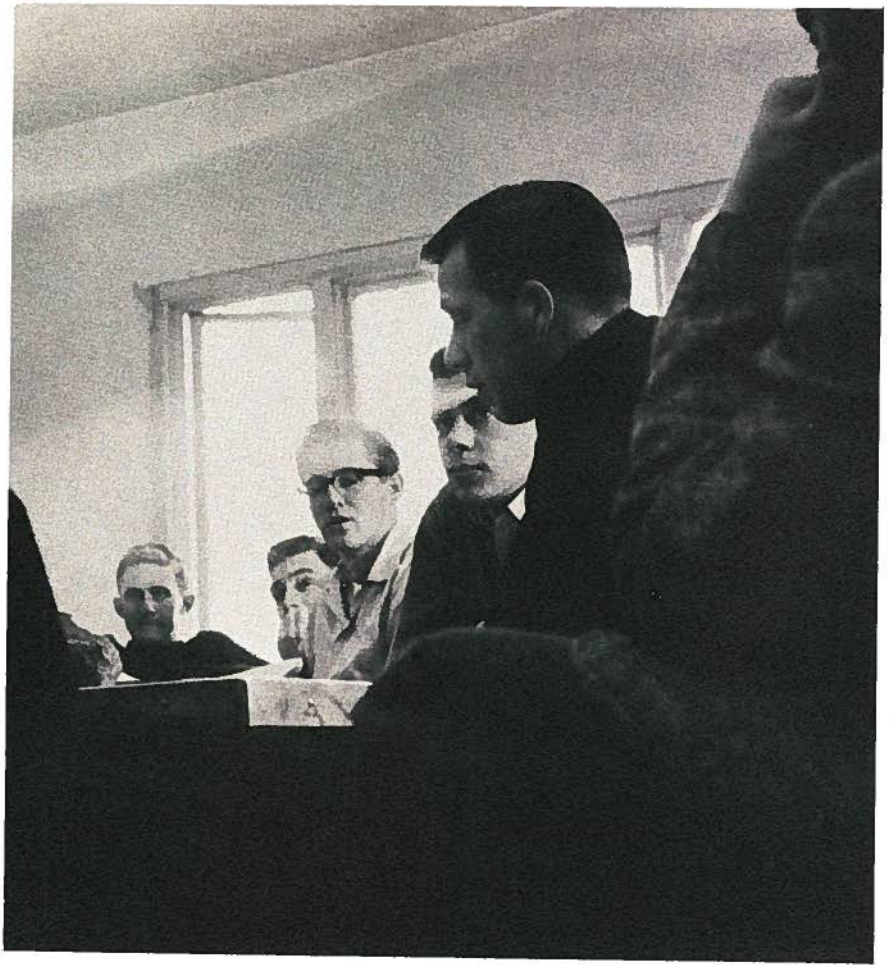
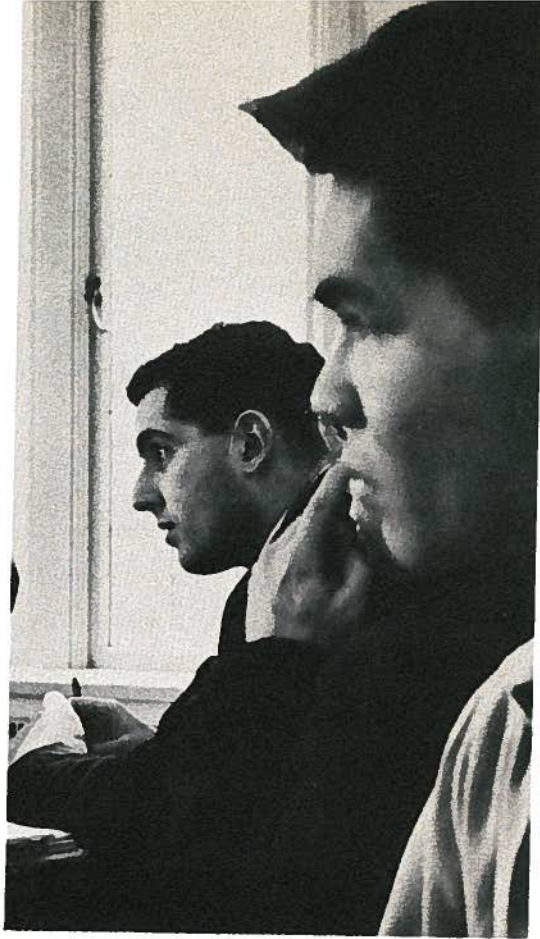


INTRAMURALS

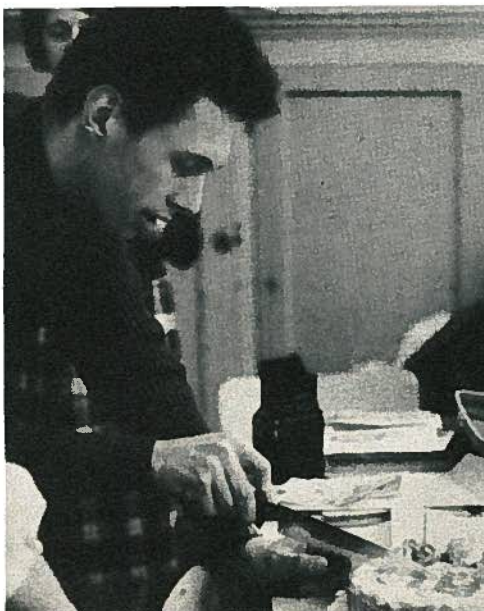
Diane Watson, Administration Editor, chased after copy and pictures, added a little coffee, and produced a near perfect section.

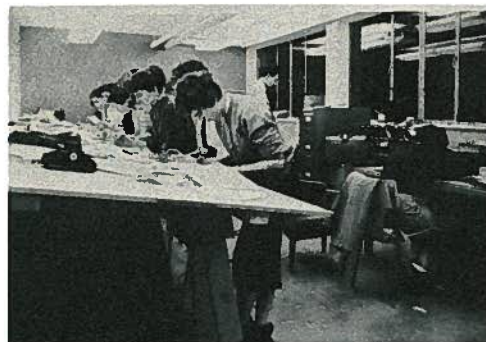
