



Alma Mater, by thy dwelling




#### **FACULTY ASSOCIATION**







# ASSOCIATED WOMEN STUDENTS



This year N. F. C. U. S.'s main project was to prepare a brief on student housing, income tax, scholarships and unemployment insurance. The brief will be submitted to the Federal Government on completion. In addition to their regular job of relegating inter-regional scholarships, N. F. C. U. S. supported the World Refugee Programme and sponsored a variety show for the Canadian Institute for the Blind.

#### WORLD UNIVERSITY SERVICE COMMITTEE

U.B.C.'s World University Service is again maintaining its exchange scholarship programme which is the largest in Canada. This year with the aid of W.U.S.C. bursaries five U.B.C. students are studying in Germany, Malaya and Japan while five foreign students are at our university. W.U.S.C. supports various other activities such as World Refugee Year, a seminar in Israel and the International W.U.S.C. clothing drive in aid of Japanese university students. Another project is a scheduled noonhour lecture series to inform students of university conditions in other countries.



## DANCE CLUB


















Having as its aim the promotion of interest among students and the public in safe scuba and skin diving, Aquasoc has completed another active and successful year.












### **DRAMA**



### THE UNIVERSITY OF BRITISH COLUMBIA MACE





















# HUNGARIAN DEMONSTRATION






## **BUILDINGS**



One of the oldest buildings on the campus is the Forestry and Geology Building. Its ivy-covered walls contain the Forestry Faculty as well as the Geology and Geography Departments.

The War Memorial Gymnasium, built in 1951, cost nearly \$800,000 and was financed largely through student effort. Open-air Empire Pool was built in 1954 for the British Empire Games and was afterwards donated to the university.

The bright, modern Law Building, completed in 1952, is located on the northern slope of the university grounds looking onto the beautiful North Shore mountains across the water.



The Wesbrook Building contains not only the departments of Bacteriology and preventative Medicine but also the university hospital. Completed in 1951, it bears the name of Dr. Wesbrook, U.B.C.'s first president. Its hallways are quieter than those of most other university buildings and, as seen by the photo less frequented.

The beautiful, modern Faculty Club was completed in 1959. It serves as a dining and recreational area for faculty members as well as a centre for entertaining visiting dignitaries.






Union College, situated in the northeast corner of the campus, serves as a student residence as well as a Theological School.

Since 1929, Chancellor Boulevard has been the site of the Anglican Theological College. This building is also a student residence and training school.

Isabel MacInnis Hall is one of three comfortable modern residences for women students.


Fort Camp, which overlooks Howe Sound, is a collection of converted army buts which provide accommodation on the campus for men students.





Mary Bollert Hall is one of the modern residences for women at the university. These dorms are for first and second year girls, providing pleasant campus-home surroundings.





Besides memories of pranks, laughter, friends, and study, students who have stayed at Acadia Camp will long remember the familiar line-ups in the dining hall.




Many married couples begin their wedded life in small houses near the gymnasium. Of necessity, their time is divided between family activities and university obligations.

## MEN'S ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION








#### ROWING

Before Frank Read started coaching in 1950, U.B.C. crews had little success. Since that time they have won three gold and four silver medals in international competition (including the gold medal won by the Four without Cox at the Olympic Games in Melbourne in 1956); and have also paid one visit to the Henley Royal Regatta, where they narrowly missed winning the Grand Challenge Cup after defeating the Russian team in the eliminations.

This last summer, with former U.B.C. Olympic oarsman David Helliwell as coach, the eight won a silver medal at the Pan American Games in Chicago, losing to the United States. A Four with Cox was also entered from U.B.C. and came fourth.

This year, with Frank Read coaching, the crew is once again stirring the waters of Coal Harbour. Under the leadership of their captain Bill McKerlich, they have their sights set on the Olympic Games in Rome this August.

# CROSS COUNTRY AND TRACK



The 1959-60 Track Season has been the best ever for U.B.C. Although there was no track in the W.C.I.A.U., U.B.C. competed very favorably in the Vancouver Relays and the Evergreen Conference. 








#### **WRESTLING**












#### **VOLLEYBALL**




#### **GYMNASTICS**




