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Description:	This group of about 40 letters, a part of the Sinclair Collection, consists of correspondence between Charles Robert Darwin (1809-1882) and John Scott Burdon Sanderson (1828-1905) during the years from 1873-1881.
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The letters deal with the research Darwin and Burdon Sanderson did on the digestive powers and leaf movements of insect-eating plants, notably *Drosera* and *Dionaea*. Darwin published the results of this research as part of his *Insectivorous Plants* (1875).

There is also correspondence about Burdon Sanderson's (and to a lesser extent, Darwin's) attempts to ensure that the anti-vivisectionists should not secure the passage of a bill through Parliament that should hinder scientific research. Sanderson's efforts influenced the events that led to the appointment of a Royal Commission in 1875 to study the use of animals in scientific research in Britain.

change in the leaves of Dionaea when they are excited and offers
to provide the plants.
