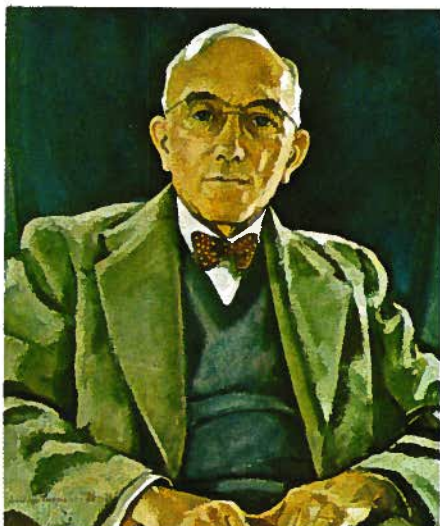

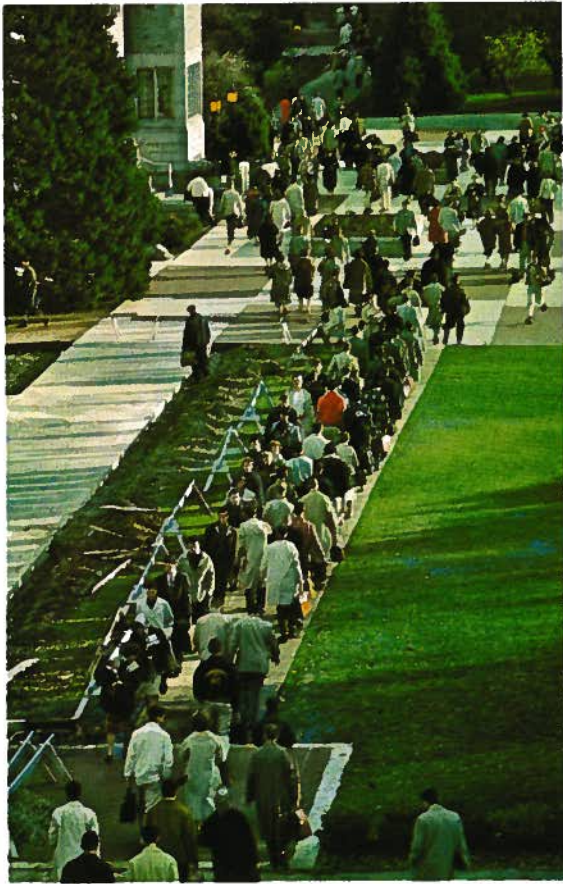

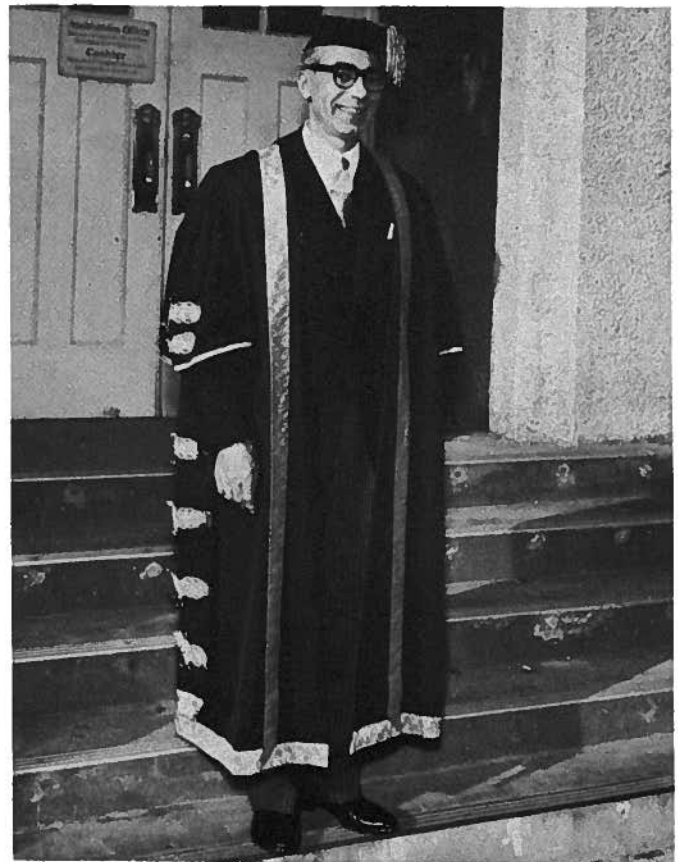
I wonder how many of you realize now that when you look through the Totem in years to come you will be looking at a record of the period of your lives when you could most be yourselves.

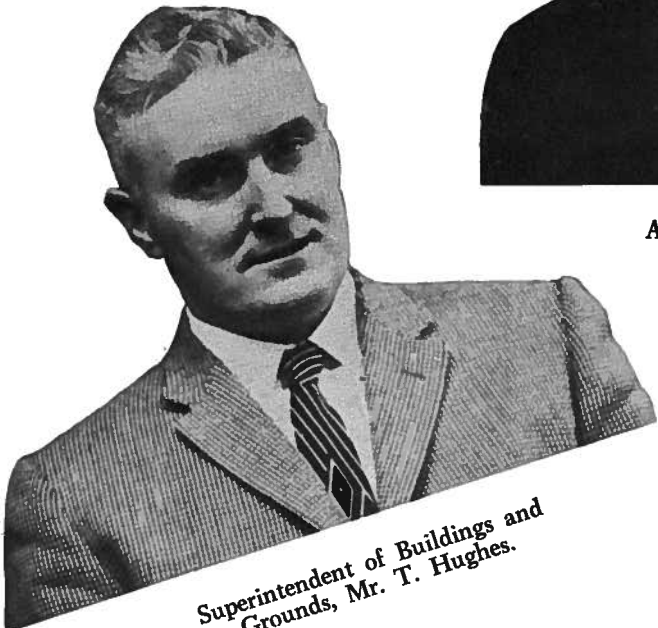

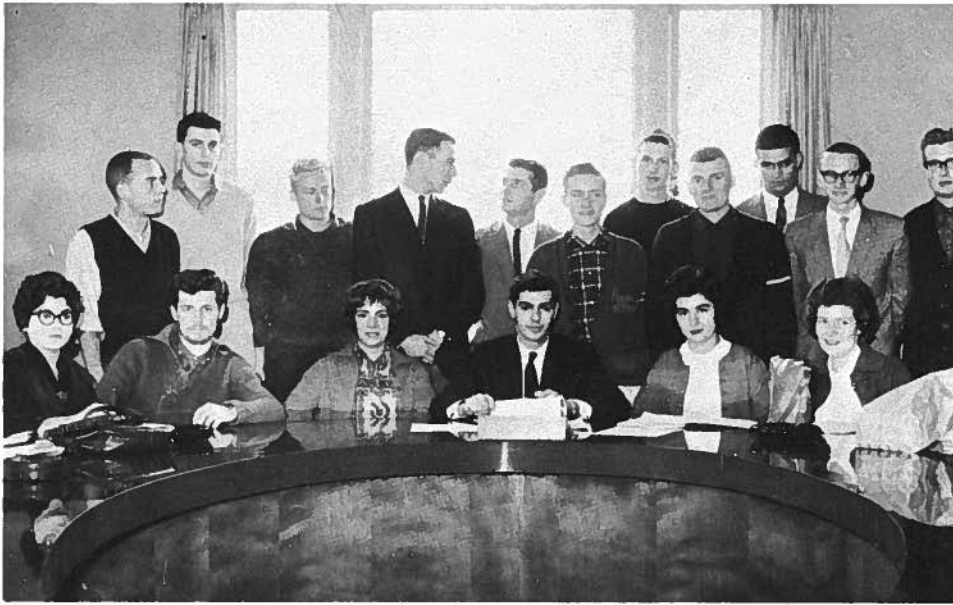

HIGH SCHOOL — CONFERENCE COMMITTEE

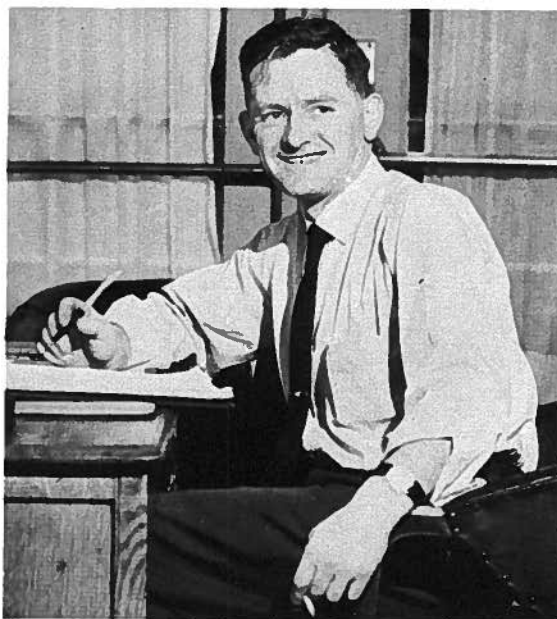
A record number of delegates attended the Fourteenth Annual High School Conference held at U.B.C. on Feb. 24 and 25, 1961.

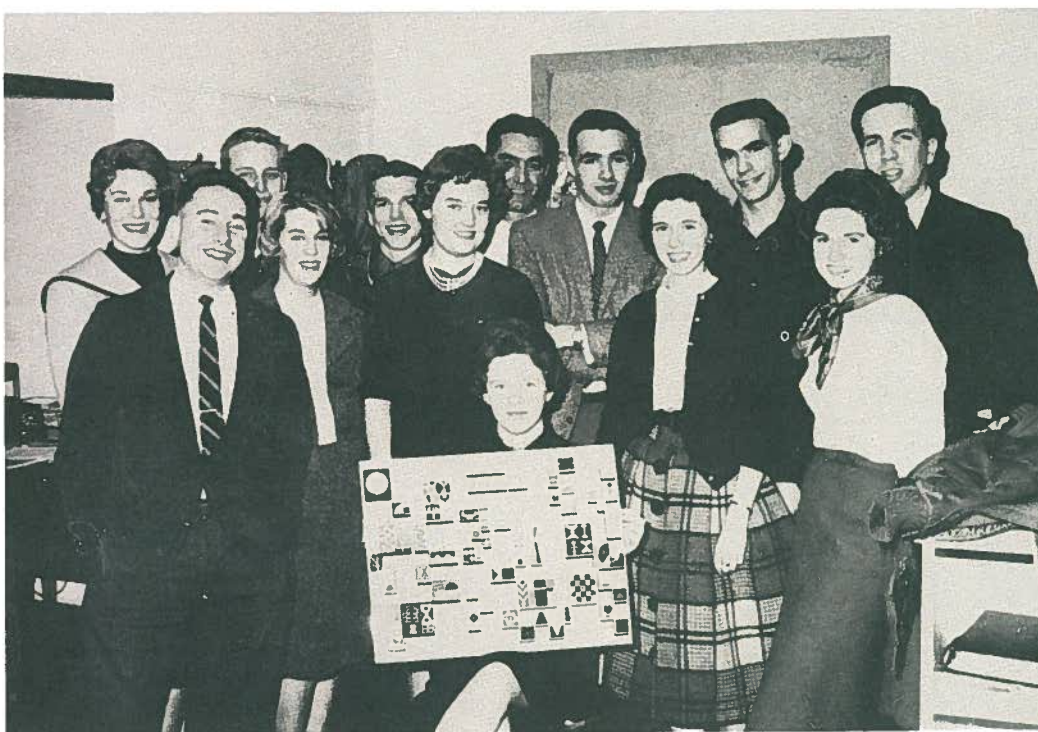

OPEN HOUSE COMMITTEE

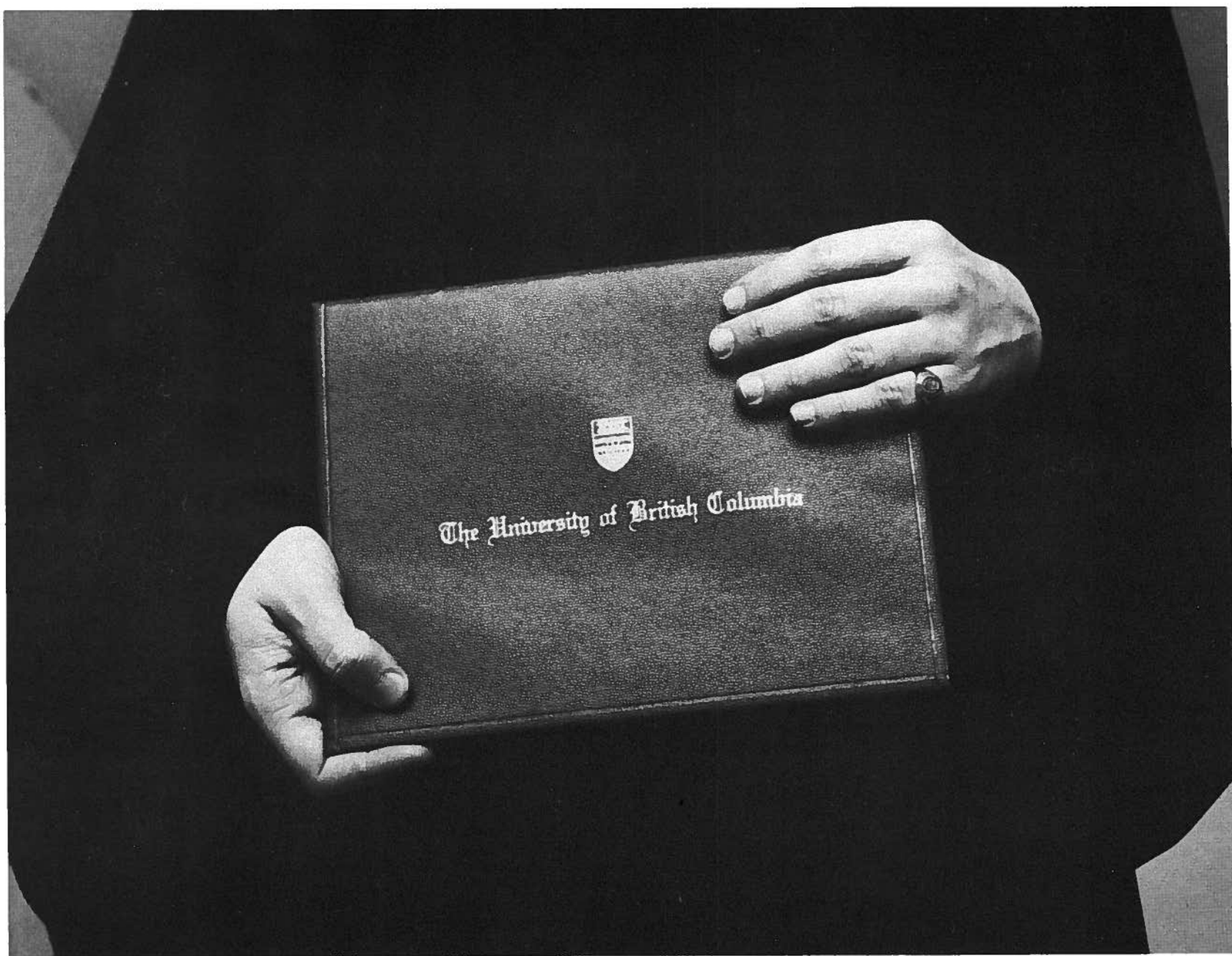
Open House at U.B.C. is held every three years in order to make the people of B.C. more familiar with the work and facilities at our university.

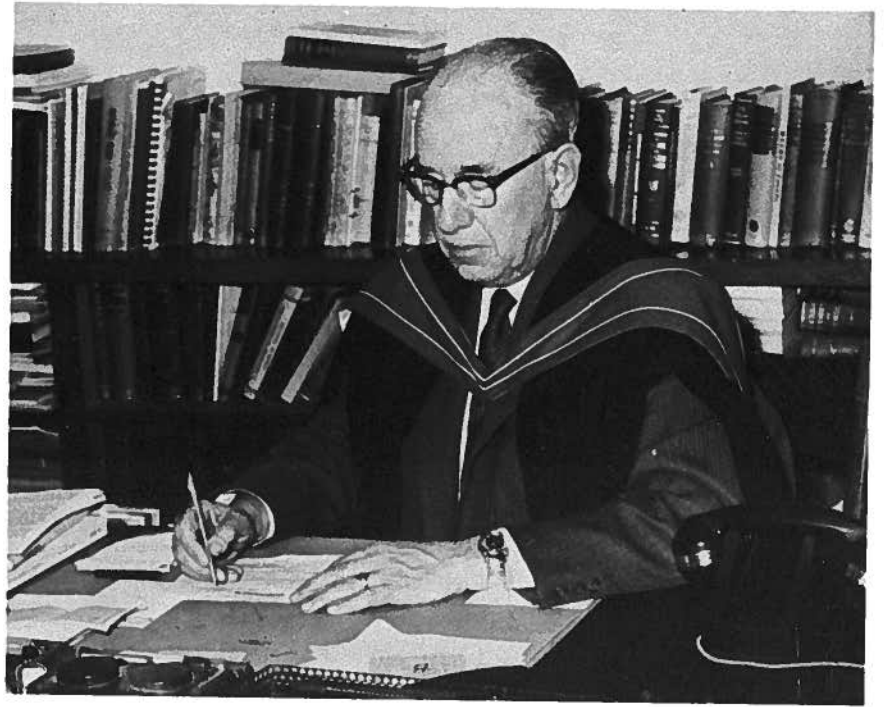


FACULTY OF AGRICULTURE

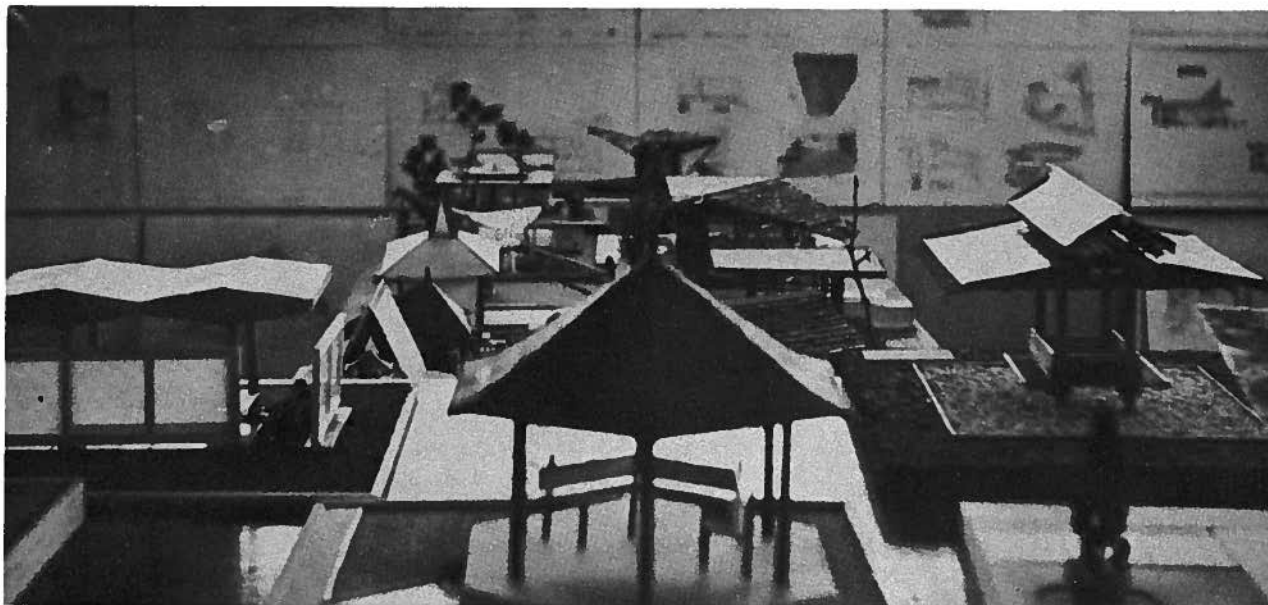

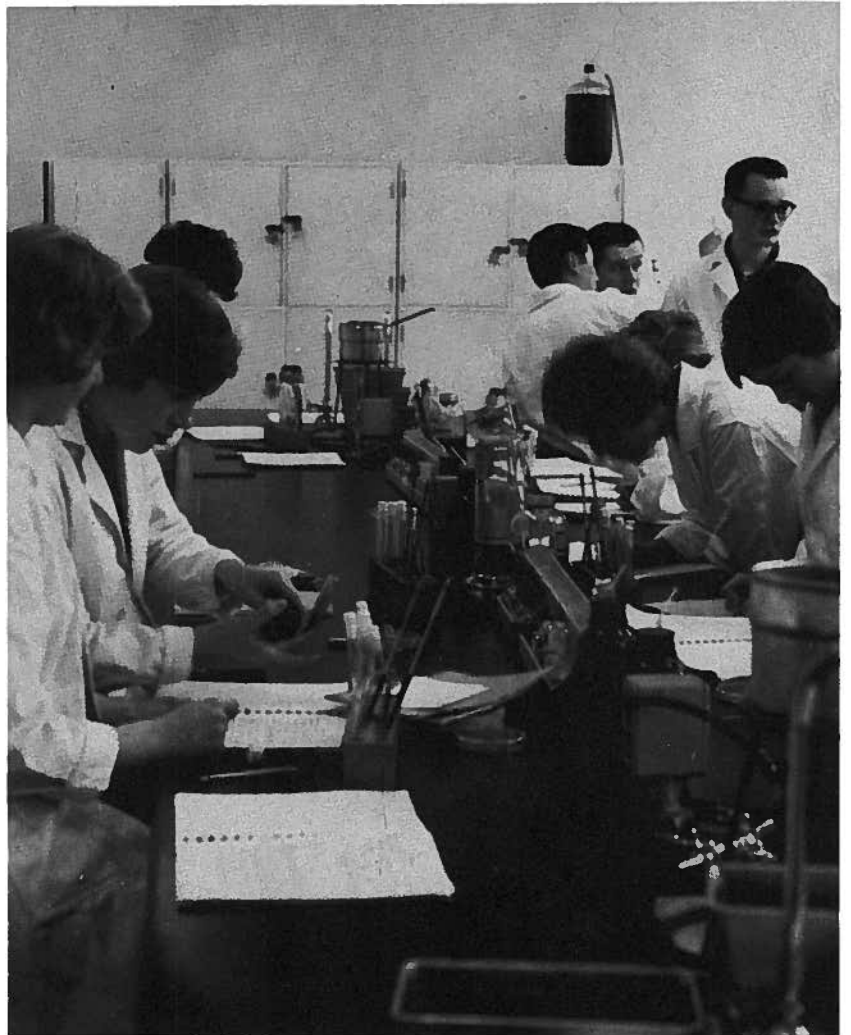

The largest faculty on campus, Arts and Science students numbered 5,358 this year. Despite this unwieldy size, President Mac Brown has worked hard with the undergraduate council in sponsoring such activities as Arts week and an ASUS dance in February. Next year closer-knit organization should be possible since Arts and Science students decided to split into two undergraduate societies, this January.

Evidence of the burgeoning growth of the faculty is the expansion of Asian Studies into a full-scale department this year, headed by Dr. William Holland, director of the Pacific Institute and formerly of New York. With the added scope of this important department, UBC becomes one of the foremost centres of Oriental research in the western world.

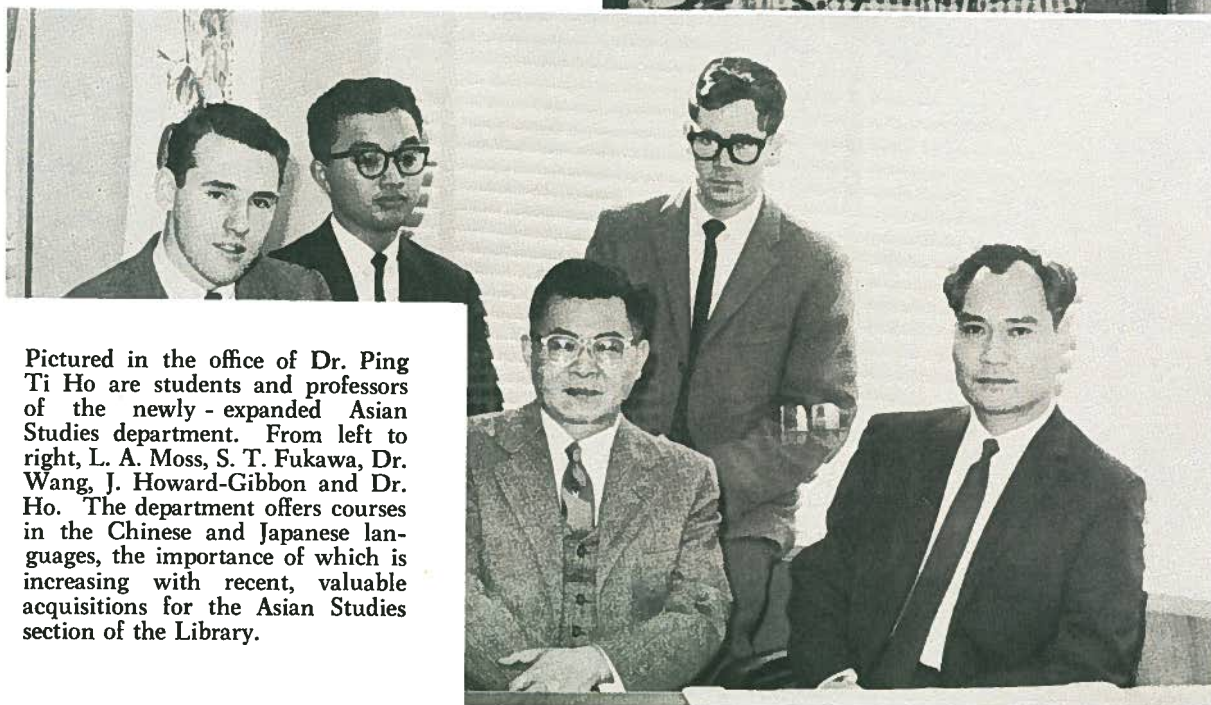

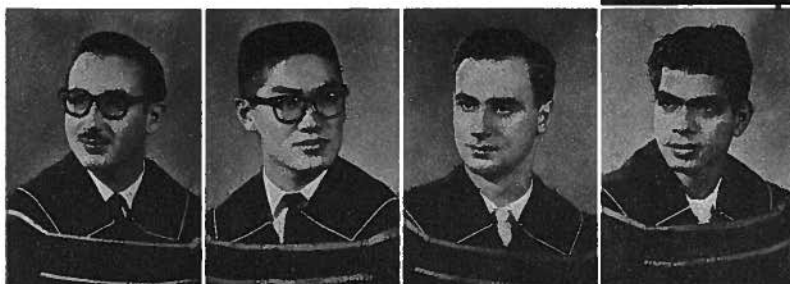

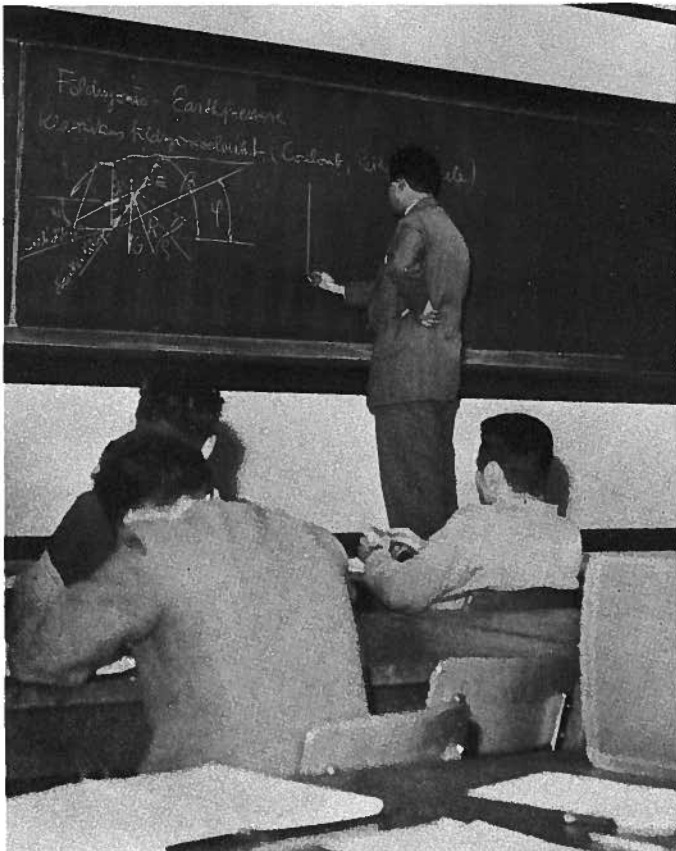
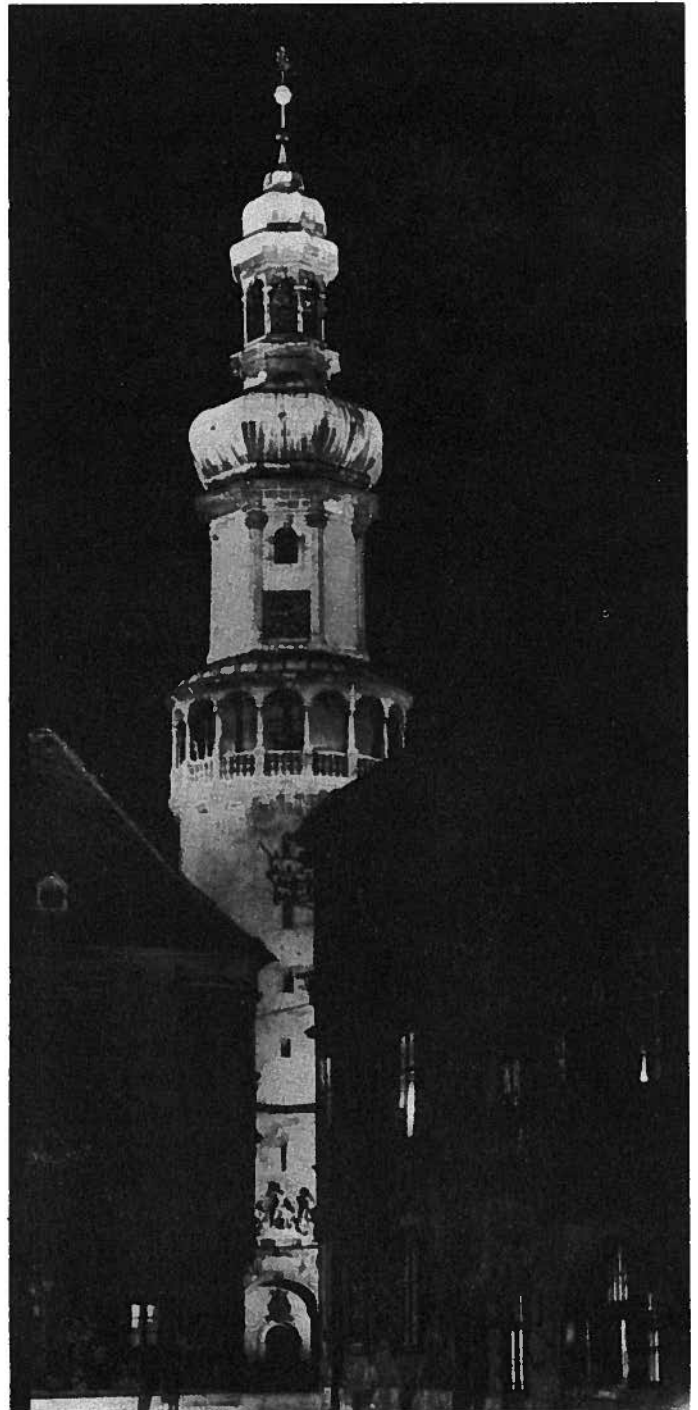
SOPRON FACULTY OF FORESTRY

Several new departments have been established recently including the department of continuing medical education, and many research activities are underway, among them studies in rheumatology and lung cancer.

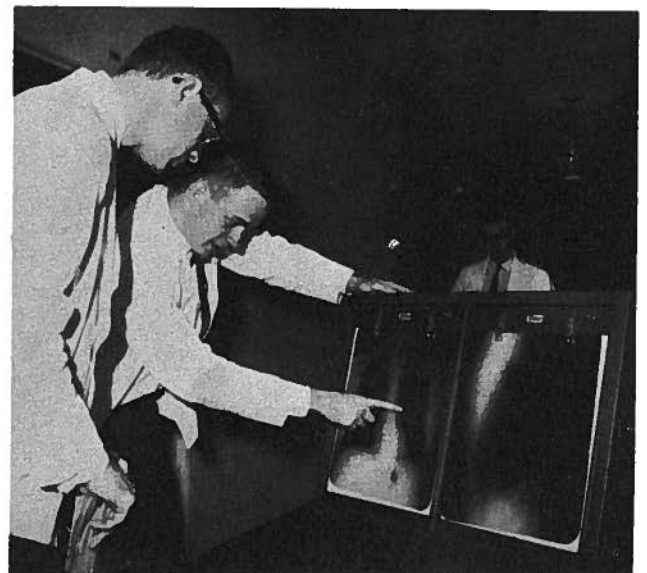

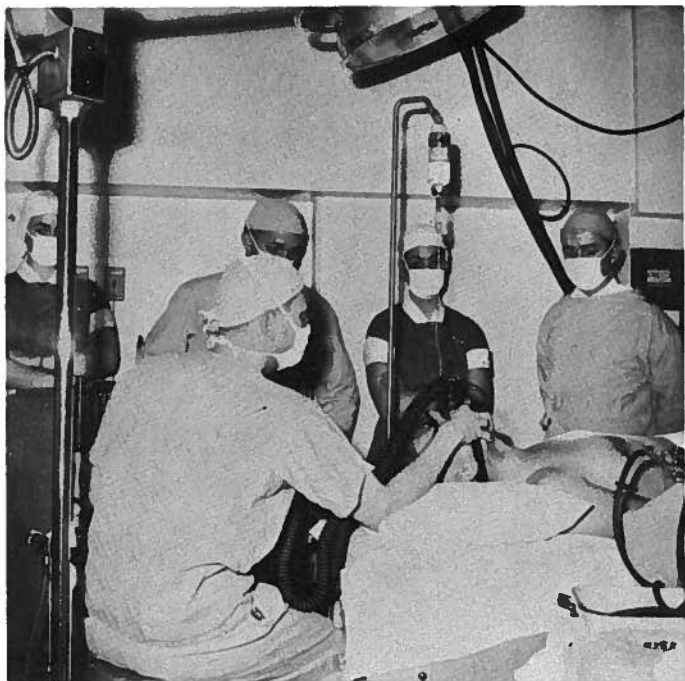

The year has been an active one under president Leo Richards; high-lights included the fall "Bromo Ball" and, of course, the spring graduation banquet.

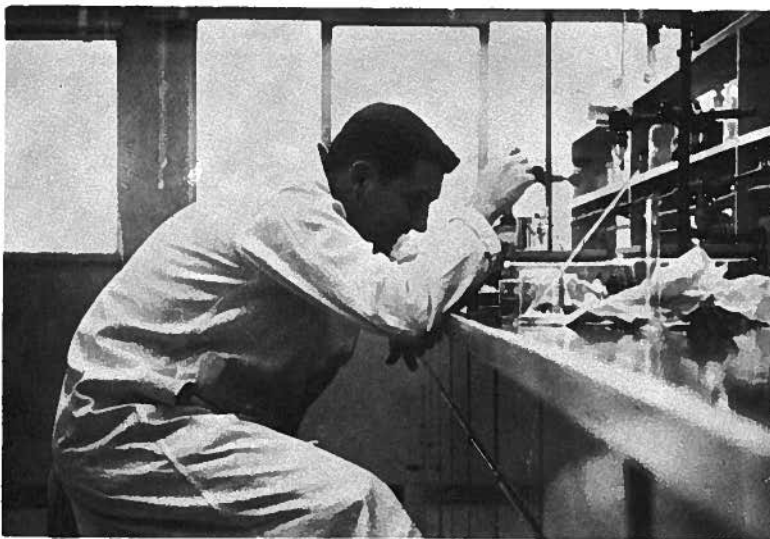

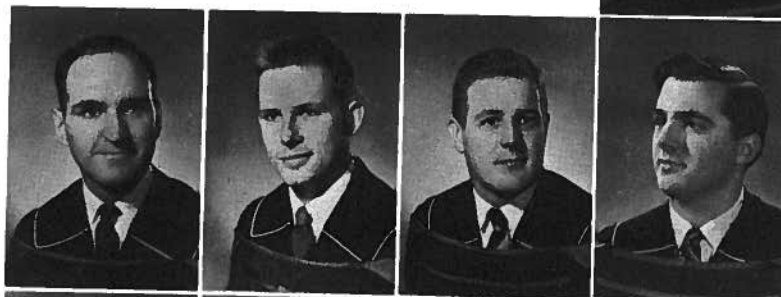

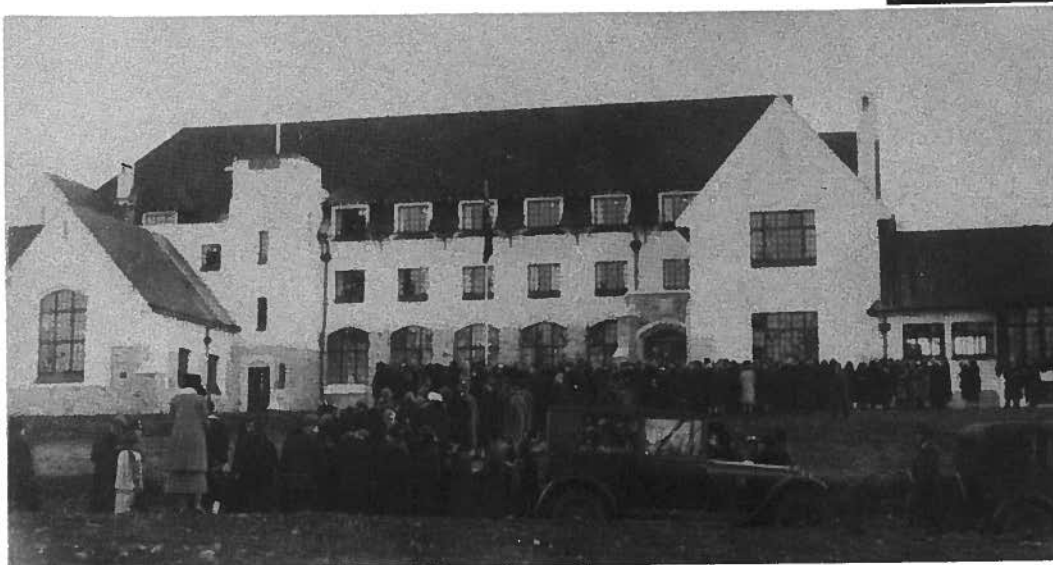

ANGLICAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE

During the 1960-61 Academic term, the Anglican Theological College of B.C. celebrated the fiftieth anniversary of Anglican theological education in the Province. Although the College was incorporated in 1912, the actual work of theological education began in October, 1910, with the opening of Bishop Latimer Hall on Haro Street; in 1912, another hall, St. Mark's, opened on Davie Street. In 1920, the two halls were amalgamated in the one College at the Haro Street property. When the University moved to Point Grey, the present College buildings were erected and officially opened in November, 1927.

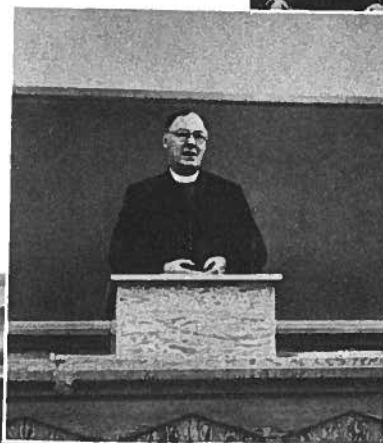

An academic wing and a library, long mooted, is becoming a reality; work is underway on this project and is scheduled to be completed in the fall of 1962.



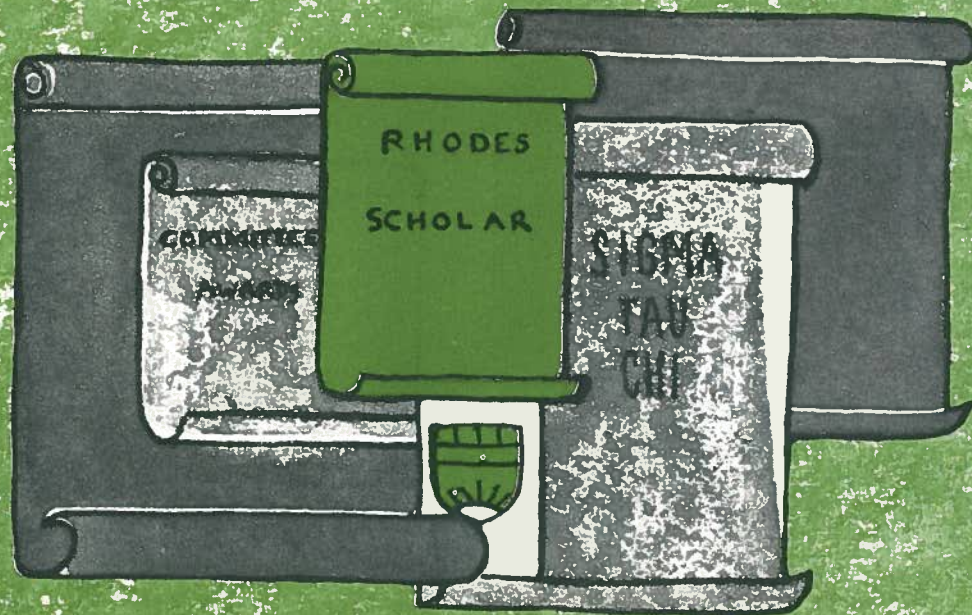

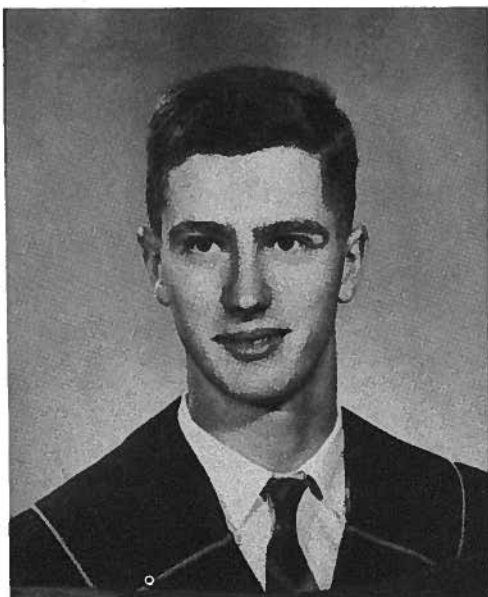
1961 RHODES SCHOLAR JOHN MADDEN

After a month's vacation in Spain, John will work towards his Ph.D. in Physics at Oxford.

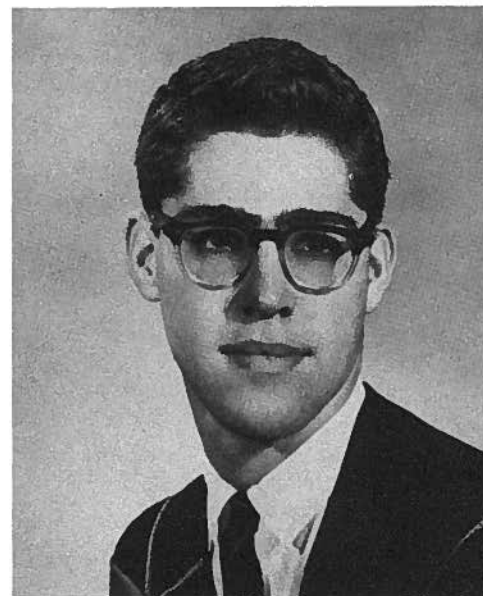

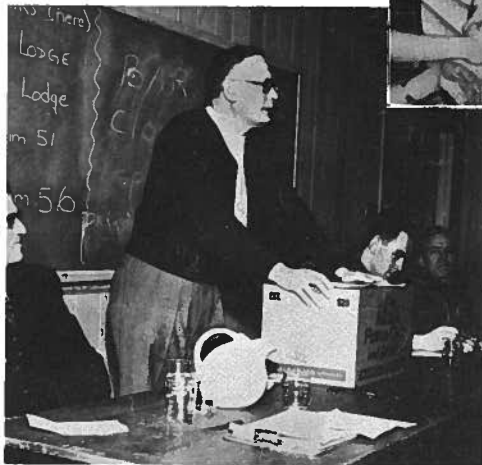
ACADEMIC SYMPOSIUM

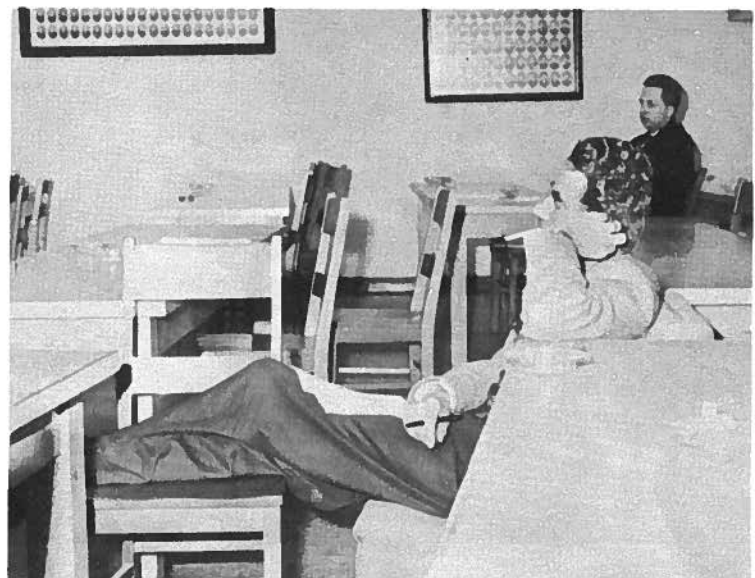

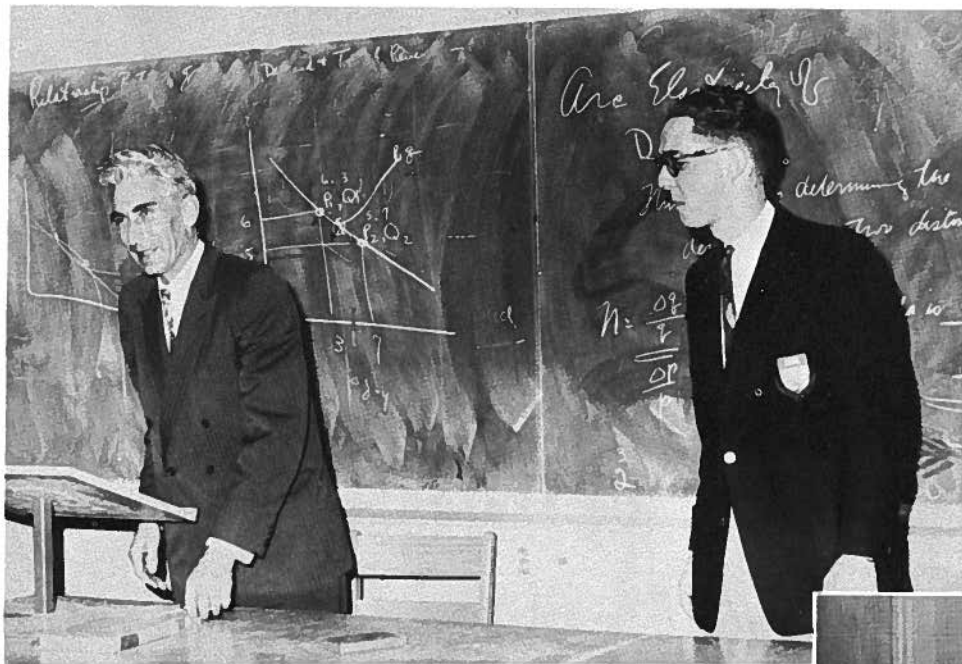

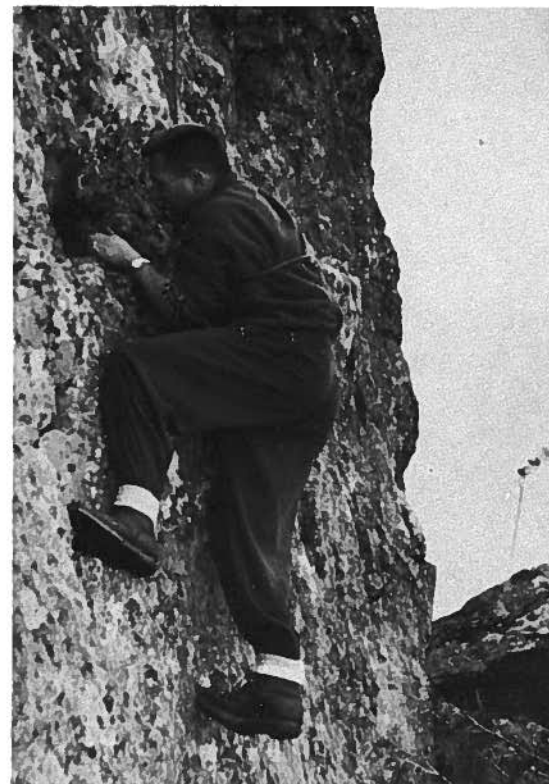

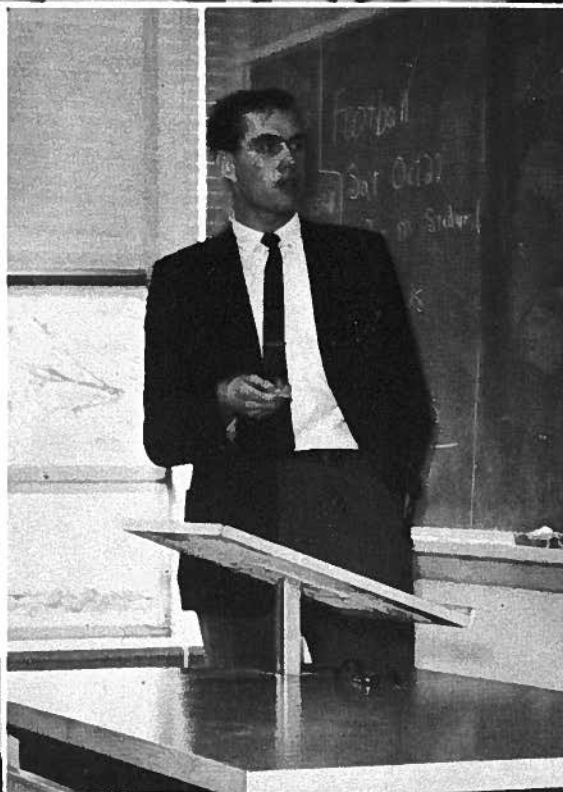

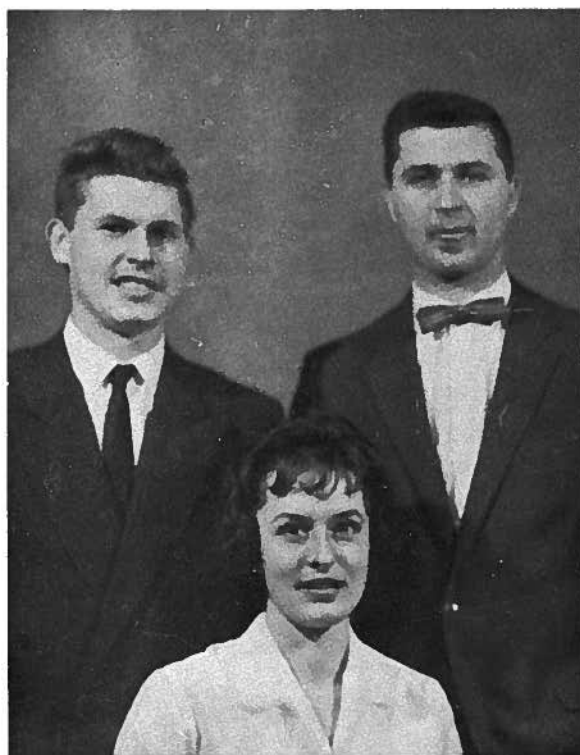
GERMAN CLUB

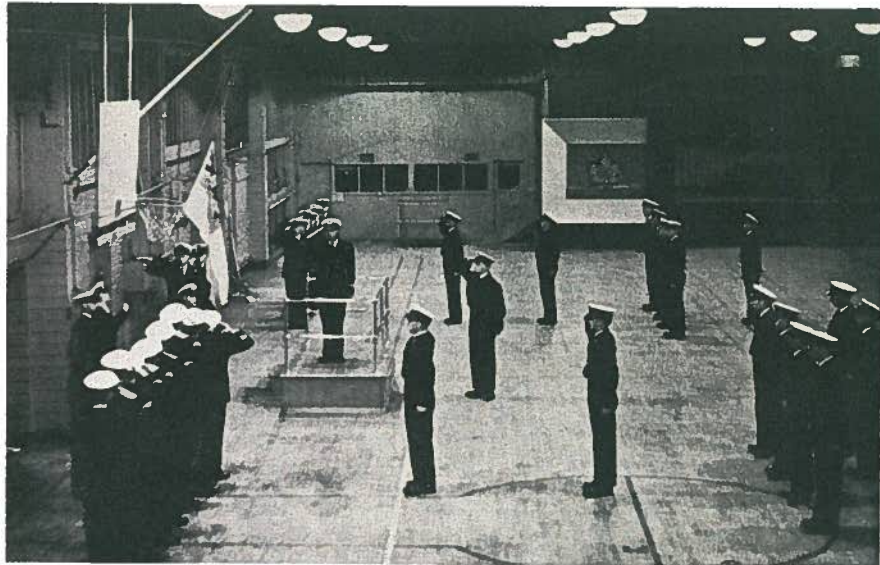

ANGLICAN THEOLOGICAL COLLEGE



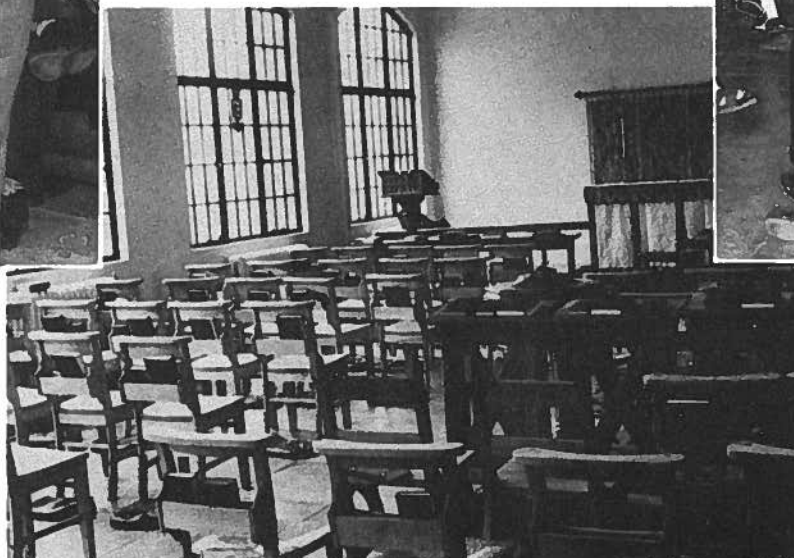
The College.

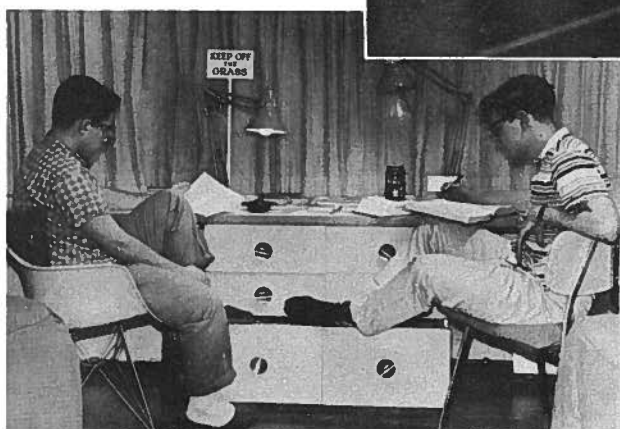

St. Mark's College was incorporated on March 2, 1956, as the Catholic Theological College of the University of British Columbia. The building was started in July 1957 and was ready for the Summer School in July 1958. The purpose of St. Mark's is four-fold: (a) to stimulate the pursuit of higher learning at the university level; (b) to provide a religious and social center for all the Catholic students at the University; (c) to provide board and room for men (winter session) and women (summer session) students living away from home.

The library also open to all Catholic students.

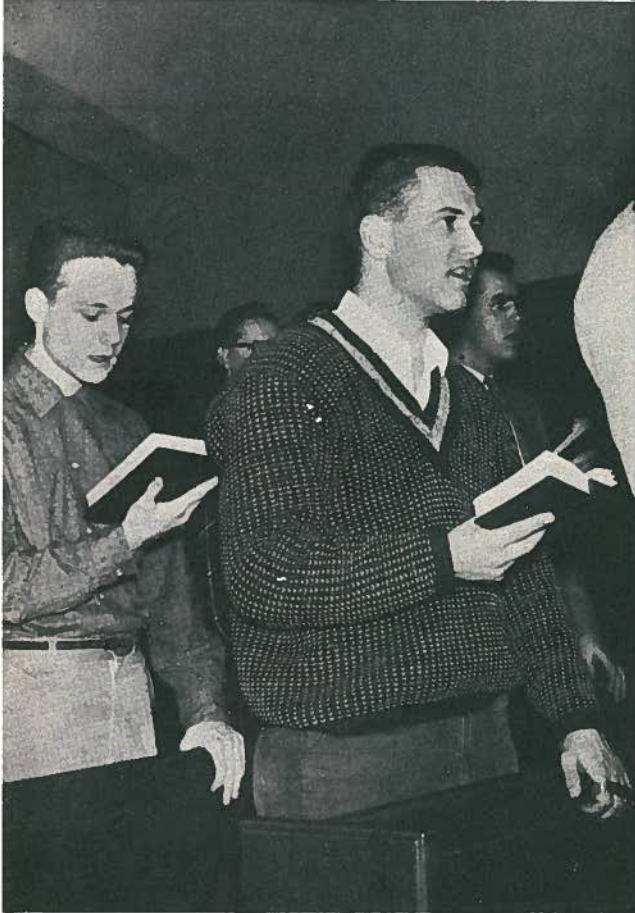

UNION COLLEGE

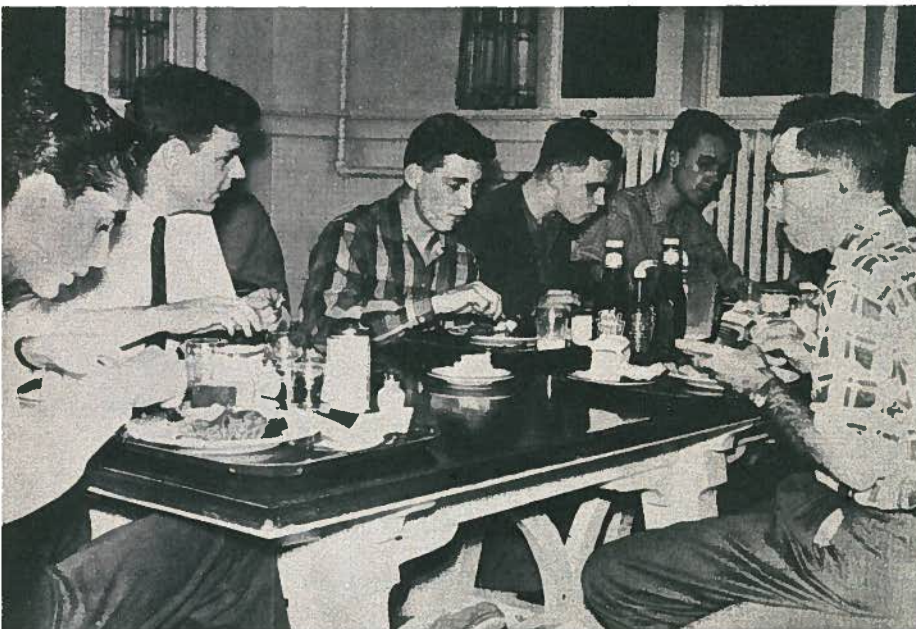

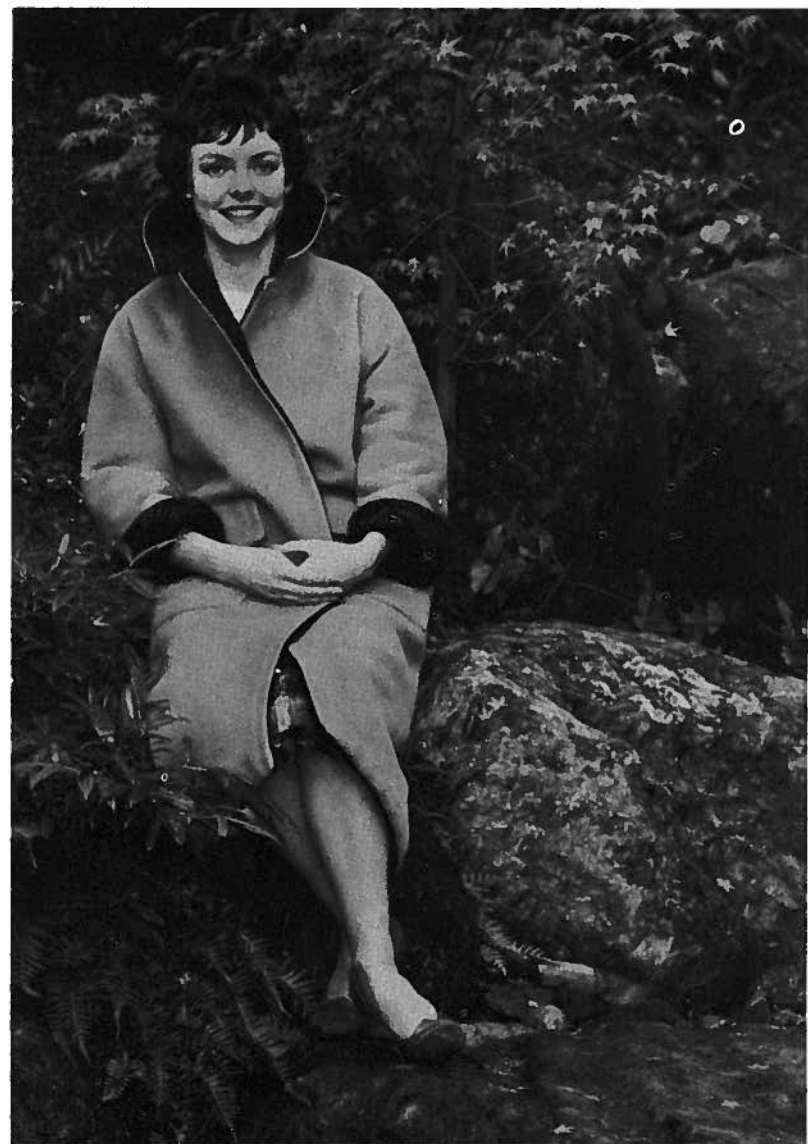

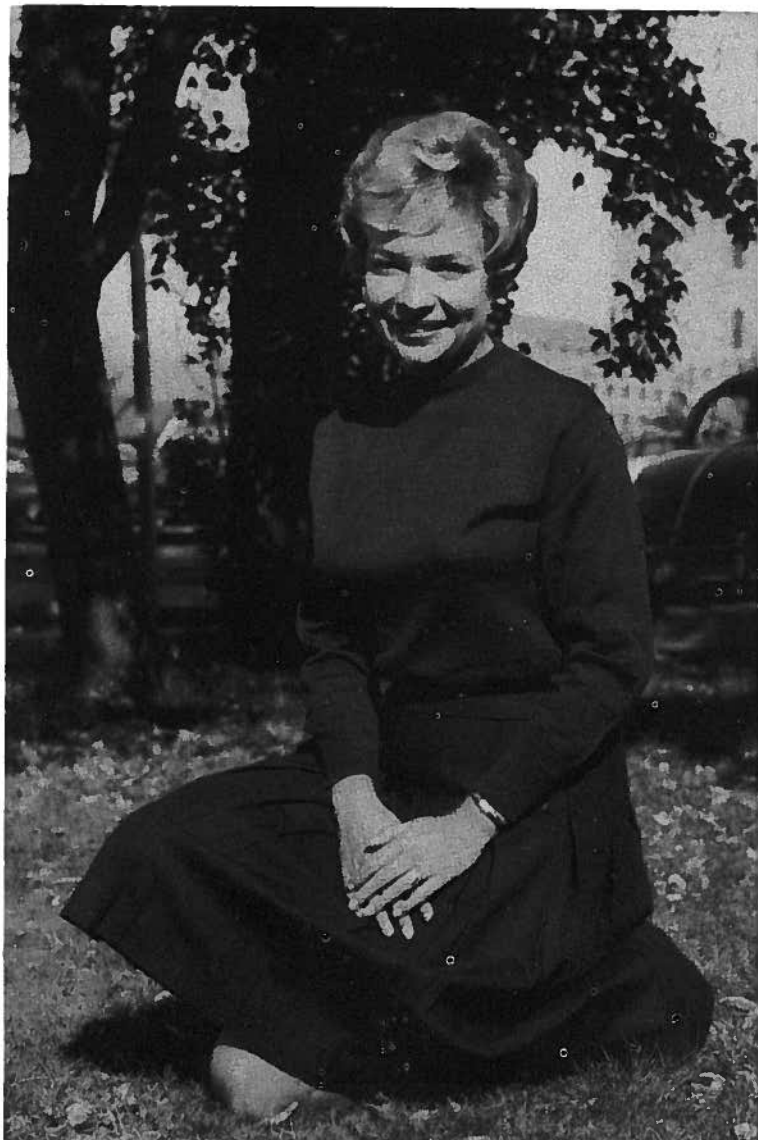

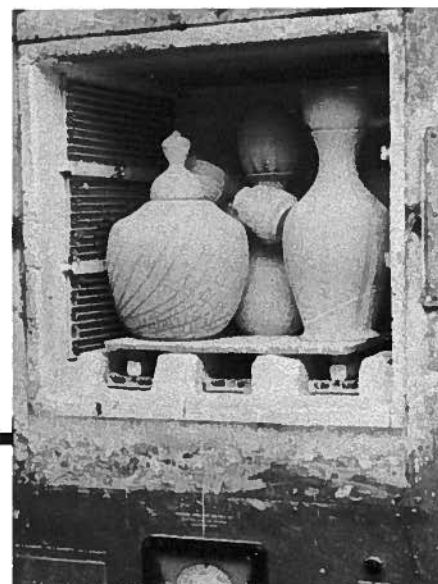

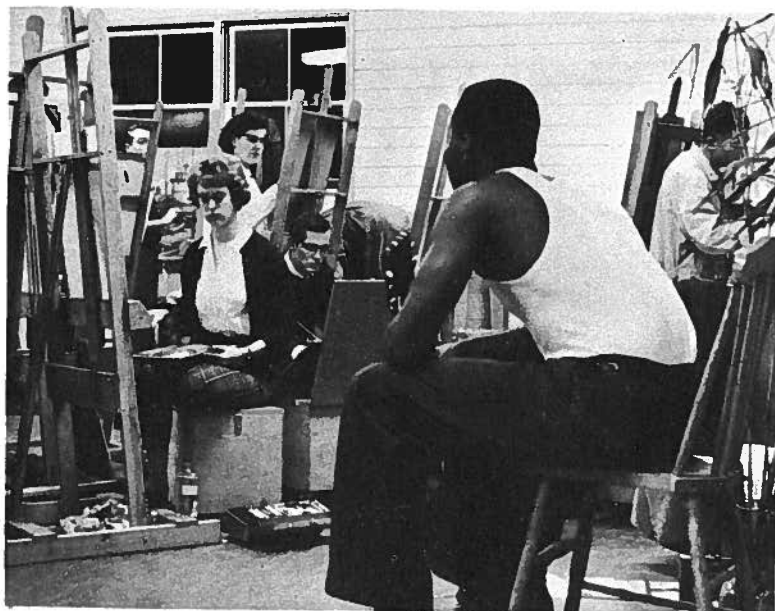

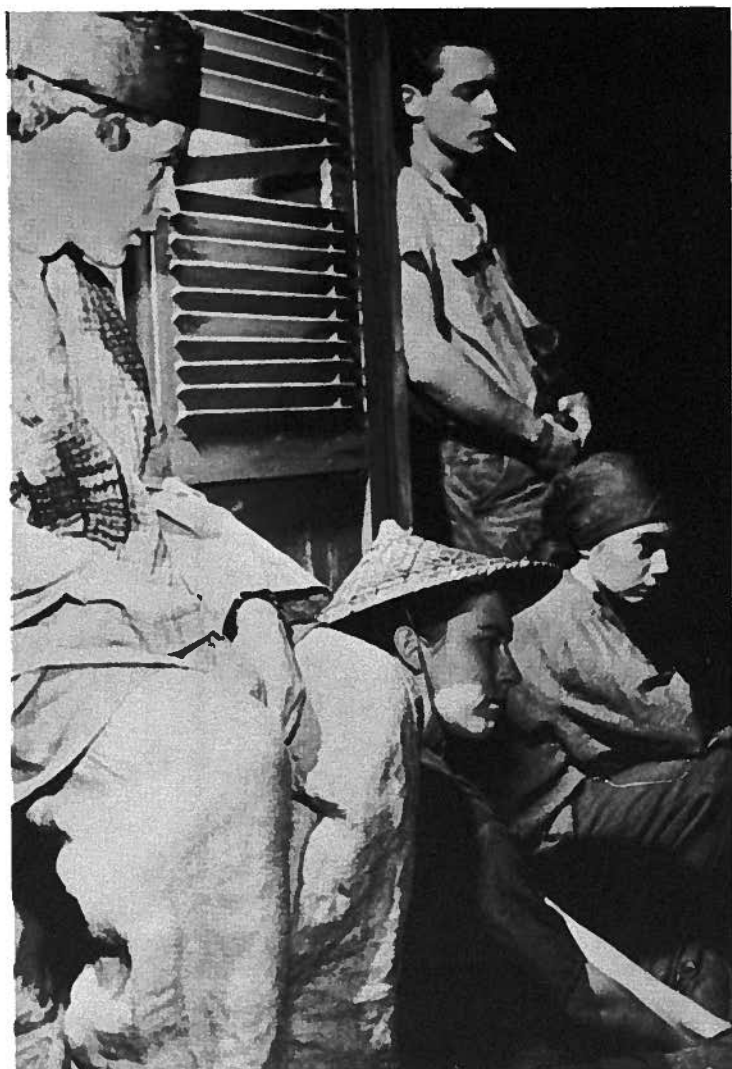

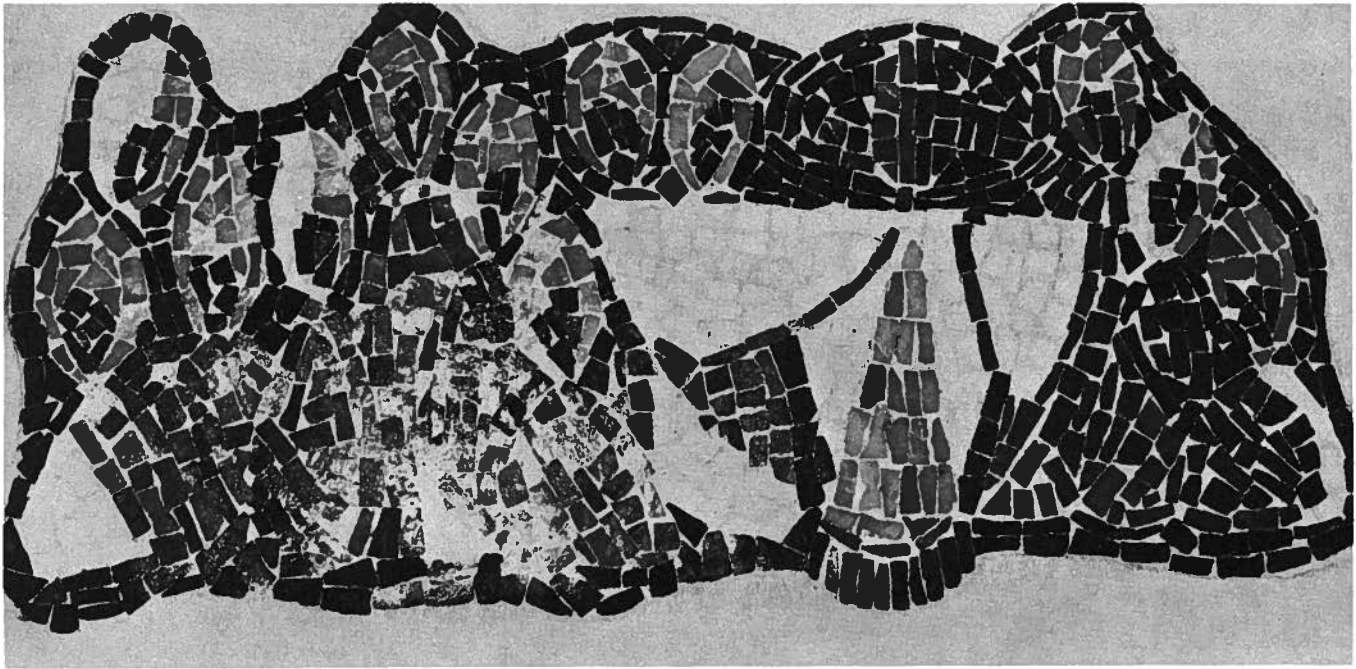

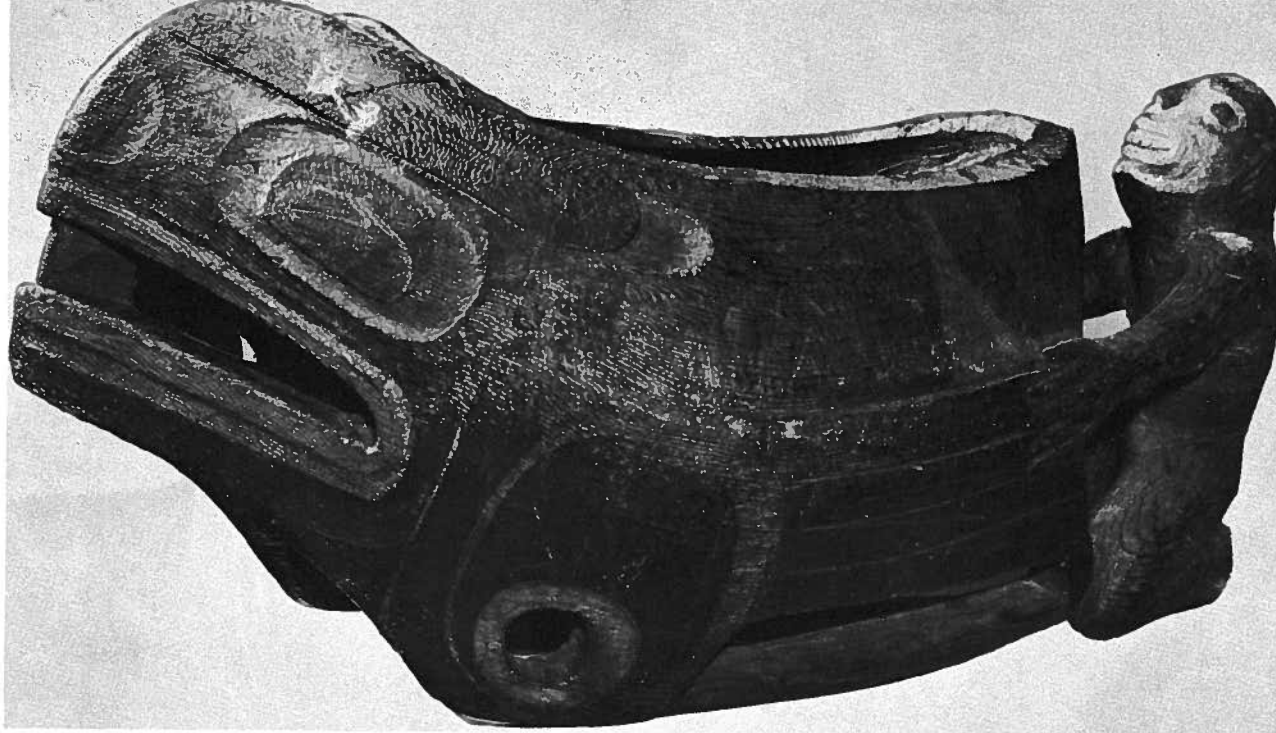

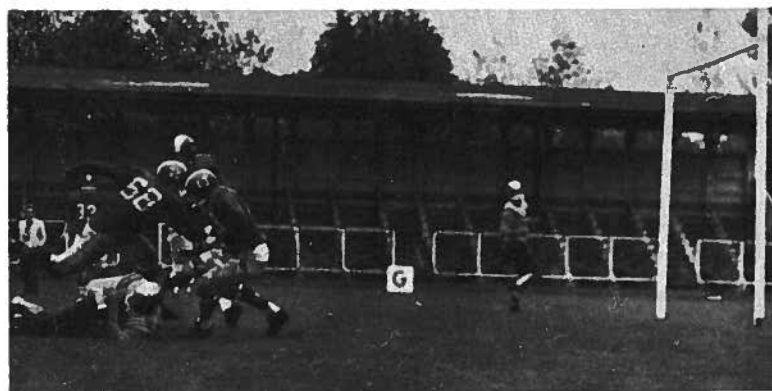

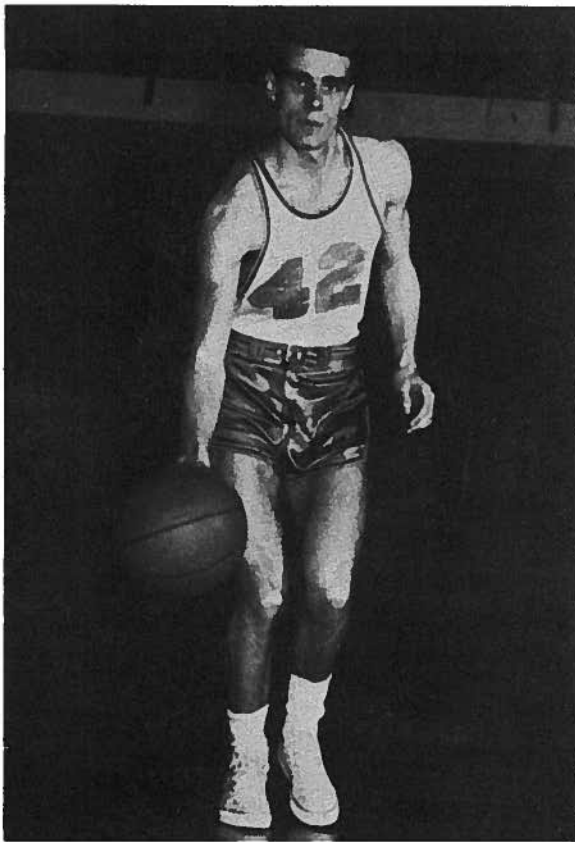


BASKETBALL

This was the second Totem championship for U.B.C. in the tournament's ten year history, and the first since 1955.

Outclassing all other teams in the league, the Thunderbirds also won their second consecutive W.C.I.A.U. basketball title. Although competition had improved tremendously this year, the U.B.C. team won the title in ten straight wins. Last season the Birds were W.C.I.A.U. champions with a brilliant 11-1 record. All star guard Ken Winslade, most valuable player in the W.C.I.A.U., was captain of the Thunderbirds this year. Jack Pomfret, assisted by Reid Mitchell, coached the team.

The U.B.C. Jayvees won most of their games in the Vancouver Senior "A" League and in exhibition games. The Braves, playing in the Junior Men's League, also did very well in competition.

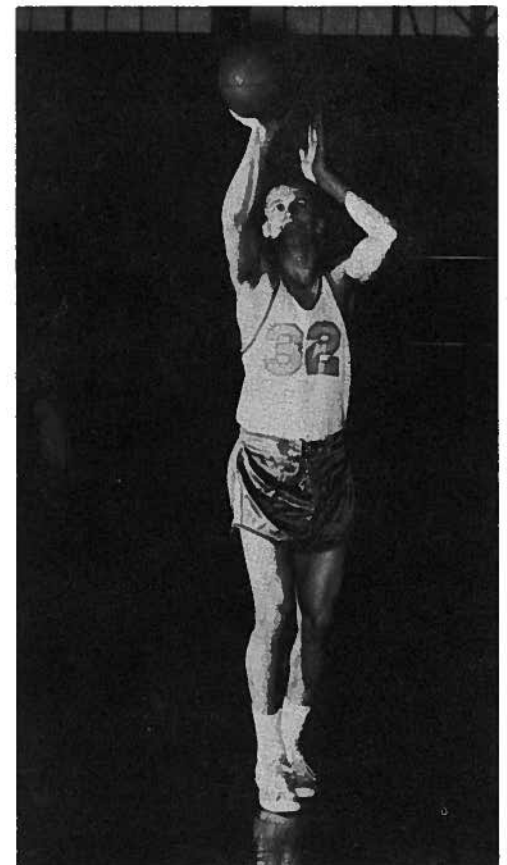

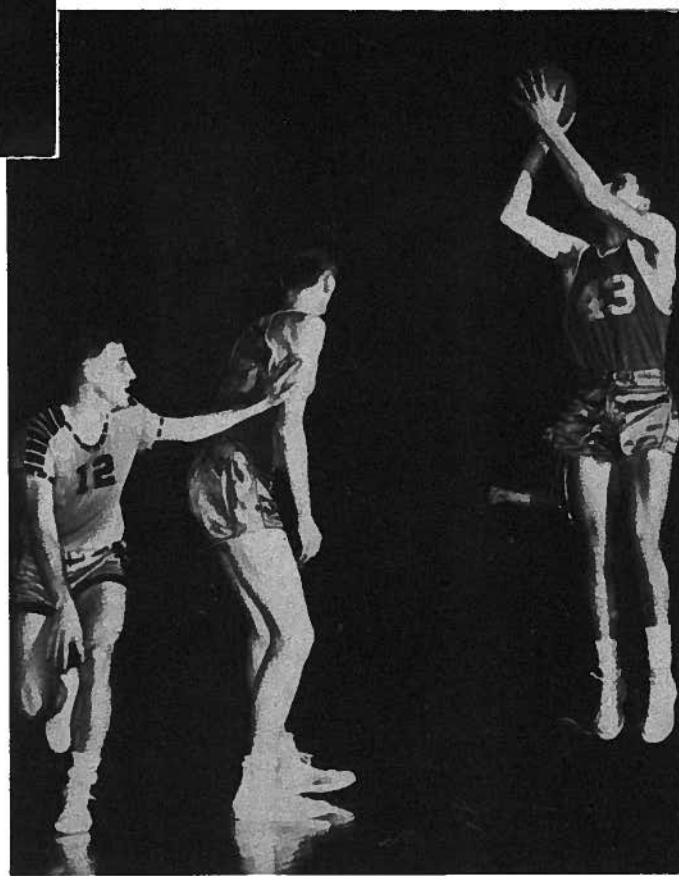

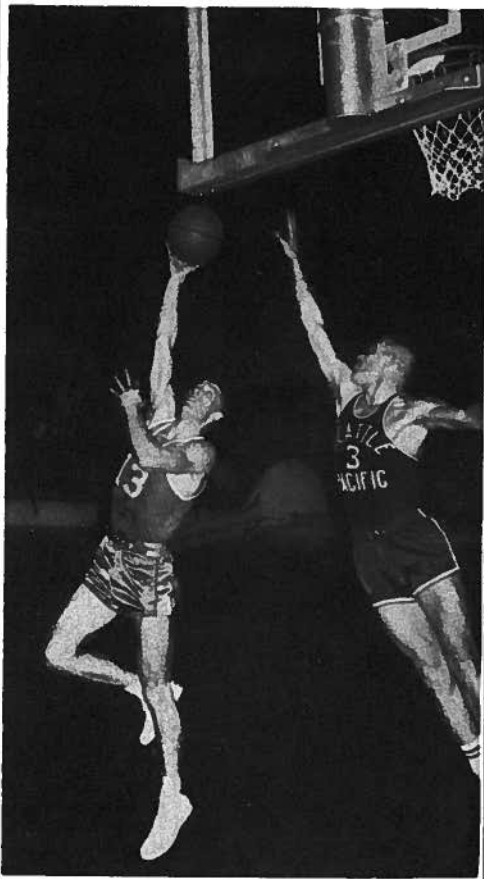

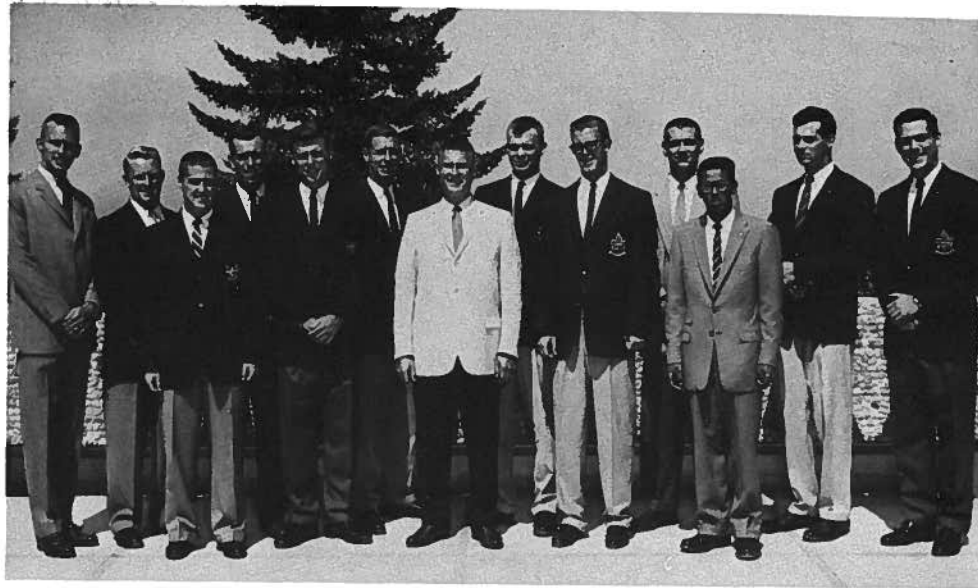

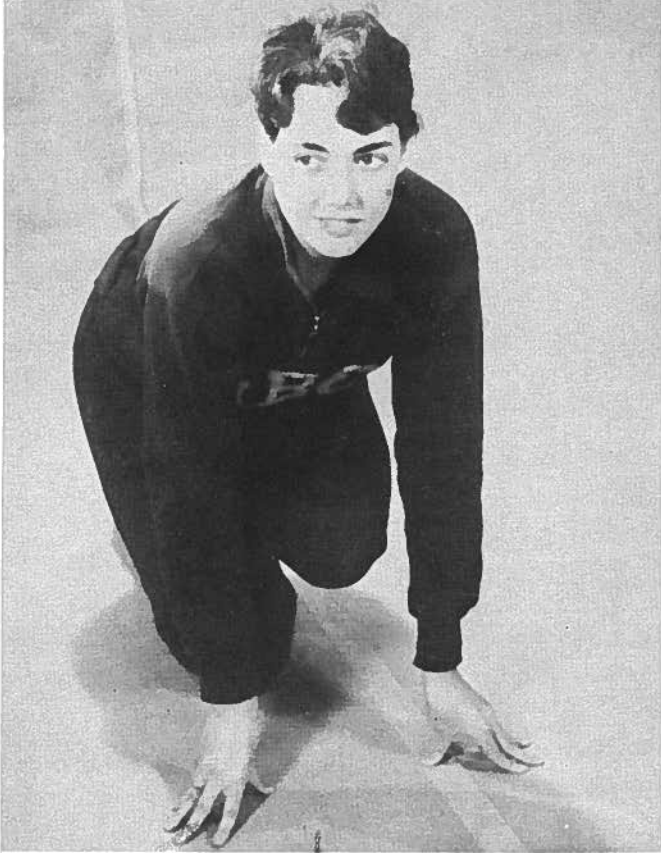


GRASSHOCKEY

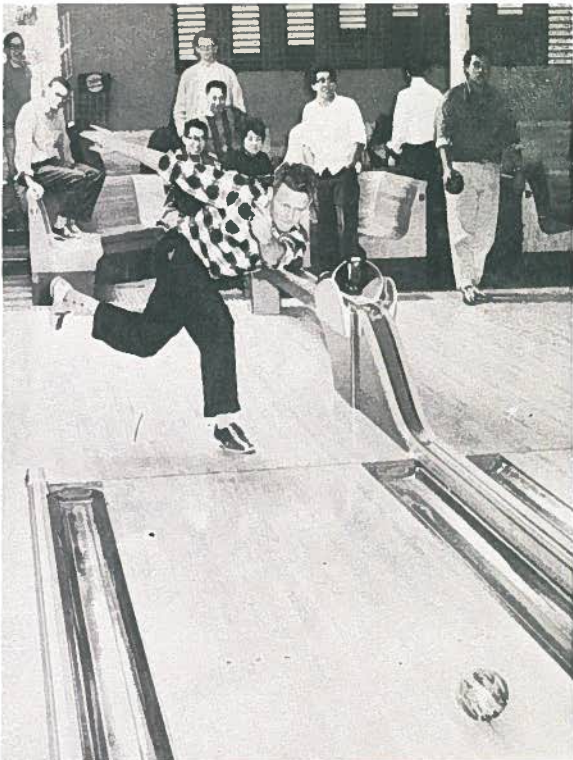

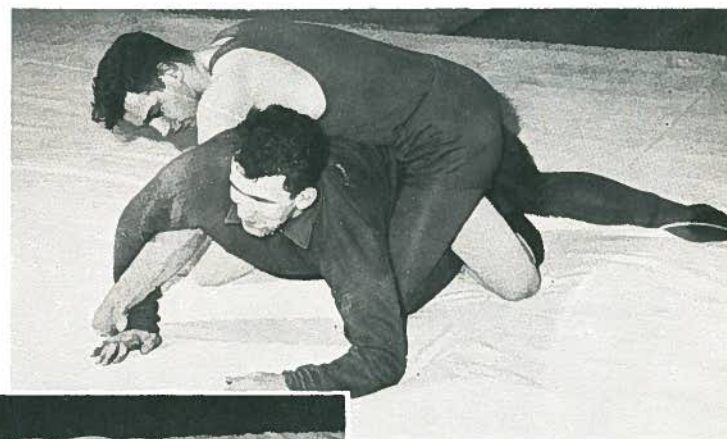

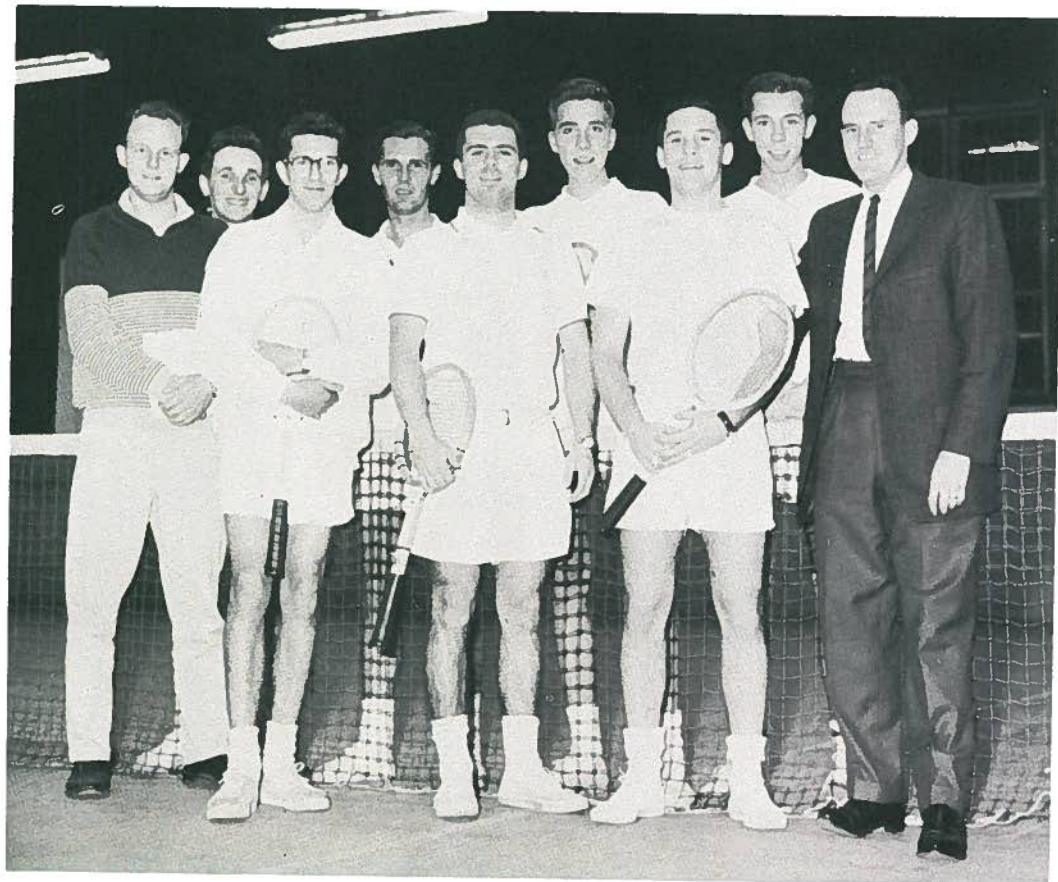

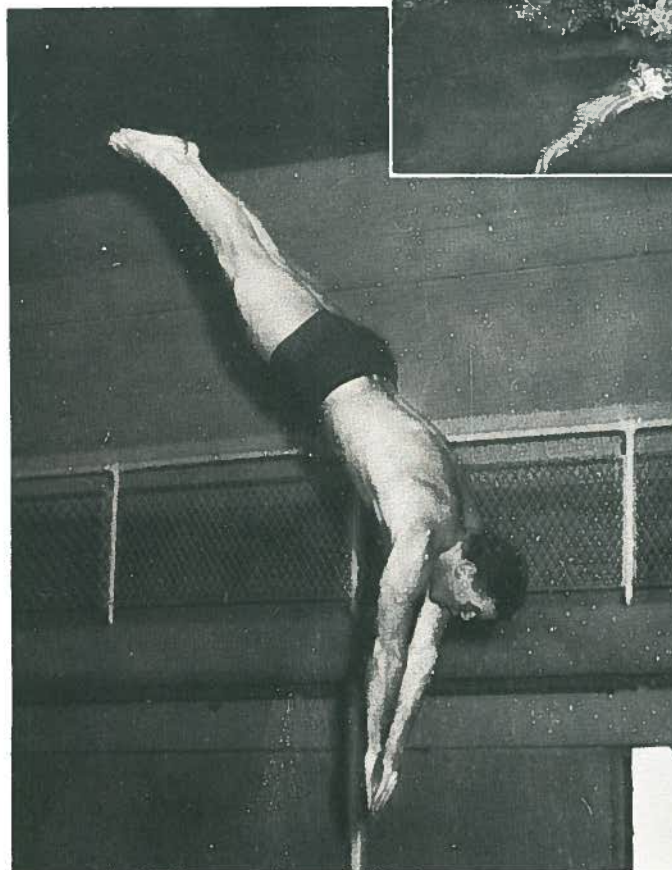
SWIMMING

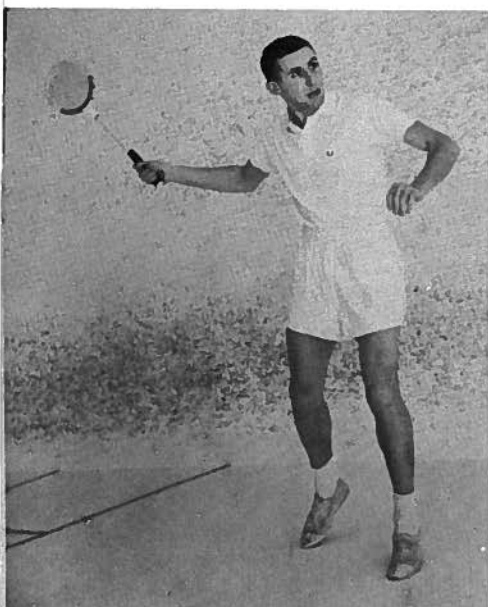

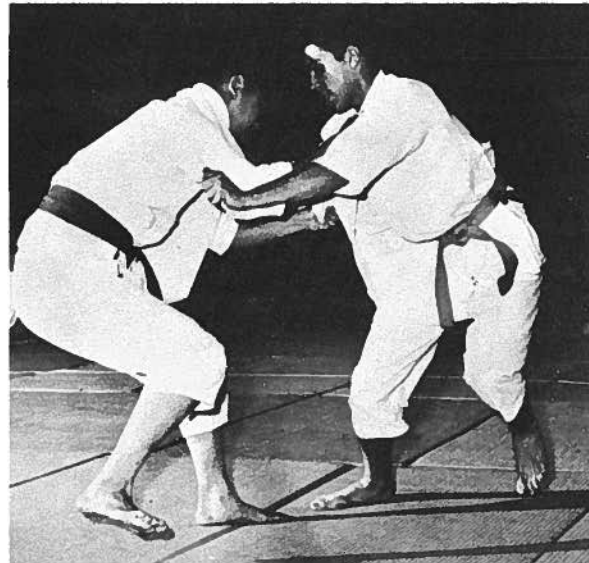

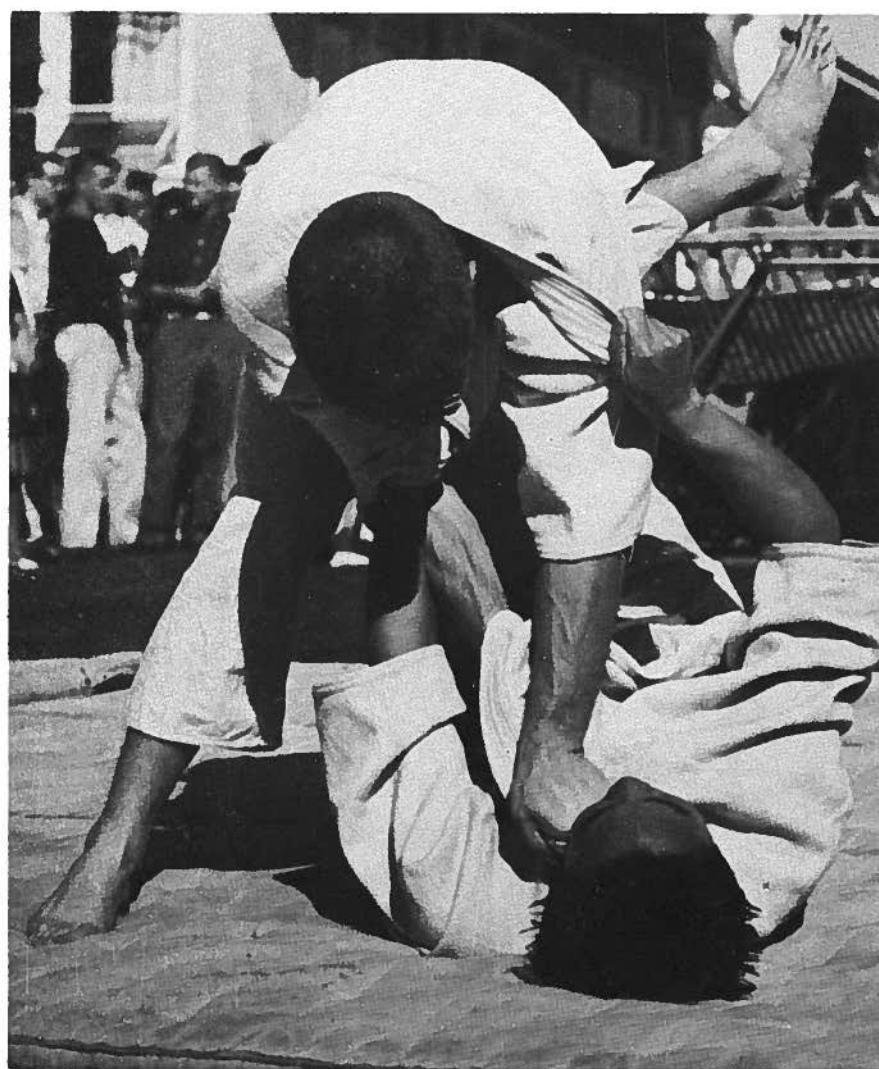

SAILING

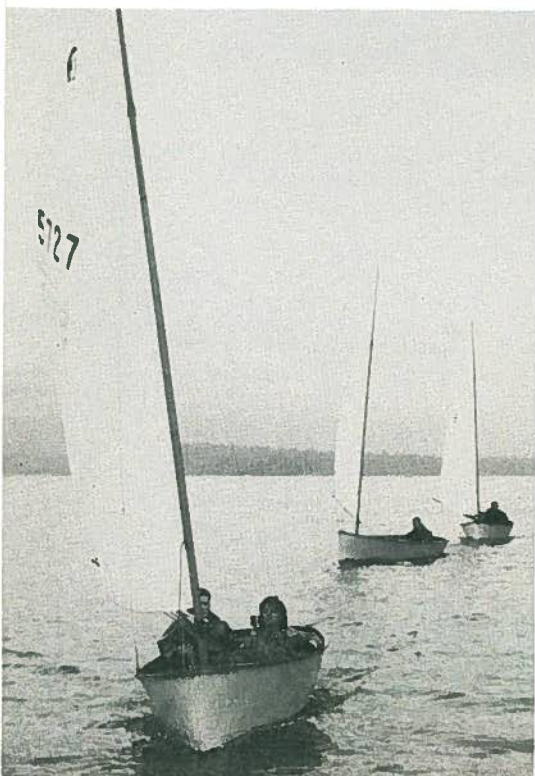

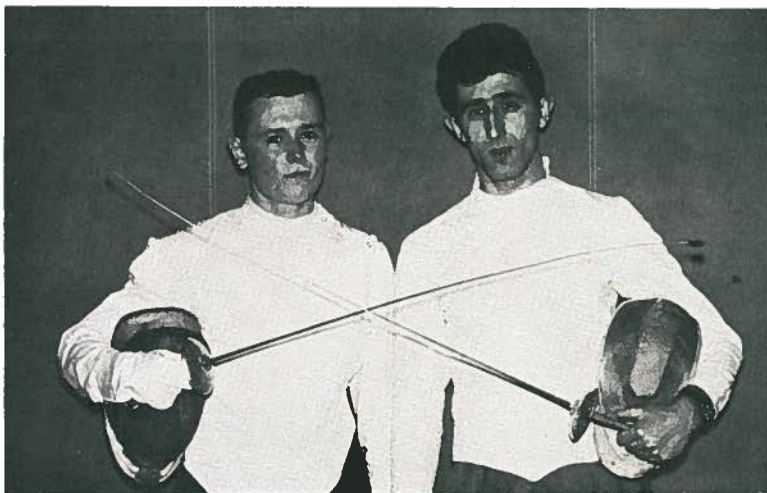

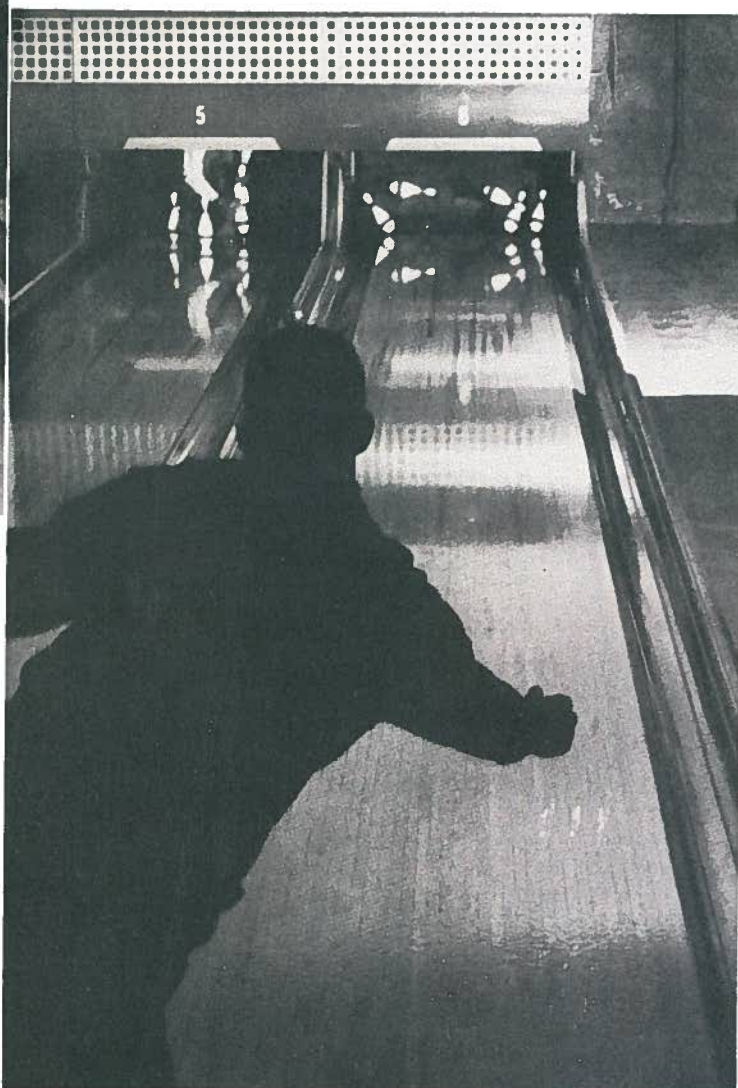
BOWLING

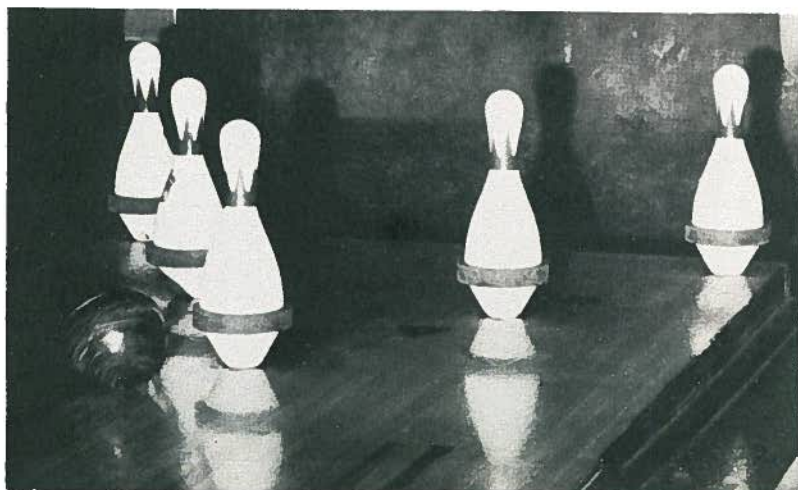

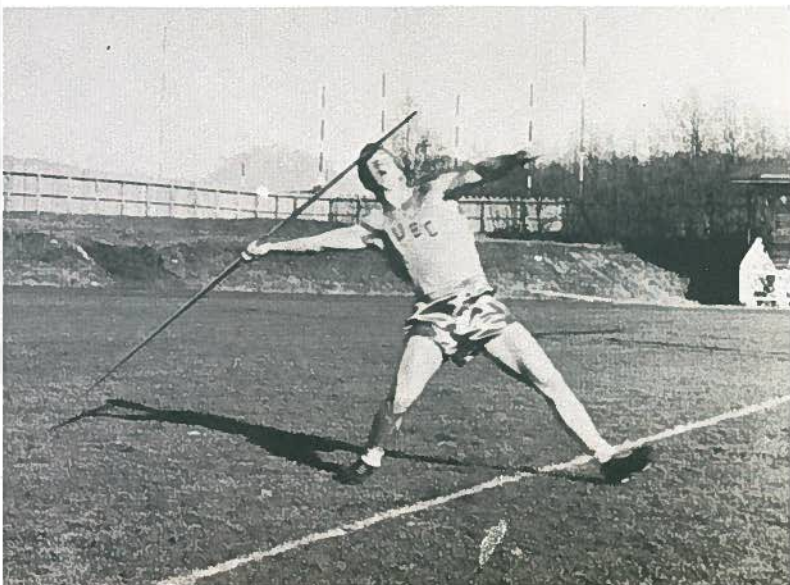

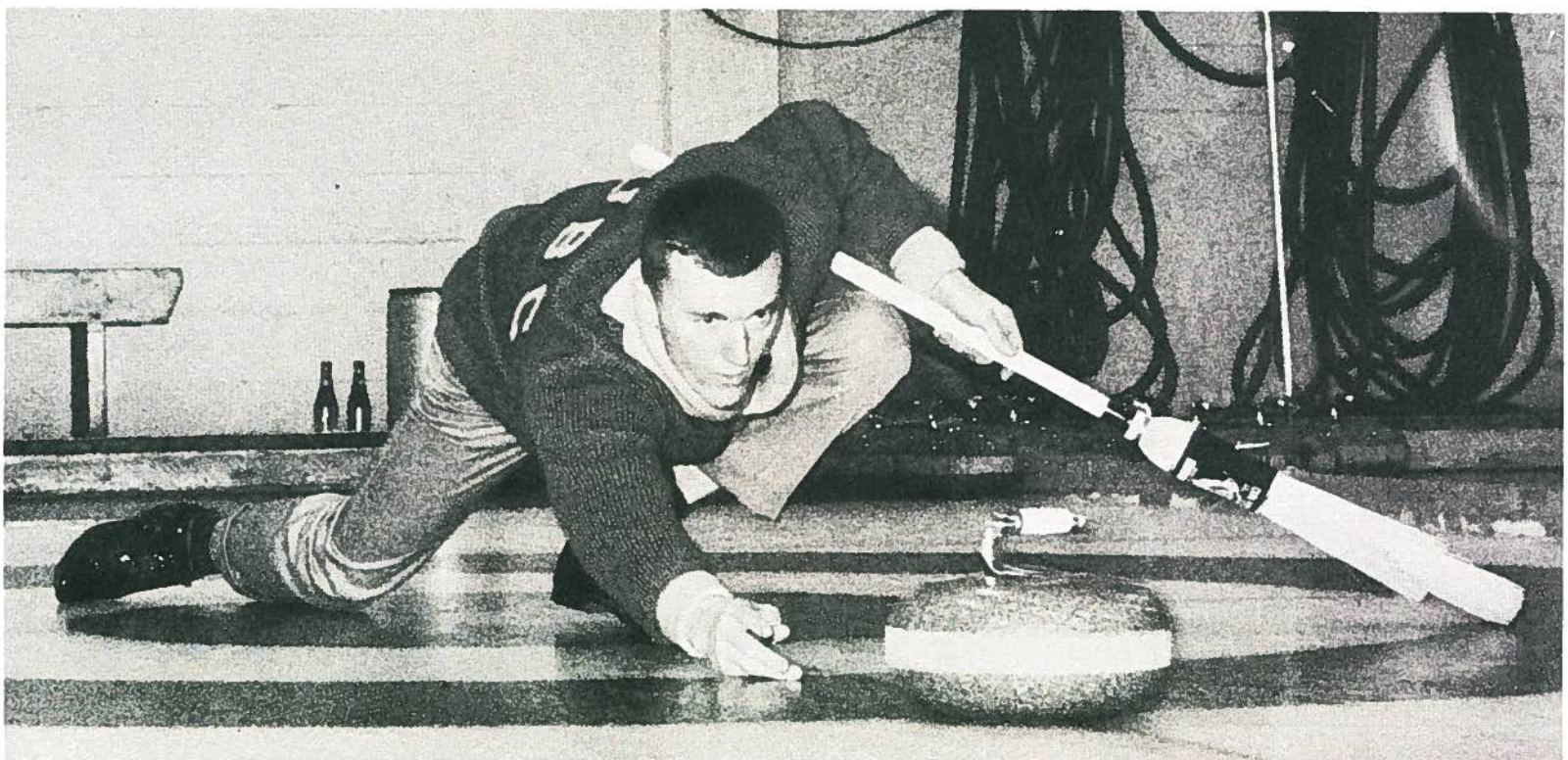

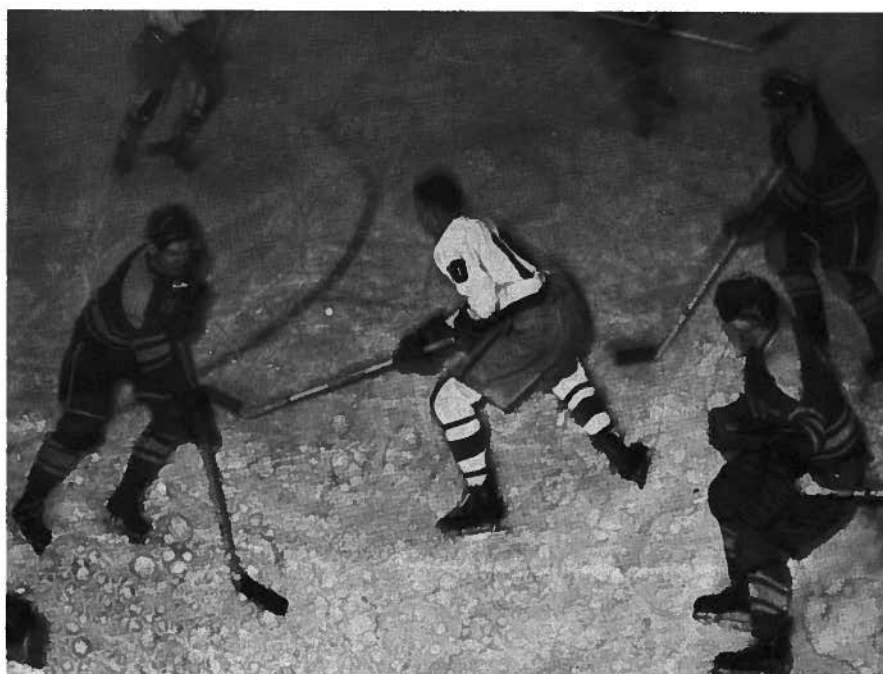

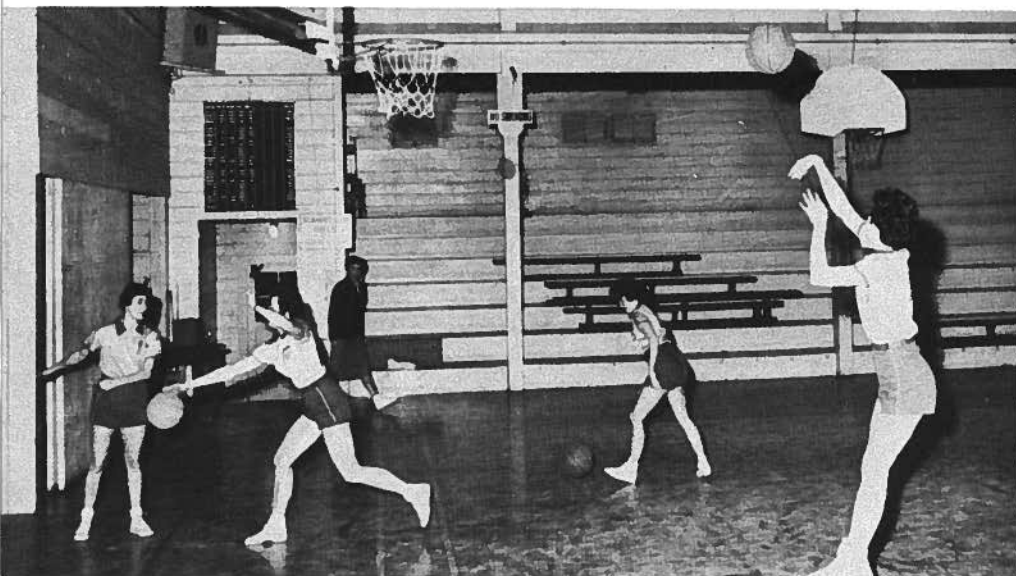

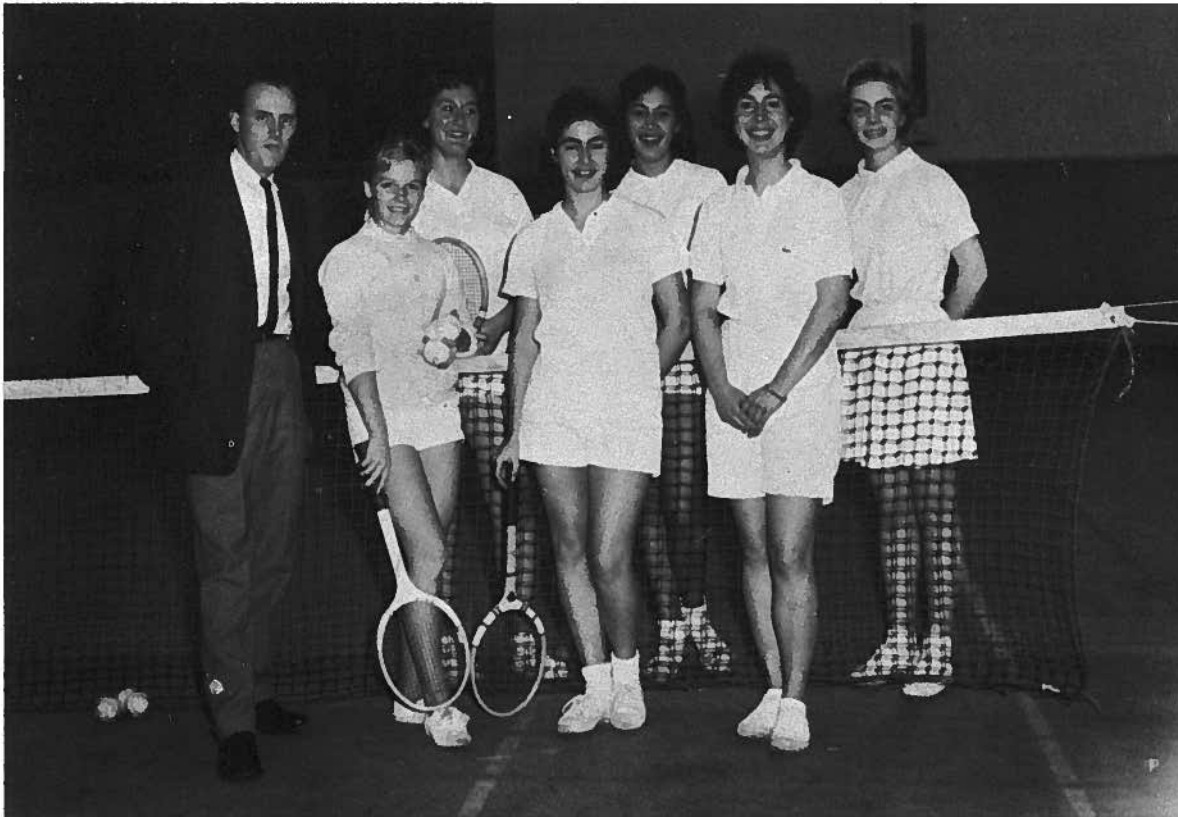

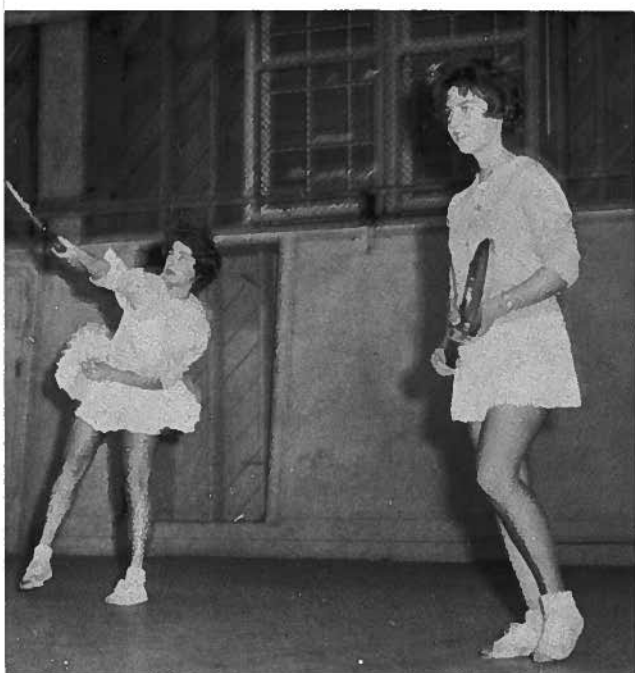

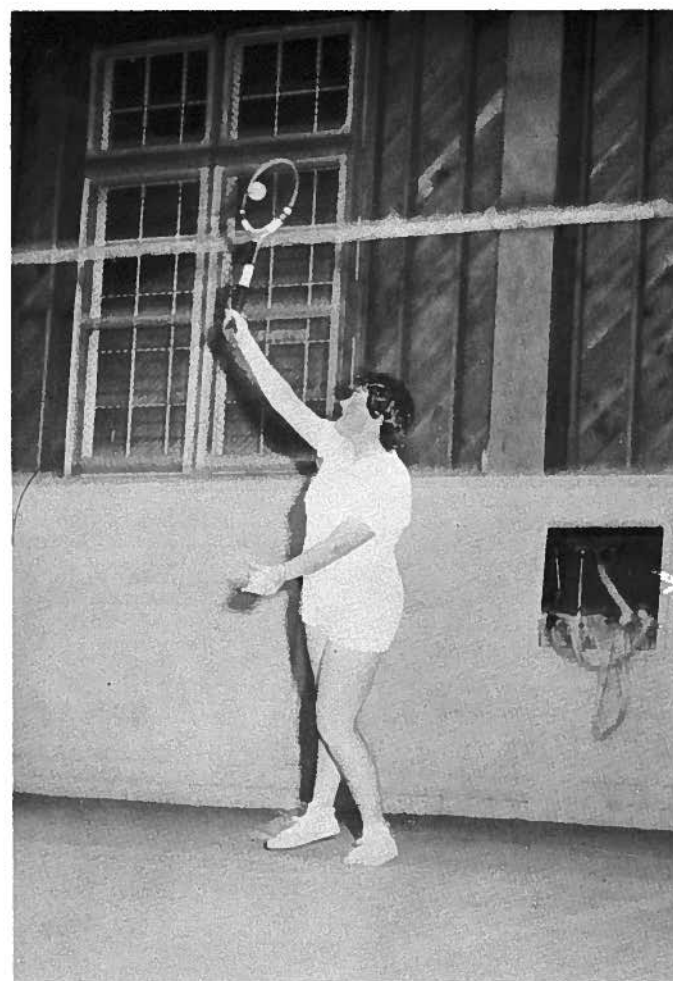

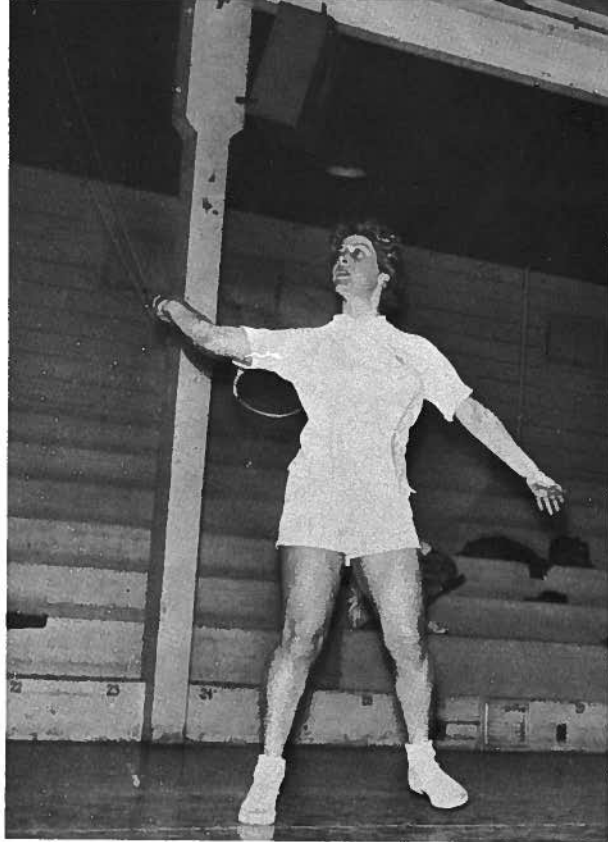

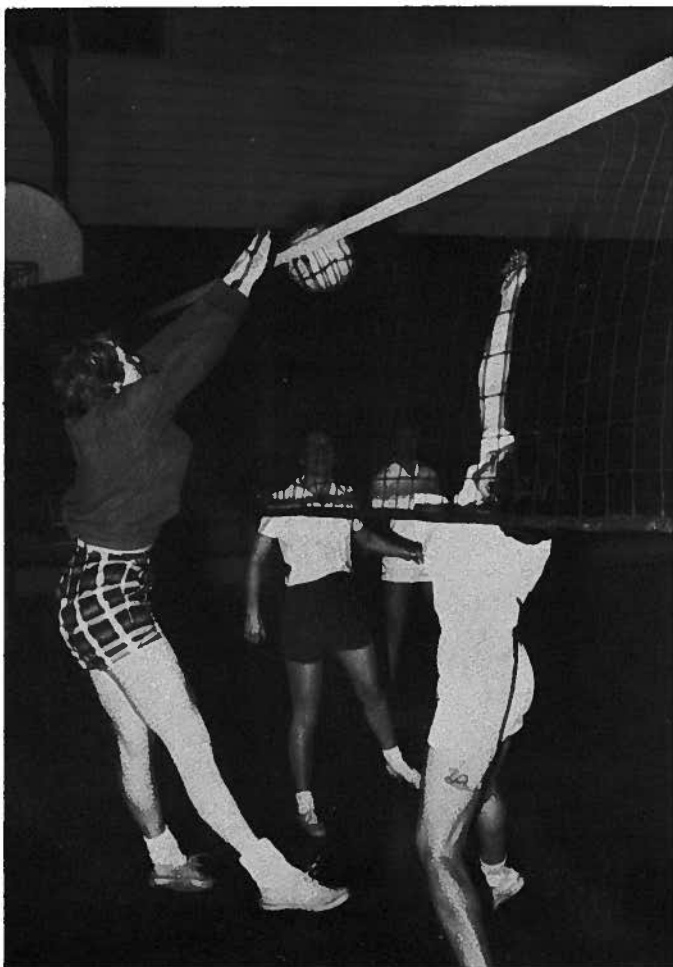

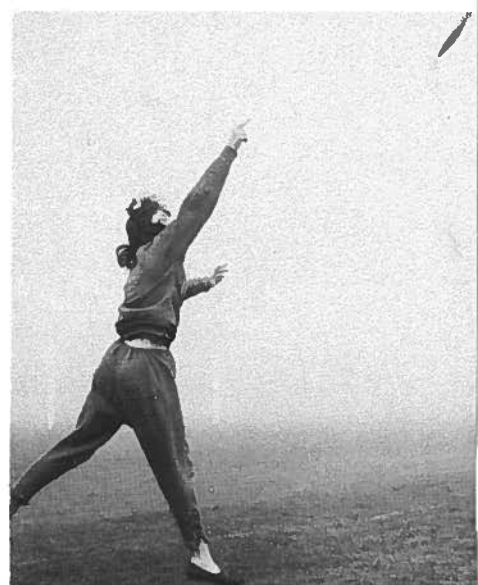
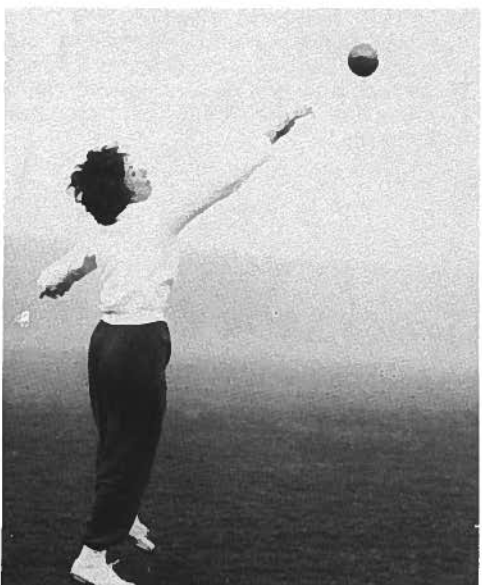

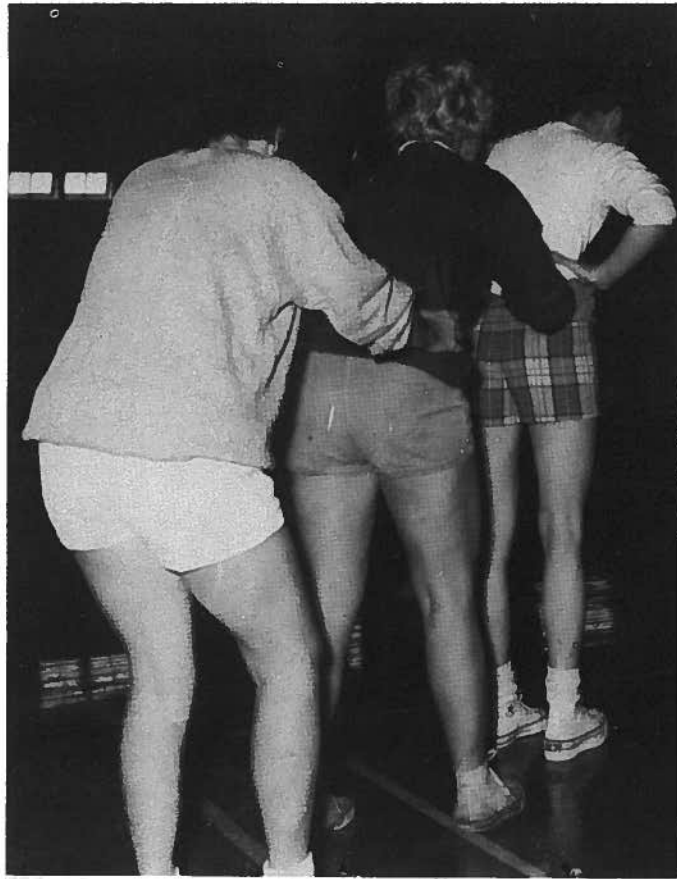

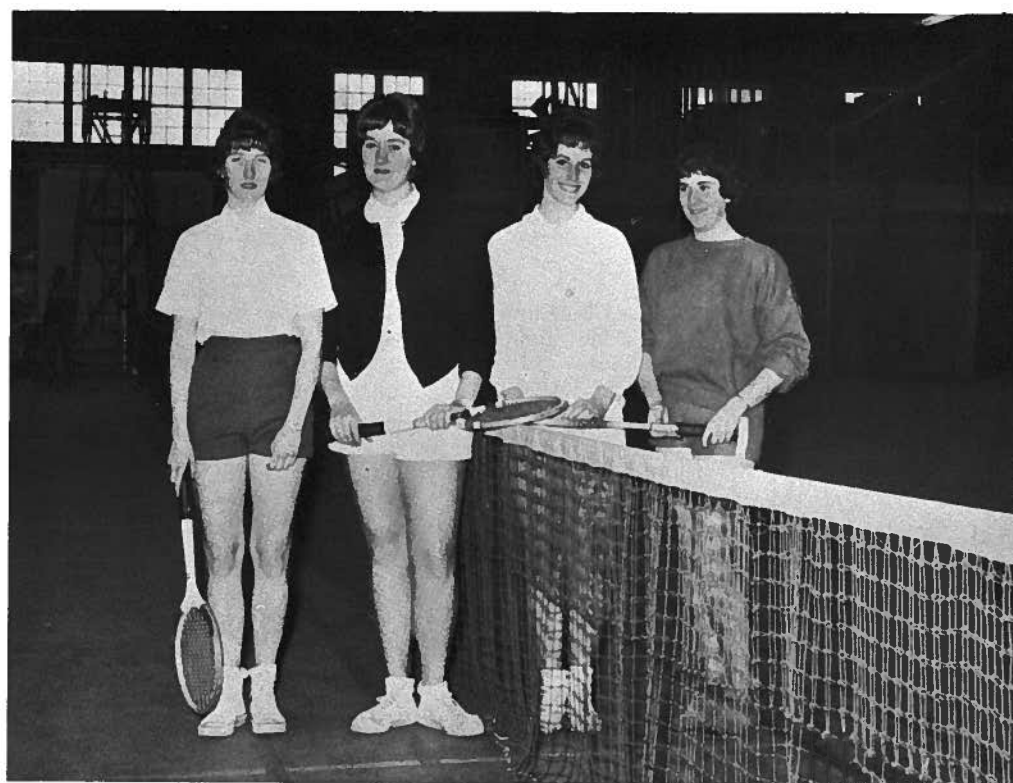

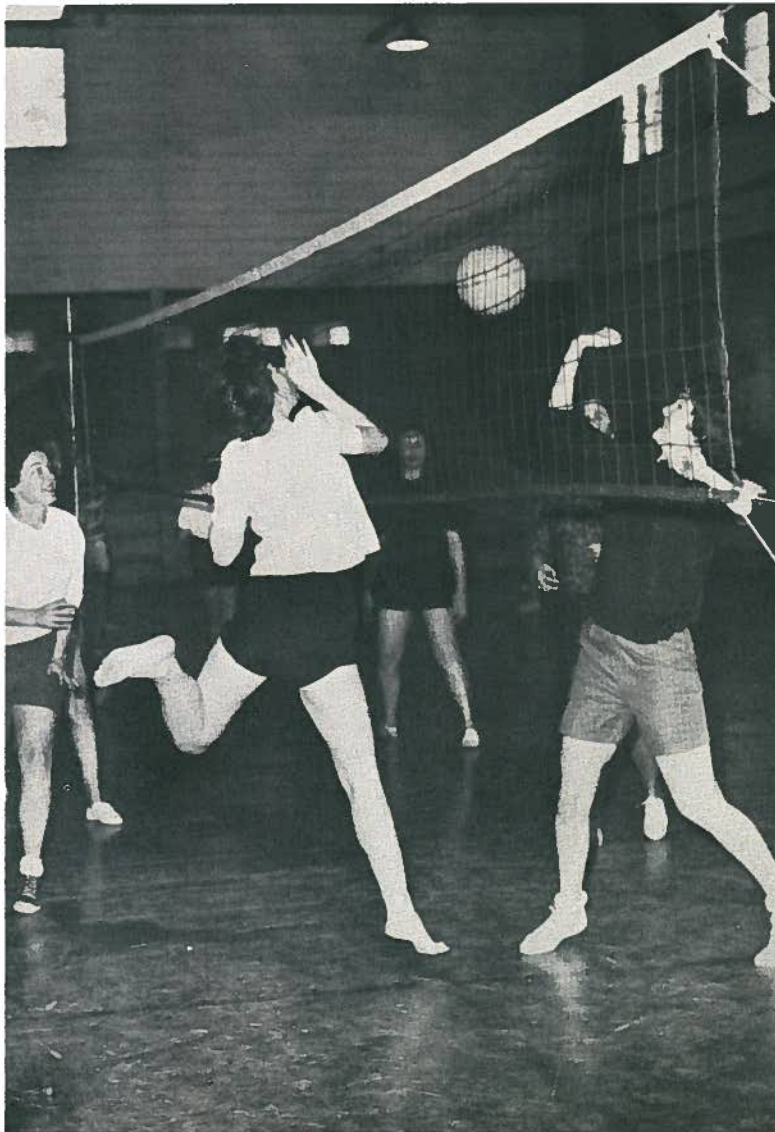
